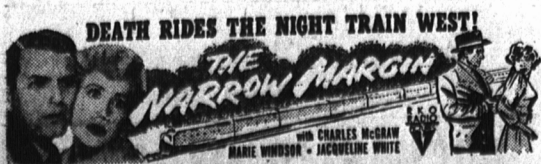

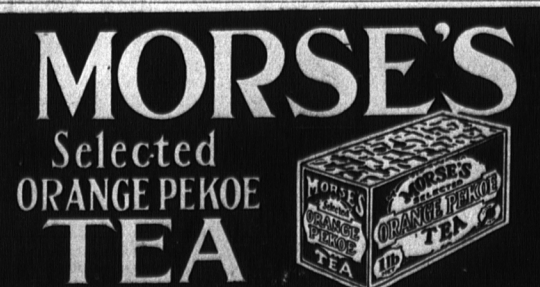

"SUBMARINE COMMAND" AT THE CAPITOL

Paramount's rousing sea drama, "Submarine Command," sailed full-stream into the Capitol yesterday trailing almost two hours of spine-tling suspense and excitement in its wake. For its terse account of the submarine Tiger Shark and the fighting crew that sailed her to glory north of the 38th Parallel, this action thriller rates a twenty-one gun salute. William Holden, Nancy Olson, William Bendix and Don Taylor are starred in this enactment of a daring undersea exploit that spelled life or death for 400 American soldiers in Korea. Produced by Joseph Siskind and directed by John Farrow, the picture zeroes in on a young sub officer as he assumes his first combat command and is forced to give an order that means death for two shipmates. Condemned by his crew, he is given a desk job, but gets a chance to square things when he is returned to sea duty at the start of the Korean War.

In command of the undersea raider Tiger Shark he speeds to Korean waters for the most dangerous undersea mission of the conflict. The plan is to sail into mine-infested waters far north of the 38th Parallel and there to attempt to direct a combined land, sea and air rescue of hundreds of prisoners facing execution. With the outcome of the ensuing battle dependent on Holden's skill and daring, the film soars to a thundering climax.
