

New Brunswick's Premier Officiates At Ceremony

New Brunswick Premier Louis J. Robichaud officiated at ribbon cutting ceremonies recently officially opening Normandie Wines Ltd. in Scoudouc, N.B. Speaking to over 200 guests the Premier described the plant as an important addition to the industry and commerce of N.B. Outlining New Brunswick's recent industrial expansion the Premier suggested that perhaps the most important and dramatic growth factor in the province's development has been the new spirit of determination, optimism and self confidence the people of N.B. have found in themselves.

It is this new spirit that more than anything has brought New Brunswick to the attention of the rest of Canada in recent days. Some have said that New Brunswick needs a chain reaction of industrial immigration and development. "The chain reaction has started," the burst of industrial development is underway and will continue. New Brunswick needs the imagination and initiative of companies like Normandie Wines.

This company has combined the use of local raw materials with imported grape juices to effectively employ New Brunswick's geographical location. Open air routes and large consumer markets are within easy reach of Normandie Wines.

Prominent guests at the ceremonies beside the Premier included L.C. Desbriay, N.B. minister of education, Joe LeBlanc provincial secretary, Margaret Rideout, MP for Westmorland, Elmer Blanchard, P.E.I. minister of labor, important businessmen and officials from the Atlantic provinces. The Normandie Wines Company has worked miracles in transforming a large wartime drill hall into one of the most modern wineries in North America.

Large fermentation and storage tanks, pasteurizing equipment, bottling facilities, laboratories and business offices have been neatly positioned throughout the building.

The plant will eventually employ between 25 and 50 people directly but indirect employment will be provided to many New Brunswick suppliers.

The company will employ their personnel and buy their materials in the Maritimes. Currently all employees with the exception of two technical experts are from the Moncton and Shediac area. Roger Walsh of Moncton is plant manager and Klaus Petermann is production manager. Clarence Bourque of Shediac is office manager.

Four well known Maritime businessmen have been appointed to the board of directors: Aurele Arsenault and M.P. Fraser are from Moncton, C. R. (Dicky) Lynch is from Halifax and B. Carr is from Charlottetown, P.E.I.

The company has located in New Brunswick's newest industrial park. Adjacent to railways highways, seaports and a modern air terminal Normandie is ideally situated for distribution in Canada, the U.S. and the West Indies.

Initially Normandie will offer a full selection of ports, sherries and table wines produced from the juices of European grapes. In September an experiment began in the production of blueberry wine with the pressing of over 20,000 lbs. of New Brunswick blueberries. If commercially successful the blueberry wine making operation will consume an estimated 100,000 lbs. of blueberries a year.

Experiments with other local fruits are also planned. This quality of planning and vision is essential to the future economic growth of New Brunswick.

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Mayor B.H. Yeo Attends Meeting

MONTAGUE — Mayor Bruce H. Yeo has recently returned to the island after attending the Maritime Motion Picture Exhibitors Association meeting which was held at the Lord Nelson Hotel, Halifax, N.S. Mayor Yeo has been elected vice-president for the province of Prince Edward Island. Other officers elected from this province were Francis Perry, director, and "Duke" Neilsen, vice-president of the pioneers in the association.

The topic of Sunday movies created considerable debate as to the way this matter is handled in the Maritimes. Mayor Yeo presented a brief which pointed out that Nova Scotia has changed the law to make Sunday movies legal under the Lord's Day Alliance Act. In New Brunswick

movies are exhibited in approximately 100 per cent of the motion picture houses under the sponsorship arrangement. This also applies to P.E.I. where the larger theatres and drive-ins exhibit movies on Sunday. It was the opinion here that it should be legal for all motion picture exhibitors to have movies on Sunday night starting after church services. The hour of nine o'clock was suggested.

Mayor Yeo stated this is a matter which will bear considerable consideration as good motion pictures should be beneficial especially to the younger generation.

Further details will be presented shortly by the president of the motion picture theatres, A. J. Mason of Halifax.

Majority Rule In Rhodesia Seen Perhaps 15 Years Off

By JOSEPH MACSWEEN LONDON (CP) — Commonwealth Secretary Herbert Bowden spoke here of a possible time lag of perhaps 15 years before Rhodesia reaches majority rule.

The comment came as British approved Thursday's "final offer" to Premier Ian Smith giving him about six weeks to end the Rhodesian rebellion or face a harsh compulsory sanctions under the United Nations.

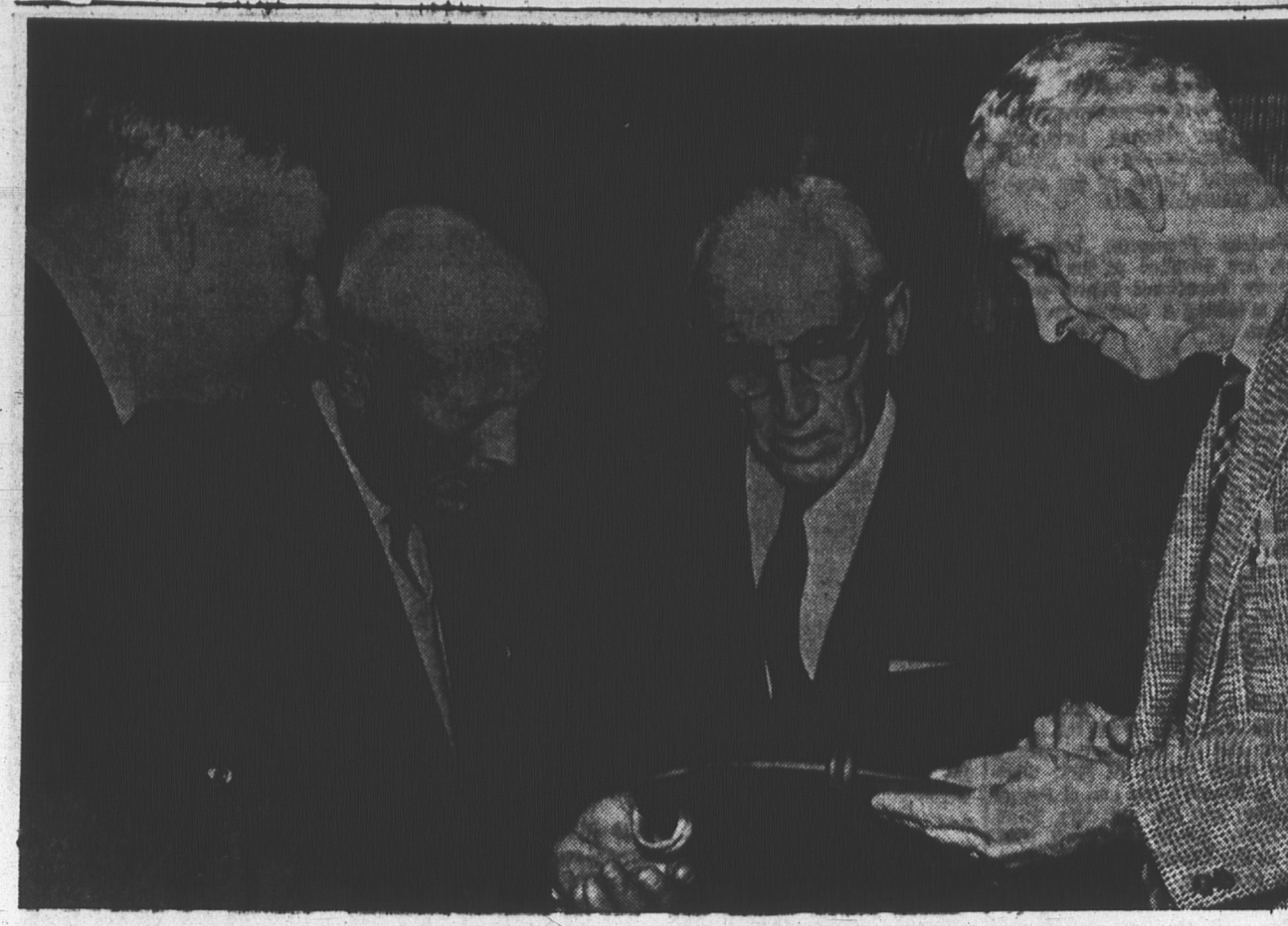
The timing of majority rule has been one of the great issues in the drawn-out Rhodesian situation. African countries have pressed tirelessly for a commitment from Britain that legal independence will never be granted on a basis of white rule to Rhodesia which has only 200,000 whites in a population of more than 4,000,000.

Bowden said majority rule could come to Rhodesia in perhaps "two or three general elections" — with five years between elections. White Rhodesian authorities now were trying to frighten settlers by telling them that legal independence for the colony would mean immediate black rule.

The Commonwealth secretary said that instead a period is envisaged during which black forces would begin to appear in the Rhodesian government.

He announced to the Commonwealth Correspondents Association that a Thursday cabinet meeting approved final proposals which would be taken to Salisbury by Sir Morrice James, an official of the Commonwealth office.

"We hope in a matter of days to get some reaction from the Rhodesian regime," said Bowden.
