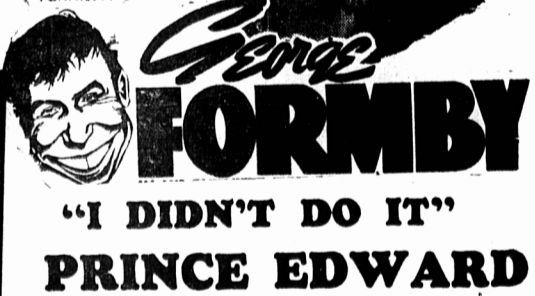

Discusses Financial Problem In Legislature

Commenting on a remark by Hon. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, Mr. William Hughes, Fifth Kings, said in the Legislature yesterday that the only way the poorer provinces could afford to accept the grants from the Federal Government was if they were made in inverse ratio to their ability to pay their own way.

This would mean that while the grants to richer provinces could be on a matching 50-50 basis those to the poorer ones might be on a 70-30 or even an 80-20 basis. Last week in the Legislature, Mr. Matheson said that the time was coming when we would "have to look gift horses in the mouth" so far as Federal health grants were concerned. He added that he believed that here we could no longer afford to match them.

Mr. Hughes, former Provincial Treasurer, expressed the belief that the taking over by the Province of existing electric plants with all their existing facilities "can easily increase the debt of this Province by \$20,000,000" within a few years.

In commenting on the budget he said that "nothing has ever happened or will be permitted to happen in this world save that ordained by the Creator." However, in spite of the optimistic tone of the budget he was inclined to the belief that conditions today were very similar to those of 1929, just prior to the depression.

The speaker thought that possibly a new era might be opening in Canada with Mr. Philip E. Taylor named as Deputy Minister of Finance at Ottawa. He termed the new appointee "a broad-minded man."

Discussing private property Mr. Hughes said that the right to it is a God-given one and is implicit in the commandment "Thou shalt labour in the interest of the Red Cross drive for funds which is being conducted throughout the province. Observers Very Uncertain Over Red Proposals

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR. Associated Press News Analyst. Red China's Premier Chou En-lai has broadcast a set of proposals which sound, if he is sincere, as if he were ready to end the Korean war.

In one breath he seemed to be making proposals which were very close to those offered by the United Nations before the Panmunjom truce talks ended, and to the Indian resolution recently adopted by the UN general assembly. In another breath he clings to the principle of forced repatriation of prisoners of war, the point of deadlock at Panmunjom.

The question was whether the Reds, for the sake of peace, would put aside a principle. No Western observer was prepared to say yes or no. It appears the only way to find out is to resume the truce negotiations and see what happens.

Of one thing Western diplomats were still convinced: It will not mean the end of the cold war nor erase the danger of an ultimate world war. China has been granted increased Russian aid for carrying the ball for world Communism in Asia and especially in Korea. The wheel may have turned to where Russia is having her preparedness program interfered with. Her need for consolidation at home may have become more pressing than her program of consolidation of post-war gains abroad.

Her limited amnesty for certain types of prisoners at home suggests this, as does the series of "soft" statements toward the West in the last three weeks. Also, she knows that such a show—which could reach a climax with a Korean armistice—would put the West in danger of a return to the lethargy which gave Russia her opportunities in the first post-war years.

But for a real peace, the Russian government would have to give up the idea of world conquest through world revolution. Only a fundamental change in Russia could produce such a change.

C. N. R. Engine Driver Retires

MONCTON, N. B., March 30—Bringing his train in to Moncton for the last time prior to his retirement after a lengthy service, Reid W. Steeves stepped down off his locomotive Saturday to be greeted by railway officers and fellow workers to extend best wishes. Members of his immediate family were also on hand to greet him.

Mr. Steeves was born at Salem, Albert County, N. B., on March 28th, 1888, and joined the service of the railway at Moncton as a locomotive wiper on June, 1916. He became a fireman in November of the same year and in September 1931 transferred to Charlottetown, P.E.I. From there he went to Campbellton, N. B., and then to Edmundston, returning to Moncton in January, 1932. Three years later he transferred to Saint John, N. B., and returned to Moncton the same year. He then alternated between Moncton and Saint John until December, 1939 when he became a locomotive engineer at Edmundston, N. B., where he served for a year before returning to Moncton.

His last run was between Cape Tormentine and Saint John. Woolridge.

Foresees Prospects For More Overall Surpluses

The belief that we have already gone further in making more standard roads than any other Province was expressed in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Keir Clark, Third Kings, when he took part in the budget debate. Mr. Clark also envisioned the time, three or four years hence, when the Public Works Department will be able to taper off its program of capital investment. He thought that this meant the beginning of more overall surpluses for the Government and would have an immediate effect on the price of Provincial bonds which have long been in strong demand.

The speaker said that though for years the Opposition had been critical of the financial deal made with the Federal Government he doubted that they would ask to have it cancelled at this date. He stated that it has only been through this agreement that the ordinary functions of the Provincial Government have been maintained "at the highest level we have ever known."

Mr. Clark spoke of the economy of this Province as being static in comparison with that of our neighbours and said it was one of "Fish and Chips" because it was based on fish and potatoes, "two of the oldest and most fundamental primary industries."

Provincial Debt

It was on this basis that he expressed his personal conviction that further Provincial debt increases would be "fully justified if used to industrialize the Province." However, he qualified this by stating that such expenditures must be of a nature from which we might reasonably expect a profitable financial return. He suggested the Province start as Newfoundland did with an economic survey, of which the proposed geological survey could be a part. When it was learned what could be done he favored the Government spearheading necessary investments to "prime the pump."

Mr. Clark said he was one of the original shareholders in the Charlottetown Can Company which prospered to the extent that it annually returned 24 percent to the shareholders. He said it was bought by another company and soon closed. "They liquidated a competitor that was getting in their way." He thought if such a business prospered before it would again.

While recognizing the lack of raw materials here the speaker still felt that there were some resources which could and should be exploited.

Mr. Clark said that all the farmer has to do is put his hand in his pocket and compare his position with that of earlier years. He said the farmer knows that agriculture is not going to wreck and ruin, but he did say that possibly a curtailment of the price-fixing powers of the Potato Marketing Board might be done and potatoes allowed to find their own price level.

"I do not think that artificial tampering with price fixing and experimenting by visionary theorists on our most vital agricultural cash crop is benefiting our agricultural economy." But he stated he was satisfied to leave the final decision to the farmers after a fair vote.

Mr. Clark deplored the rising trend in liquor sales and said he did not consider this the most desirable source of Provincial revenue. He said that though the Government might get a million dollars in revenue from it there was another two millions going out of the Province to provide it and another two millions being lost by the "decreased efficiency of the people who over-consume it."

Of his own constituency the speaker said that Kings County could be the most prosperous section of the Province because in Georgetown and Souris "we have two of the finest harbours on the continent." He asked for a paved road from Wood Islands to Souris in lieu of the Trans Canada Highway.
