MARKETS and FINANCE

N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market ended lower last week after climbing to an all-time peak. It was the first decline after four consecutive weekly advances and most market analysts were impressed with the grudging manner in which most stocks retreated.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended off one dollar on the week at \$158.90.

The number of issues changing hands also diminished as the market eased. At no time was there heavy selling. On the contrary, stocks generally reacted with substantial gains on favorable corporate developments, such as dividend increases, of which there were many.

Among the issues gaining on increased dividend declarations were DuPont, Curtiss - Wright, Electric Auto Lite, Inspiration Consolidated Copper, Pepsi-Cola and General Refractories.

Market technicians are generally bullish on the near as well as long term prospects of the market. Though they caution investors on the possibility of sink-

ing spells due to unforeseen international developments, they regard the internal condition of the market as sound.

Canadian issues on the New York stock exchange were mostly lower for the week. International Nickel lost one, McIntyre was down 1/2 and Hiram Walker lost 1/2. Distillers Seagrams was unchanged and Canadian Pacific gained 1/2.

On the American stock exchange Lake Shore lost 1/2 while Royalite gained 1/2.

U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel Magazine said Sunday the auto industry is being overrated as a key to this year's steel demand.

There has been much speculation that whether the auto industry is hit by a strike this summer or whether its market wanes in the coming months will determine the fate of the steel business, for the year.

Steel magazine conceded that the auto industry will be a big factor in this picture as the largest consumer of steel. But it pointed out that 80 per cent of the coun-

try's steel output goes to industries other than automotive. Many of these industries are either experiencing a pickup or expecting one.

"Already, the demand for forms of steel used outside the automotive industry is rising. Plates, for instance, are picking up as pipe line fabrication accelerates. Structural steel is feeling a pickup, too," said Steel.

Steel production rose 1.5 points last week to 90 per cent of rated capacity or 2,172,000 net tons, greatest weekly tonnage since October, 1953.

Field Crops' Value Down

OTTAWA (CP)—The value of Canada's field crop including grain, feed and vegetables, dropped to an eight-year low of \$1,187,670,000 in 1954 as the farm economy rolled under the impact of bad growing weather and declining world markets.

The bureau of statistics said Friday this is a preliminary estimate of 1954 farm production value to be boosted when prairie grain growers get further payments on their grain deliveries.

However, it was down \$228,000,000 from a similar initial estimate of 1953 production and was the lowest dollar value since 1945 when preliminary farm output was estimated at \$1,090,000,000.

The 1954 initial estimate was \$538,000,000 below the 1953 final estimate of \$1,725,000,000 and less than one-half the peak output of \$2,300,000,000 in 1952.

Most provinces were caught in the decline, but Saskatchewan, heart of Canada's wheat industry, suffered by far the greatest drop as bad weather and a rust epidemic reduced Canada's wheat crop by more than one-half the output in 1953.

Iron Ore May Be Leading Canadian Mineral Soon

Federal mining authorities believe the value of Canada's iron ore production may surpass other mineral leaders in less than 10 years.

Expansion of mineral production generally was one of Canada's economic highlights in 1954. The record \$1,454,000,000 worth of minerals produced helped offset economic impact of the prairie crop failure.

Though iron ore was far from being a leader then, mining officials believe that if markets are maintained, production will jump from the 7,200,000 tons last year and the expected 12,000,000 this year to possibly 30,000,000 or 40,000,000 tons by mid-1960 or even sooner.

At current prices, the value of such production would increase possibly to \$280,000,000 annually by mid-1960 from the \$46,700,000 last year.

IRON BIG PROSPECT

In comparison, gold production in 1954 totalled \$145,800,000; copper \$151,000,000; nickel \$180,200,000; lead \$59,000,000; zinc \$89,300,000; silver \$26,260,000.

NEWSY NOTES

FLORIDA STATE FAIR

This is a year of anniversaries and this was Florida's Golden Anniversary for its State Fair. The principal attraction of the first Florida State Fair, held in downtown Tampa, on the old courthouse Square, was a huge pyramid of vegetables and fruit, and there were only a few thousand local citizens and farmers present. This Fair now claims to be the largest Winter Exposition in the world and the attendance this year was estimated at one million and a half people.

The fair started on Saturday, Feb. 5th with the West Coast Dairy Show. There was a special after-noon program on Sunday. The three nearby Counties of Pinellas, Polk and Manatee had their big day on Monday at the fair; then on Tuesday the State Championship contest for teen age automobile drivers was run off. Many of the contestants showed great skill in negotiating the many hazards successfully. There was a splendid parade of dairy champions. It was also Boy Scout Day. Hernando, a small west coast country had their day on Wednesday. They have a United States bird sanctuary near the country town of Brooksville and it was fitting that their people should be on hand to assist in making it also a Wildlife Conservation Day. There were auto races and a sale of Ayrshire cattle. The elaborate ceremonies in recognition of Tampa's centennial year were held on Thursday, February 10th. The Florida Fair Show opened on Friday and the county of Bradford and Pasco made it their special day.

Friday was the Negro Children's Day and 4-H Clubs and other colored children groups held their contests. The fair featured Negro achievements and an achievement award was presented to Florida's outstanding Negro citizen. Saturday, February 12th, was given over to the future farmers of Florida, the young men and the boys of the farm held their competitions and parade. They put on a grandstand program and dress revue. Auto races were also held for those who claimed to be America's fastest dirt track drivers.

Monday, February 19th, witnessed the 42nd celebration of the invasion of Tampa by Jose Gaspar and his Festive Pirate Crew of 300 in their steel hulled pirate ship built at a cost of \$100,000. The citizens and visitors \$50,000 strong lined the far flung water front of the city. The gaily decorated noisy Gasparilla craft with a crew of over 200 smaller craft sailed up Hillsborough River through the heart of downtown Tampa accompanied by three big U. S. Coast Guard cutters. Sixty thousand rounds of blank cartridges were fired during the invasion and King Gasparilla and his Queen landed and led the parade of 30 bands and 60 floats that glittered with tinsel and bunting during the four hours while it moved through the streets of the city to the grandstand of the Florida State Fair, where the citizens surrendered and turned over the keys of Tampa to King Gasparilla under certain conditions.

This event was televised for the first time over Florida's newest television station WFLA-TV. Road traffic was regulated with the efficient assistance of helicopters and small planes who observed congested routes and avoided bottlenecks. Curious spectators on the nearby Causeway (one-way) was the only hold up reported.

Tuesday the 15th, was the Governor's and Children's Day and thousands of happy children took the laundry bills.

Welfare State Has Arrived

TORONTO (CP)—The dean of the faculty of divinity at McGill University has taken a look at the modern Canadian way of life and concluded: "The welfare state has arrived."

In a report to the board of evangelism and social service of the United Church of Canada, Rev. James S. Thomson said the national income has been redistributed by pensions, insurance schemes and children's allowances. His remarks were included in a text released to the press in advance of delivery.

"The tendency is to look to government, national, provincial and local, to do more for us," he said. "This can only be done at a price which is apt to be unobserved in the multiplication and increase of taxes."

He said modern life is better in many respects but there is acute anxiety as people want more and surrender to the "overwhelmingly materialistic and secular" influences.

Timely Notes On Fur Farming

Mink ranchers in the United States are being alerted to discontinue using beed tripe in mink feed on cattle feed as an ingredient in mink feed. The chemical is diethylstilbestrol, a female sex hormone compound, which beef cattle breeders are feeding their herds. Beef tripe from such cattle is commonly used to improve its digestibility. Both the United Mink Breeders Association and the Great Lakes Mink Association have warned their members against using tripe in their feed at least until there is scientific proof that the chemical compound will not cause sterility. Ranchers Ota Grasse and Arthur MacArthur have been named by UMPFA to head a campaign in seek revocation of licenses which permit cattlemen to use the compound in their cattle feed, according to Don Crosby, UMPFA business manager. "We are assuming the position that the licensing of the use of Stilbestrol in beef cattle feeds was premature in view of the fact that insufficient work had been done to improve its digestibility, not only to mink but to human beings also." Experimental work to test effects of the chemical compound are understood to be in progress at the University of Iowa and the University of Wisconsin.
