Dr. Manion's Stand

Dearest, most forthright and most British note struck in Parliament on Friday, says the Ottawa Journal, came from the Conservative Leader, Dr. Manion.

It is the duty of Canada to let the world know that we are unitedly behind Britain in this war.

We are bound to participate in this war. We are British subjects, part of the British Empire, and I do not see how it is possible for us to be in and out of the Empire at the one time.

I do not believe there can be any neutrality for any part of the Empire when any other part is at war. We are fighting for our conception of civilization, for Christianity in all its branches, for Protestant and Catholic alike have been persecuted in Germany.

To make this country strong for defence is good, but our best defence is an offensive in far-off lands. If Britain and France were beaten, Canada might well become the battle ground of nations in the world, and Canada is vulnerable to attack.

If the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall go forward to the conflict? There is no uncertain sound in this clear, ringing British note proclaimed by Dr. Manion.

Practical Help In Wartime

Undoubtedly there are many persons of advanced years in Canada who would like to share in some practical way in the nation-wide prosecution of the war if given opportunities.

There are men of wealth, no longer able to enlist for active service, who would equip machine gun units or provide other necessary equipment, and others who would give as they can to the same purpose, thus easing the strain on the

national treasury. This was done in the Great War.

Such demonstrations of loyalty should be encouraged. The Toronto Globe and Mail suggests that the governments, Dominion and Provincial, might well consider exempting the capital in contributions like this from taxation.

How extensive such contributions might be cannot be estimated, but they would be substantially in the aggregate if funds were sought by accredited bodies.

Last year 17,000 children were adopted in the United States. Only one third of these went to their foster homes through reliable child-placement bureaus. The other two thirds—more than 11,000—were cash commodities sold by commercial nurseries and bootlegged by private individuals, mostly doctors.

U.S. Congress will again be called to consider where they stand on the question of Neutrality. Here are some of the reasons which previously led them to defeat Roosevelt's proposals to revise the war policy legislation:

1. Distrust in Congress of the Fourth New Deal's foreign section on two grounds—(a) the political fear that to sustain it would give the President additional powers on the threshold of a national election; and (b) the temperamental fear that Mr. Roosevelt might not wisely use the power to arm one set of belligerents against another.

2. Conviction among a majority of the members of Congress that the people of the United States favor a negative foreign policy as long as it can be maintained and, in the preface of war, want no allies.

3. Historic lack of concern over the European situation because of the repeated settlement of recent crises; the buoyancy of the British "appeasement" faction; the war debt defaults; and the congenial American suspicion that European nations seek only to exploit the United States.

As Others See It

(Moncton Times) We have heard during the past few days of crisis from Prime Minister Mackenzie King that there should be no partisanship displayed in public affairs.

But what do we find after Prime Minister King's declaration for a united front? The appointment of Hon. Bradford W. LePage of the Liberal Party as Prince Edward Island Governor, as Lieutenant Governor of that Province, a rank Liberal partisan appointment, despite the representations that had been made to Ottawa by Prince Edward Island Liberals and Conservatives alike that Hon. George D. DeBlois should be continued in his post as Lieutenant Governor.

We have no reason to interfere in what the Federal ministry does in another Province, but when it is common knowledge that Hon. Charles A. Dunning, former Minister of Finance and representative of the Liberal Party in the Federal Government of P. E. I., has been recommended by Hon. Mr. DeBlois to be continued in office, there is no other alternative than that Hon. Bradford W. LePage was a purely political appointee.

Nazi-Soviet Pact "A Dud"

(Watertown, N. Y. Times) When the story of the present crisis is written, it may well easily develop that Hitler's major mistake was the non-aggression pact he made with Russia. He thought it would be a ten strike. It was timed exactly right. It had the elements of surprise and drama. But it proved to be a dud.

Here are the reasons: It proved that which many people have long contended, that the only difference between the Bolshevism of Russia and that of Germany was that one was red and the other brown.

It is lost Germany the friendship of Japan and Spain and weakened the ties with Italy. It sent the Balkan states scurrying to the side of the democracies. It stiffened rather than weakened the stand of the democracies. What pro-Nazi feeling existed in England and France was based on the conviction that Hitler was saving the world from Communism. With the Nazis and the Communists in a fast alliance, this argument fell like a punctured balloon.

Unless there is a secret military treaty between Germany and Japan, the Nazi-Communist pact has done more to isolate the Reich than anything else that could be done.
