An Alberta paper carries the following news item in regard to the Honourable T.W.L. Bowen, the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta. "Arrangements are nearly completed for the forthcoming flight to Europe by Hon. D.R. J.J. Bowen, lieutenant-governor of Alberta.

The governor will leave Edmonton for Vancouver by air at 7:30 p.m. June 16. On June 17 at 1:30 p.m., he leaves Vancouver by CPA for the flight over the North Pole arriving in Amsterdam June 18. After a brief tour of the Netherlands, he will fly to London on June 20, and remain there until July 5 when he will return to Amsterdam and board a plane for the return flight over the Arctic.
