Notes from Irishtown

A grand entertainment was given in the Irishtown School on Wednesday, the 12th, by the members of the Literary Association. The School was crowded with an attentive audience.

On Thursday, 13th inst., the Hon. Donald Ferguson delivered a very able and instructive lecture in our School on "Agriculture." A large audience was present. Mr. Ferguson left a grand impression on the minds of the people.

Our School is in a high state of efficiency under the able management of James A. McDonald, teacher.

Our village smith is doing a rushing business. He is always ready to attend to his customers. He says he can beat the Moncton boiler every time.

A strong Liberal-Conservative Association has been formed here, with a President, Vice-President, Secretary and an executive committee of five members. They will give a good account of themselves on election day.

RELIANCE.

The Mormon Problem.

The Mormons must go, that is if reasonable efforts are made to enforce the law that has just passed the lower house of Congress. Recent prosecutions have considerably shaken the power of the Mormon leaders, which should now soon disappear. With the practice of the distinguishing doctrine of their church declared a felony that their wives may be put in the box to prove against them, themselves deprived of political power, put under a test when they offer to vote, and the administration of justice in the hands of their enemies, they will be unable to longer maintain their practical rebellion against the laws of the country, while the dissolution of their church, financial organization and emigration society will deprive them of the power of recruiting their forces from European nations, so that it seems at last that the existence of Mormonism within its bounds will soon cease to be a reproach to the United States.
