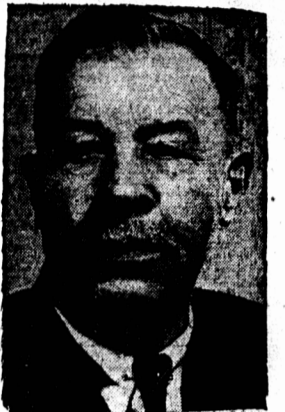

The archbishop, Hungary's highest ranking Catholic official since Cardinal Mindszenty was imprisoned for life in a similar trial in 1949, had confessed publicly in court to illegal activities.

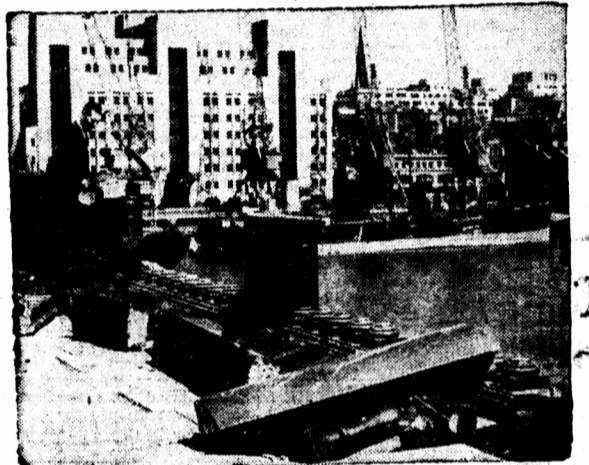
Further delay in constructing the St. Lawrence seaway will ruin Canada's industrial life, Dr. R. G. Wallace, retiring principal of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., said in address to American Institute of Electrical Engineers, attending summer conference in Toronto. Stressing the fact that cheap hydro-electric power has been largely responsible for developing industry in the St. Lawrence Valley, Dr. Wallace said: "If there is a delay, the whole heart of Canada's industrial life will be crippled."



Two veteran R.C.A.F. pilots, F.O. Garth Horricks, of Toronto, and F.O. George Laing, Windsor, Ont., were killed instantly when their Harvard plane crashed into a swamp near Trenton, Ont. Both were members of R.C.A.F. rescue, attending two weeks' refresher course at Camp Hohenak at Deseronto, Ont. 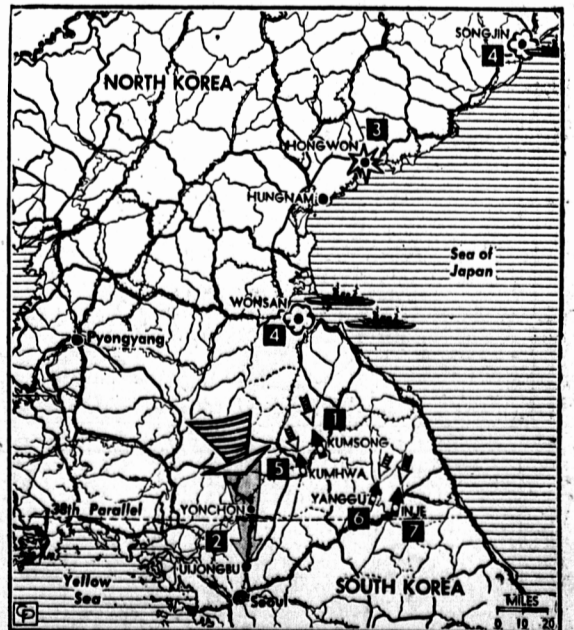

A dramatic rescue, staged by a New York police helicopter, saved the life of an injured steeplejack trapped for two and one-half hours atop the roof of St. John the Divine. The injured man, Peter Burn, fell from top of a 30-foot ladder while painting a 75-foot metal scaffolding. The helicopter landed on a 35 by 50 foot section of the roof, 100 feet above ground. REDS BATTLE TO COVER BUILDUP



ALLIED OFFICERS in the field believe a sudden flurry of attacks by the Communists indicates the Reds are battling as best they can to protect their supply and buildup area (1). On the western front the Reds also continued a buildup for a possible new offensive through the Uijongbu corridor (2) toward Seoul. U. S. Superfortresses radar-bombed Hongwon (3) and UN naval forces shelled the Wonsan and Songjin (4) areas. Allied units repulsed four separate attacks near Kumhwa (5) and forced Reds to withdraw near Yanggu (6), and Communist troops resumed shelling of allied positions north of Inje (7), with artillery.
