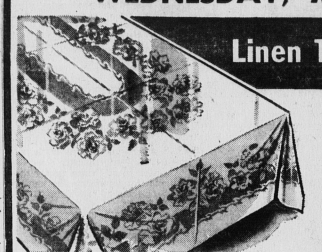

He skipped a Montague legion curling team to provincial finals this past winter and represented the province at the finals in Fort William in March. He has been a member of the winning provincial legion curling teams for three years.

United Appeal Tops Objective

The Prince Edward Island United Fund went over its objective funding, seven months after the campaign was started.

Fund Executive Director, Jack Ambler, said yesterday the total to date had reached \$27,675.96, which is \$18.93 more than the amount sought.

He said campaign Chairman W.W. Reid and his entire organization are to be congratulated on the success of this first province-wide campaign.

Mr. Ambler said many factors contributed to the delay in getting all returns to the United Fund office, "not the least of them being the weather."

"This delay does not detract from the proud achievement of all segments of the population of our province. The eyes of North America have been on our provincial wide campaign and its success is sure to encourage others to amalgamate into similar organizations."

The campaign's success was a milestone in fund raising, Mr. Ambler said. "The amount of money raised is by far the greatest amount raised for health and welfare purposes in any one year in the history of the province. It is the first time that the complete list of agencies have been able to obtain 100 per cent support in their financial campaigns in any one year."

GEARS FOR 1964
With one successful campaign behind it, the United Fund is already gearing for the 1964 campaign. Agency budgets are being received for study by the allocations committee, and top men and women are being approached to serve on the campaign committee.

Mr. Ambler said that because of the success of this first campaign it is hoped that it will encourage organizations who continue to run independent campaigns to remain outside the United Fund.

A breakdown of campaign receipts shows that Charlottetown area contributed far more than any other district with a total of \$149,441.34; Summerside contributed \$37,614.50. Other district contributions were: Prince County \$12,848.04; Queens County \$15,027.70 and Kings, \$15,752.85.

DRAMATIC WRECK MADE AT FIND

PERTH, Australia (AP)—Three hundred and seven years ago the Dutch sailing ship Gill Dragon went down near a reef off Ledge Point, 60 miles north of Perth.

In a sensational anniversary discovery, skin divers Sunday scooped up handfuls of pieces of eight they believe went down with the ship.

The divers brought up about 50 coins, found 40 feet deep about 3 1/2 miles off shore. They reported that a cross could be distinguished on one side of the coins and the letter "P" on the other.

Most of the coins were scattered on the ocean floor. Recovered pieces of eight, the divers found four jugs of glazed pottery, all with a hawkestrick face stamped on them, and several ivory tusks taken from a pile of about 300.

Aggressive Enterprise Seen Need

OTTAWA (CP)—Aggressive business enterprise is needed if more Canadian products are to be sold to the expanding market of the six Central American republics, Canada's trade commissioner to the area said.

H. E. Lemieux said the six countries—Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Panama—have a combined population of 78,000,000 worth of goods a year, of which Canada exports only \$10 million.

Upward Trend Reported In Rentals

OTTAWA (CP)—A distinct upward trend occurred in the rental patterns of non-farm occupied dwellings in the 10-year period between 1951 and 1961, a bureau of statistics said Sunday.

In a 1961 census report on housing, the bureau said that in 1951 tenants in 64 per cent of 1,110,960 dwellings paid rents of less than \$40 a month. A total of 15 per cent paid between \$40 and \$49 and 23 per cent paid \$50 or more.

However, by 1961 only 24 per cent of tenants in 1,515,766 dwellings paid less than \$40 a month. A total of 13 per cent paid \$40 to \$49 and 63 per cent \$50 or more.

The average monthly rent for Canada was \$65 in 1961, ranging from \$48 in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick to \$78 in Ontario. Average monthly rent in metropolitan areas varied from \$48 in Montreal to \$101 in Toronto and \$84 in Ottawa to \$60 in St. John, N.B., and in Quebec City.

For the first time in 1961 an effort was made to estimate gross rent by adding any cash amounts paid monthly for services such as water, electricity, gas or fuel to cash rent. On this basis the average gross rent for Canada in 1961 was \$77.

The average values of homes in Canada in 1961 was \$11,021, ranging from \$4,311 in Newfoundland to \$12,952 in Ontario. Values ranging from \$9,069 in Saint John and \$10,349 in Windsor to a high of \$15,935 in Montreal, \$16,420 in Ottawa and \$17,201 in Toronto.

Canada's share is about only two per cent. Mr. Lemieux, based in Guatemala City where he has been studying a training charge d'affaires, said in an interview that all countries are on an equal footing from a tariff point of view in competing in Central America.

At present, Canada sold a fairly large variety of goods in small quantities to the area. These seemed no reason why the volume of trade could not be expanded.

During the next 10 years, he predicted Canada's best prospects for exports lay in the field of hydro-electric power, public utilities and possibly wheat sales.
