

# Drop Noted In Number Of Unemployed Claimants

From a peak of more than 4200, the number of people drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits through the National Employment Office, Charlottetown has dropped to approximately 3400. The Charlottetown Office administers the Unemployment Insurance Act for the counties of Kings and Queens. Prince County is administered from Summerside and compiles its own unemployment figures separately. Mr. J.B. Murley, manager of the Charlottetown Office, who released the figures yesterday about the drop in the number of benefit claimants, explained that it was the usual thing at this time of year to have many men return to work. Mr. Murley expects that the decrease in the number of claimants will quicken in the next few weeks as more and more men return to their usual summer employment. The local manager pointed out that many fishermen are already preparing their fishing gear and boats for the lobster season which now only two weeks away so far as this part of the Province is concerned. The season opens in Kings and Queens counties on 1st May.

## Political History Highlights Are Traced By Queens M. P.

In an all too brief review of highlights in Canadian Political history by Heath Macquarrie, M.P., at the monthly supper meeting of St. Paul's Anglican Men's Association, the large number of members and guests present were accorded a rare opportunity to check back on many stirring events. Introduced by president Tom DeBlais, the speaker referred to the impression that Canadian political life was mediocre and dull as compared with some other countries, particularly that of the three-ring circus effect produced in the United States every four years. "Young Canadians do not find politics stimulating, and we are undoubtedly moderate but not dull," Mr. Macquarrie said as he described the place Washington and Lincoln continually hold in the hearts of Americans. "We do not appreciate our own great men, probably because we have not found anything in our history to get emotional about, as is the case in the United States and France. We have no great moments of emotion."

## Bass Baritone Kenneth Smith Scores Triumph At P. W. C.

To an impressive list of major successes achieved on this continent in recent months, bass-baritone Kenneth Smith last night at Prince of Wales auditorium added another minor triumph. He carried his Community Concert Association audience on a musical journey that swept them to the remote classical heights represented by the arias, the tortured "Inferno, E Tu Credevi" from "Erani" by Verdi; and the sorrowful "Why Do The Nations" from "Messiah" by Handel; and lowered them gently to more popular levels typified by two arias by Charles Gounod: the smooth "Sous Les Ploeds D'Un Fenme" from "The Queen of Sheba"; and the sarcastic "Serenade of Mephistopheles" from "Faust!"

In addition the distinguished American artist sang several popular selections including "Soliloquy" and "If I Love You" from the musical comedy "Carousel"; and added the spice of humor with "Song of the Flea" by Mousorgsky, and "The Deaf Old Woman" a Missouri folk-song. Two spirituals, "Deep River" by Burleigh, and "Ride on, King Jesus!" by Johnson, together with the final encore "Bless This House" were particularly well received by the large audience.

The quality of the accompaniment furnished by youthful Wilfrid Straight, evoked many tributes from the dispersing patrons. His skill and musical maturity were well displayed in three selections played towards the end of the program. All difficult, they included two of Chopin's better-known works: "Nocturne in E Minor" and "Interlude in G Minor".
