Dawson, who went there on Tuesday last to examine the brig, "Isabella" which was wrecked on that island. We understand that they found the vessel lying full of water, and they report that she will be a total wreck, and that part of her cargo will be saved in a damaged condition. The tug made the run both up and down in excellent time, and the gentlemen aboard enjoyed themselves well, and are highly pleased with their trip.

HYMENEA.—Our genial and popular townsman, Mr. William H. MacNeill, has joined the grand army of benefactors, having taken for his life partner, on Friday evening last, Miss Jennie McKay, one of Prince Edward Island's most charming daughters. We wish the happy couple a long life of peace and prosperity. Mr. MacNeill, accompanied by his bride, left on Monday afternoon train for Charlottetown, where he is to assume the management of the branch Merchants Bank at that place, for a few weeks, during the absence of Mr. Arnaud; then he will go to Souris for a short time before returning home.—Journal.

CATTLE FOR GLASGOW.—On Monday evening a fine herd of cattle, numbering one hundred, were at Richmond ready for shipment on the "India" for Glasgow. These cattle are shipped by the following Sackville, N. B., men:—Mr. Josiah Wood, M. P.; Mr. Titus Hicks, Mr. W. F. George, and Mr. Harmon Humphrey. This is the fourth consignment of cattle which these men have sent to Great Britain during the present season. The "India" will also take for the same company nine hundred sheep. The cattle are from Cumberland and Westmorland Counties, and look well. Mr. Humphrey will go across in the "India."

THE Cheese Factory of Mr. Geo. E. Full, at Hunter River, is now in full blast. It commenced operations on the 14th of June, and, under the management of Mr. Henry Chandler, has already manufactured over two hundred cheese. The factory receives between five and six thousand pounds of milk per day, and from this manufactures ten cheese per day, each weighing about sixty-five pounds. Mr. Full is building a starch factory in connection with the cheese factory. The buildings, which are under construction, are: a dry house, 75x28; a potato house, 30x28; and a work-room, 70x25 feet. The starch factory will commence operations about the first of November. These factories will be a great advantage to the people of Hunter River.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

An Extensive Fire Raging.

NEW YORK, July 20—10.45 a. m. An extensive fire is in progress on the docks on the East River, Brooklyn, near Wall Street Ferry.

BROOKLYN, July 20—11 a. m.

The fire is now raging at Harbreeck stores, and has destroyed two sheds, a full-rigged ship and barque, supposed to be laden with seed oil. The surrounding shipping is in danger. Twelve firemen were badly injured by the roof of the pier falling.

Cholera in the East.

PORT SAID, July 19.

Cholera has increased at Alexandria. The number of deaths at Cairo yesterday from cholera was 68; at Damietta 32; at Mansourah; 24; at Sauranopod; 30 at Ghizeh; and 22 at Chibin.

ALEXANDRIA, July 20.

There is every appearance of cholera increasing. Business is entirely suspended.

The New Governor-General.

LONDON, July 20.

One hundred gentlemen of both political parties were present at dinner given the Marquis of Lansdowne yesterday, in honor of his appointment to the post of Governor-General of Canada.

Shooting at Wimbledon.

LONDON, July 9.

The shooting for the Elcho Shield, took place at Wimbledon to-day between the Irish, Scotch and English teams. The Irish riflemen were victorious. Their score was 1600 against 1589 for the Scotch, and 1564 for the Englishmen.

Going to Fight Cholera.

CAIRO, July 20.

The Egyptian Government has accepted the offer of England to send twelve Doctors to the infected districts.

Obituary.

ANDOVER, N. B., July 20.

Councillor S. A. Cameron, after a short illness, died yesterday at 4 p. m. His death has cast a gloom in the village.

The Iron Workers Strike.

LONDON, July 20.

It is expected that all the iron workers on strike in Staffordshire will resume work to-day, they having consented to the proposed reduction.

The Telegraph Operator's Strike.

NEW YORK, July 20.

The threatened strike of Western Union employees took place yesterday, when a vast army of men and women left their places at the operators' tables all along the wire. The nature of the demands of the strikers may be summarized as follows:— 1. Abolition of Sunday work, except as extra service. 2. Eight hours to be a day's work and seven hours a night's work. 3. Women and men to receive equal pay for equal work. 4. A general increase of fifteen per cent. on wages.

The directors of the Western Union were disposed to accede to some of the demands made by the operators, but refused to grant others, and an order was thereupon issued by the Executive Committee of the Operators Brotherhood that all the members of the order should leave their posts, which was forthwith obeyed, and nearly the whole body of operators in the United States and Canada, connected with the brotherhood, numbering, it is said, over twelve thousand, left their offices and have not returned to work yet.

NEW YORK, July 18—12.25 p. m.

The telegraphers in the W. Union office left their instruments at 12.05 p. m. They coolly went to the coat-rooms, donned their hats and coats, and left the building. About twenty-five men and thirty girls are left in the operating room.

On the appearance of the men on Broadway the crowd gave them three cheers, and the cheers were repeated again and again, as the elevators emptied the strikers by dozens.

BALTIMORE, July 19.

Only six operators remain in the Western Union Office here, all of whom are officers. In the main office of the Baltimore and Ohio Company only one remained, and in the American Rapid Office there are only a few female operators.

NEW YORK, July 20.

In the Philadelphia and Chicago offices the main body of the operators struck at noon. At Cincinnati only about half a dozen are left, and the officials claim to be able to fill the places of the strikers.

In Chicago it is estimated that 100 employees went out, including twenty females, leaving about forty in the operating room, with whom were twenty-one chief operators. The following has been received there dated New York 19:—

To Col. R. C. Clowry, General Superintendent, Chicago, Illinois:—

I am glad to hear favorable accounts from you of the condition of business in your division. I will honor your draft for any amount you may think necessary for proper care and protection of all operators who remain and those who come to your relief. Arrange to board and lodge them in the best manner possible. We are comfortably off in the East. There are about one hundred and fifty operators in our New York office with recruits coming in beyond my expectations. Other large offices are in very good shape, and business is fairly up. For the loyal men and women accept my thanks.

Telegraph Notes.

The Fifty-eighth Regiment has been ordered to Durban to protect British interests.

Phelan, who is held in Montreal on a charge of uttering forged bank notes, is to be extradited.

The Minister of Militia has promised that tenders will shortly be called for the construction of a new drill shed in Quebec city.

Cattle shippers and steamship owners at Montreal are in dispute as to whether freight should be charged for cattle that perish at sea.

There is much excitement in Winnipeg over the action of the Ontario Government in taking position of the disputed territory. People generally favor letting the Dominion and Ontario Governments fight it out. Attorney General Sutherland, on being interviewed, stated that there were Manitoba officials on the ground, and he expected them to do their duty. If they failed, then an appeal would be made to the Federal authorities to adjust any difficulties that might ensue.

The shooting for the Kolapore cup took place at Wimbledon on the 18th. The prize was competed for by teams representing England, Canada, the Jersey Islands, Guernsey and India. The teams were composed of eight men each. The ranges were 200, 500 and 600 yards, seven shots at each range. The cup was won by the English team. The scores were:—
