

H.M. Government Refuses To Abolish Death Penalty

LONDON (Reuters)—The government Thursday turned down a demand by Labor members of Parliament for abolition of the death penalty, following the controversial hanging of beautiful blonde murderess Ruth Ellis last week.

Home Secretary Gwilym Lloyd George said he did not think public opinion had shifted against the death penalty since the House of Commons voted down a proposal to abolish capital punishment last February.

Mrs. Ellis' execution for the murder of her wayward lover was assailed as too stringent by sections of the public and press and caused renewed demands for abolition of the death penalty. Today, Labor member Emanuel Shinwell noted the 28-year-old beauty's execution was not consistent with commuting to life imprisonment Wednesday of a death sentence passed on British Army Sgt. Frederick Emmett-Dunne.

Emmett-Dunne was sentenced in Germany for murdering the husband of the woman he later married. But the court martial sentence was commuted in line with an Anglo-German agreement ruling out the death penalty for British soldiers in Germany, where capital punishment does not exist.

Danger Of Swell To Ferry At Port Aux Basques

OTTAWA (CP)—Works Minister Winters disclaimed any responsibility Tuesday in the troublesome William Carson ferry situation, saying questions on the matter should be directed to Transport Minister Marler.

The \$11,243,000 Carson, built to ply between North Sydney, N.S., and Port aux Basques, Nfld., is to run temporarily between North Sydney and Argentina, Nfld.—190 miles further—pending construction of breakwaters to make the port aux Basques harbor safer in stormy weather.

Opposition members have described preparations for the ferry service as a fiasco. George Novan (PC—Digby-Annapolis-Kings) said previously it passes comprehension that federal engineers supposedly acquainted with the sea blasted away natural breakwaters and now find they have to replace them with artificial ones costing millions.

Tuesday, during House study of works department estimates, Mr. Winters said his department acted only as contractor for the transport department which had asked that a channel be dredged in Port aux Basques harbor for the ferry, to be operated by the CNR.

DIDN'T GO FAR ENOUGH He told Mr. Nowlan that \$200,548 was spent to dredge the channel according to transport department specifications. A total of 18,956 cubic yards were removed, part of it coming from underwater sections of two islands on either side of the channel.

The terminal and other facilities had been built by the transport department. Howard Green (PC—Vancouver Quadra) asked just what did go wrong that the ferry cannot operate as originally planned.

Mr. Winters said he doesn't think anything went wrong. It was possibly a matter of not going far enough, he added, but he did not elaborate.

NOT IN HOUSE Mr. Marler was not in the House at the time. Mr. Winters indicated the transport minister likely would make a statement when his estimates came up later.

The works minister said he believes the Carson could use Port aux Basques in good weather. But the government wanted to ensure more safety by delaying operations at that harbor temporarily.

Previously, John R. Baldwin, deputy transport minister, had said captains in the CNR coastal steamships service around Newfoundland.

Car Plant Opens

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—The Studebaker plant of the Studebaker-Packard Corp. resumed operation Wednesday after being shut down by a walkout that started last Thursday.

About 100 workers on the final assembly line walked out in a dispute over seniority rights. This made about 9,000 other employees idle.

Officials of the company and the CIO United Auto Workers announced Tuesday the company had broken off negotiations for settlement of the dispute until the workers returned to their jobs.

Both company and union officials called the walkout unauthorized.

Big Four Dine At Eden's Villa

GENEVA (Reuters)—British and Soviet leaders Tuesday night had a "very useful and serious" discussion on the German problem and European security, a British delegation source said.

They discussed these issues informally after a dinner given by Prime Minister Eden for Marshal Nikolai Bulganin and other Soviet leaders at Eden's lakeside villa here.

The British premier was host to Kremlin leaders attending the Big Four summit talks here.

After dinner the party moved into the drawing room, where they broke up into small groups.

Bulganin and Eden sat with Nikita Khrushchev, Communist party secretary, Harold Macmillan, British foreign secretary, and Vyacheslav Molotov, Soviet foreign minister, were in another part of the room.

The British official said the discussion ranged over world problems but centred mostly on Germany and European security.

Nothing Prevents Israeli Egyptian Gaza Agreement

GAZA, EGYPT, (AP)—Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada, United Nations truce chief in Palestine, told reporters Wednesday night

"there is nothing to prevent agreement" in the current Egyptian-Israeli talks to reduce tension in the troubled Gaza strip.

Burns, who had just presided at the eighth meeting since June 28 between the sides, added that the atmosphere Wednesday was "friendly but difficult." He declined to elaborate.

Burns stressed the parties were "getting closer each time we meet." He said he was more optimistic now than at the beginning of the talks, though some conflicts still had to be reconciled.

It was learned meanwhile that the sides have agreed to permit their senior officers to meet on border problems and have arranged for them to keep in telephone contact.

A UN communique issued after Wednesday's meeting spoke only of "further progress" achieved on the drafting of clauses "relating to representation and communication."
