This hand comes from a special match staged last month in New York and won by the Cavendish Club of Philadelphia.

One of the most interesting hands of the match, which featured as participants many of the best-known names in bridge, was this deal. The hand was played at four tables.

Angling Regulations Should Be Familiar To Sportsmen

In an informative little pamphlet the Department of Industry and Natural Resources for Prince Edward Island summarizes Angling Regulations as follows: License fee, Resident \$1.00, Non-Resident \$3.00.

Open season, Salmon, June 5 to Oct. 31; Speckled or Brook Trout, April 15th, to September 30th. (National Park, June 15th to September 15th.) Rainbow Trout, July 1st, to October 31st.

It is unlawful, states the Department, to jig for any game fish. Use torches or other artificial lights in fishing for or catching Salmon or trout.

Trout export is prohibited. However, it is provided that, any non-resident fishing in waters of the Province may, upon leaving the Province, take away the lawful catch of two days fishing, if the shipment is accompanied by a certificate to that effect from either the local Fisher Officer in whose district the fish were caught, or from the local station agent adjacent to the locality in which they were caught.

At the second table, the bidding went as follows: South West North East 2 Pass 3 4 3 4 4 4 5 5 5 Pass 6 6 Dbl.

West led the ace of hearts. Declarer ruffed, drew trumps, cashed his clubs, and made thirteen tricks for a score of 1,250 points.

At the third table, the bidding was identical except that East doubled instead of West. The result was the same. Again West led the ace of hearts and declarer scored 1,250 points.

The Wests at the second and third tables, each having lost 1,450 points solely as the result of the heart leads, were ready to cut their respective throats.

At the fourth table, this was the bidding: South West North East 2 Pass 3 4 3 4 4 4 5 5 5 Pass 6 6 Dbl.

North-South were playing weak two bids. North (Harold Ogust, playing with this reporter), made the imaginative bid of three diamonds (forcing). He was out to stop the diamond lead if possible.

Again the West player led the ace of hearts. This time North-South scored 1,860 points. The opening lead cost this unfortunate West 2,36 points.

Fishing licenses are obtainable at the P. E. Island Travel Bureau, The Department of Industry and Natural Resources, Royal Canadian Mounted Police Offices, at various sporting goods stores, drug stores, and places where fishing equipment is sold.
