### Duck And Goose Bands Returned

Harvey Moore, owner of the wild life sanctuary at Milltown Cross, recently received two letters from the United States regarding wild fowl which had been banded by him in his sanctuary. The letters were from the United States Department of Interior, Fish and Wild Life Service, research refuge at Laurel, Maryland.

The first letter informed Mr. Moore that a hybrid black mallard female banded by him on March 22nd, 1957, was shot on June 20th, 1957, by an unknown boy. The band had been turned in by Officer Robert Tintel, Pequanock township police Dept.

The second letter concerned a band from a Canada goose. Although Mr. Moore has received letters informing him of the shooting of ducks with his band, this is the first information he has ever received of the shooting of Canada goose. The bird was banded by Mr. Moore on December 3rd, 1954, and was shot at Famlico Sound near Hatteras, North Carolina on January 1st, 1957.
