Land Valuation Made In 10 School Districts

The Prince Edward Island Land Valuation Board, during its first year in existence, has valued the real property of ten school districts throughout the Province, including School Unit No. 1 in Charlottetown Royalty.

Other districts which have so far taken advantage of this free Government valuation service are: Borden, Southport, Cross Roads, Crapaud, Victoria, Bellevue, Caladonia, Hopefield, and St. Charles. Mr. J. W. Currie, chairman of the Board, said yesterday that other applications have been received by the Board through the Department of Education. The valuation is made, he explained, after a request has been received following a majority vote for such action at annual school meetings or meetings called specifically for that purpose.

All school districts outside Charlottetown and Summerside are eligible for this valuation and the aim is to have a uniform and equitable value placed on all real estate in the district.

Mr. Currie said that in many instances it is found that the valuations are not uniform. All factors are considered by the Board's appraisers when it is called in and the valuation is then given the School Board which levies the tax.

Ontario Farm To Sell 225 Head Of P.E.I. Swine Stock

Prince Edward Island's reputation for superior quality swine is evidenced in the following news item appearing in a recent issue of an Ontario farm journal:

"One of the largest purebred Yorkshire swine herds ever established in Eastern Ontario is to be dispersed by auction on June 29. Major James R. Popham of Venture Croft Farms, Chesterville, will sell some 225 head on that date.

"Although only established a few years this swine herd has already made an outstanding reputation in Ontario. All the breeding stock was imported from the best Prince Edward Island farms, and pigs from this stock have been in great demand since the importation.

"It is believed this sale will be the largest of advanced registry swine ever held in Eastern Ontario and it will be the largest offering of pure P.E.I. blood lines ever offered in Ontario. At the sale the 225 animals will be sold in 161 lots.

Canal Committee, was delivered by W. N. Wickwire, K.C., of Halifax. It was bolstered by telegrams and letters from the premiers of the Maritimes and Newfoundland.

Outright urgings for construction of the canal came from Premier McNair of New Brunswick, Jones of Prince Edward Island and Smallwood of Newfoundland.

Premier Macdonald of Nova Scotia said his Government this week had concluded that the Federal Government should investigate the cost of construction and all other relevant factors. C. H. Blakeney, former New Brunswick Education Minister and former Mayor of Moncton, told the Cabinet he would urge that "now is the time to undertake this important and vital matter to the Maritimes."

N. S. Sanford, Amherst, N. S., committee chairman, said Cabinet with the scratch of a pen could settle a matter that would result in increased trade within the Maritimes and between the Maritimes and other parts of Canada.

He said there were other considerations than strict dollars-and-cents. The Dominion was spending \$150,000,000 on the Trans-Canada Highway for the general good of the country but with no direct financial return to the treasury.

Wire From Premier Jones

Premier Jones in a telegram read by delegation chairman F. C. Morrison of Saint John, N.B., said his Government hoped the canal delegation would meet with success and that it would be a "powerful stimulus" to the Maritime economy.

Premier McNair said his Government gave "heartly endorsement" to early construction of the waterway. Increasing rail transportation costs made some relief vital, and the canal would contribute "most materially" to the economic advancement of the Maritimes.

For Newfoundland, Premier Smallwood said his cabinet gave
