

**Local and Other Items.**

**SUNDAY SERVICES** crowded out. Will appear to-morrow.

**THE Hon. Jas. Skead and A. C. Bangs** are candidates for the mayoralty of Ottawa.

**THE Peticodiac Lumber Company** has sawn eight million feet of lumber this season.

**THE BAR.**—Ten law students were admitted to the Bar in Halifax on Wednesday last.

**THE steamer "Princess of Wales"** left this port for Pictou this morning. She will return with the mails to-night.

**ARRIVED.**—Brigt. Archibald, Mustard master, arrived at Queenstown on the 14th inst., in 13½ days from Georgetown.

**DIPHTHERIA.**—From the Sackville Post we learn that there were five funerals—the result of diphtheria—at Memramcook, N. B., on Saturday.

**FIRE.**—The Royal Hotel and block of buildings comprising the principal business portion of Newcastle, Ont., was burned on the night of the 12th inst. Loss \$40,000.

**A MOVEMENT** is on foot in Halifax to establish an Inebriate's Home for Females. The first meeting held was not very successful.

**Mr. Henry Hughes, Secretary,** having resigned, Mr. A. A. McKenzie was elected in his stead. A vote of thanks was tendered the late Secretary for his past services.

**ABANDONED.**—By cable to McDonald Bros. we learn that the brig *Aleppo*, of P. E. Island, from Liverpool, was abandoned at sea. The crew were saved and taken to Lisbon.

**RESIGNED.**—An Ottawa dispatch says Messrs. Duodney and Cunningham, of British Columbia, have resigned their seats in the House of Commons, having violated the Independence of Parliament Act.

**QUICK PASSAGE.**—By Cable to Peake Bros. & Co.: "Barkentine *Ethel Blanche* arrived at London on the 15th inst., making the run from here in 15 days." This, we believe, is the quickest passage on record.

**THE schr. "Edith Weir,"** which went ashore at Naufrage on Wednesday night last, is insured in the Merchants' Office of Canada for \$3,000. She will be sold for the benefit of the underwriters on Thursday next.

**A CHRISTMAS TREE** will be opened at St. Joseph's Convent, Pownal Street, this evening, and will be continued throughout the present week. Lotteries of various useful articles will take place on Wednesday evening. Their will be amusements of all kinds each evening.

**A HORRIBLE STORY.**—There has been great excitement at Bridgetown, Laurencetown, Kingstown, and in fact all around that part of the country over the case of a wealthy farmer in the upper part of Annapolis County, who, it was said, found a dead beef cow in his pasture, had the carcass dressed and sold it to a gentleman who is running a large lumber business in the country. The men in the country were poisoned from eating the meat. The matter has got into the Courts.—*Berwick Star.*

**SCHOONER GOES ASHORE AND BURNS.**—The schr. *Active*, McFarlane master, from Halifax for Margaree, C. B., in making the entrance at south end of the Strait of Canso in a thick snow storm, on the night of the 13th, struck on a ledge and filled. The water getting to lime in cargo, set the vessel on fire. It was blowing a gale at the time from S.S.E. The vessel and cargo burnt to ashes. The crew saved only a small portion of their clothing.

**BARQUENTINE LOST AND TWO MEN DROWNED.**—The barquentine "Jane Stewart" from St. John, bound to Sydney, struck on Cranberry Head, Wednesday night last, the 12th, in a snow storm. Stood off and was thrown on beam ends. The mainmast was cut away Thursday morning. The Captain, John Mitchell, and a seaman named Dorsay, of Dundee, got into a boat, when a sea struck her, throwing both of them out, and they were lost. The remainder of the crew were taken off yesterday at noon by the brig. "Arichat West," Capt. Lebuff, and brought to Glace Bay. The vessel was sinking when they left.

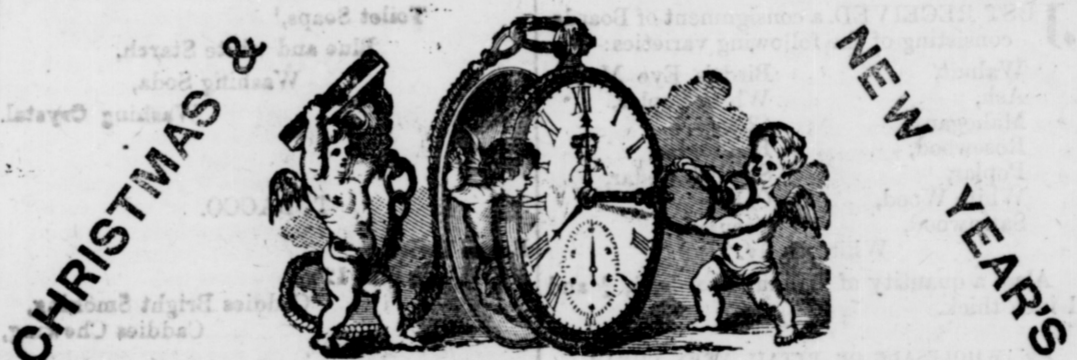
