Queen's Dressmaker Is Reported Ill

LONDON. (Reuters) — Norman Hartnell, the couturier who is making the Queen's Coronation dress, has been ordered by doctors to ease off work. The Queen's No. 1 dressmaker is nursing a suspected ulcer, brought on by the strain of his work for the last 18 months. He is now at his home near Windsor and living on a diet of eggs and milk puddings. His absence from his London workrooms will make no difference to work on dresses either for the Coronation or for the Ascot race meeting since these are all either finished or well under way. The exact design and style of the Queen's Coronation dress is still a closely guarded secret but the dress will be in either white or cream satin and probably, since it is Hartnell's speciality, intricately embroidered with diamonds, pearls or gold sequins.

Special Services At Georgetown And Sturgeon Churches

Two largely attended services were held in Georgetown in the morning and in the evening in Sturgeon on Sunday, May 10th in the United Churches. At 11 a.m. the service in Georgetown was conducted by the minister, Rev. W. A. Paterson. The guest preacher was Dr. C.M. Nicholson, Principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, who was representing the present Moderator of the United Church of Canada, Dr. A. A. Scott, at the United Church Exposition which was held in Charlottetown. Dr. Nicholson, who had been Moderator of the church 1950-1952, spoke in a most challenging and inspiring way on "Victory for the Church". It was no ordination sermon to any one congregation, but was the voice of the Moderator of the Universal Church to members and supporters of the church in any field—the smallest and the largest congregations throughout the Christian world. The conditions of this victory necessitated a world-wide outreach. The emphasis was on World Missions, not as a privilege or a personal duty, but a Christian duty—a command of the Lord, which could not be ignored. This emphasis on world-wide evangelism could only be realised by personal consecration to the Christian way of life. Victory could be possible only by the love of God in the hearts of men everywhere, which would bring victory into every sphere of life, into the smallest communities. He called for a higher standard of Christian living, and vividly portrayed conditions in Korea where he visited last year, and in contrasting conditions there with the conditions on this Island, he maintained that all must consider men everywhere their brothers, and that victory was possible through sacrifice, intelligence and sympathetic understanding of other people. A Mother's Day service was held in Milltown Cross in the afternoon. In the evening at 7:30 p.m. an event looked forward to for considerable time took place in the Sturgeon United Church. It was the "re-opening of the church." Extensive renovations had taken place in the late autumn and early winter and the late autumn and early winter of the work, services were resumed but owing to winter and early spring conditions of weather and roads, the formal opening was delayed. Rev. D. N. MacPherson, chairman of Prince Edward Island Presbytery, and Minister of Murray Harbour-Murray River Pastoral Charge, was the preacher. He took as his text Isaiah 51:1: "Look unto the Rock whence ye are hewn, and to the hole of the pit whence ye are digged"—a forceful and challenging address. The music was rendered by the Murray River choir of 14 voices—the regular hymns and anthems and a trio which were rendered very acceptably, and which abundantly merited the thanks of the large congregation present.

B.C. Flying Boat Crash Is Mystery

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (CP)—A fatal flying boat crash here last Monday has investigators baffled. They have even considered the possibility the amphibian hit a whale. Stewardess Clara Langen, 25, of Humboldt, Sask., and RCMP constable Stephen Kaspar, 26, of Alton, Sask., were killed when the Canadian Pacific Airlines Canaco crashed on landing in the harbor. Investigators have failed to find out why the aircraft "porpoised"—jumped into the air—after landing. A CPA official said the boat made a fine landing, ran about 100 feet along the surface, porpoised and crashed on her nose.
