

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

SPIRIT OF THE SOUTHERNERS.—Surgeon Fox, who recently arrived at Philadelphia from Richmond, says of the military spirit there: "The energy of the people is astonishing, and the army is being recruited in a regular way. Boys of twelve and fourteen years are frequently to be seen in the ranks. Men, except those in the army, are scarce in Richmond, but there appears to be little diminution of women and children. The German Jews of Richmond were among the first to desert the Secession, and at the commencement of the war, but have not been willing to serve in the army, generally purchasing substitutes at high prices. Richmond, apart from the military, is described as presenting a very dull and apathetic appearance, and the city is in mourning; houses are closed, but few windows are seen open, and no life visible in any direction, except the usual military routine. The streets, however, are full of rough unshaven-looking soldiers, of bold, ferocious and brigandish appearance."

DISLOYALTY IN MARYLAND.—The late returns to our arms have emboldened the secessionists of Maryland, and developed into rebels many who were previously inclined to the side of the Union, as it seems to be the winning side. The confiscation measure, too, has had the effect of stirring up the slaveholders and embittering their feelings. So wide spread, indeed, has the feeling of loyalty become the commencement of the war, that the Legislature together for the purpose of encouraging enlistments, lost an attempt should be made to carry the State out of the Union. Several of the Senators are known to entertain sentiments hostile to the Union, stimulated by the emancipation question.

WEIGHING DEPARTMENT OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND.—One of the most interesting and astonishing departments, within the whole compass of the Bank of England, is the weighing department, in which, with the rapidity of thought, and precision of apparatus, the weight of the hundredth part of a grain, the weight of the gold coins is determined. There are six weighing machines kept working by the same agency which applies all mechanical power in the bank, and three weighers attend to these. Not the hundredth part of a grain is weighed in motion, and an shaker, which weighs at a time, by the motion of the machine, into the scale. If they are of standard weight, they are thrown by the same mechanical intelligence into a box at the right hand side of the person who watches the operation; if they have lost the hundredth part of a grain, they are cast into a box on the left. Those which stand the test are put into bags of 1,000 sovereigns each, and those below par are sent by a machine, and sent back to the mint. Between one thousand and two thousand bags are thus sent out of the bank in circulation. The silver is put up in bags, each of £1,000 value, and the gold into bags of a thousand, and then those bags full of bullion are sent through a strongly guarded door, or rather window, into the treasury. The treasury is a gloomy apartment, fitted up with iron bars, and the windows are protected with huge locks and bolts, and which are perfectly fire-proof. Gold, silver, and paper money, ready for circulation, to the amount of £22,000,000 sterling, were in the treasury when we visited it. One of the gentlemen who had charge of the gold, placed 1,000 sovereigns in our hands, and at the same time pointed to seventy bags full of gold in a little recess which he had thrown open, making, in all, the modest sum of £7,000. He placed notes of half a million also upon his palm, which, no doubt, has his own sensation as the precious deposit trembled on its top.

H. W. Wilberforce, Esq., editor of the London Register, in his paper gives the following interesting item: "One day last week two steamships, crowded with colonial passengers, kept so close together on the hazy sea, that we were favored, that when they said to us, 'We are together, and we are together,' we were together, and we are together. A letter from Shanghai, dated the 10th inst., reports an eating house in that city had a few days before elapsed a visitor with eating a quantity of rice not paid for, when an angry dispute arose. A quarrel was the result, and the man was to be ripped open to ascertain whether or not he had swallowed the rice. It was done, and no rice found. A false charge had been made; and the man, who had been in the hospital for the head of the prisoner was quickly fished out when the magistrate was ready for another job.
