

Canadians Perform Well At Pan American Games

CHICAGO (CP)—Canadian performers had one of their best afternoons in top international competition in years Saturday as the Pan American Games plunged in earnest into the track and field events.

Although the United States, paced by a team of Olympic champions, continued to dominate the winner's stand, Canadian athletes showed unexpected strength.

Led by a contingent from the Western provinces, Canada sent five runners through elimination heats into the final events.

Three sprinters from Vancouver—Heather Campbell, Valerie Jerome and Sally McCallum—qualified for Sunday's 100-metre final.

Half-mile runner Sig Olemann of Vancouver and Stan Wolford of Toronto also survived the elimination heats for their event.

George Stulac of Toronto, considered to be one of Canada's best all-around active athletes, amassed a total of 3,423 points in the decathlon.

THIRD IN FIELD
With five more events to go in this gruelling test, Stulac, a 26-year-old high school teacher who won the Canadian decathlon a championship with 5,640 points, was standing third in the eighth round. He trailed David Edstrom of the United States with 4,084 points and Hector Thomas of Venezuela with 3,471 points.

Here's how other Canadians made out Saturday.
Maureen Revy of Regina, running in the final of the women's 800-metre sprint, finished fifth.

The 21-year-old University of Saskatchewan girl, a member of Canada's 1956 Olympic team was only one-tenth of a second behind the winner, Isabelle Daniels of the U. S. Miss Daniels equalled the games record in picking up the gold medal for the event.

Valerie Jerome, 15-year-old high school student from Vancouver who is the youngest member of Canada's large entry in the games, got off to a good start in the event, but couldn't maintain her pace and finished seventh in the field of eight.

VAULTERS OUTHOUSE
In the final track event of the day, Bob Reid of Vancouver and Dave Linekin of Winnipeg placed sixth and seventh respectively in the pole vault. The winner was Don Bragg of the U. S. with 15 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

The two Canadians vaulted 13-3 but Reid got sixth place because he needed only two vaults to clear the pole, compared with three by Linekin.

In fencing, Canada's team lost its two final matches against Chile and the U. S. after winning its first four. The two losses left the Canadian team in third place in the final standings of the round-robin competition.

Canada's women's basketball team, winner by a close 46-43 close over Mexico Friday night, dropped a 57-28 decision to a sharpshooting, close-checking Chilean team.

The Dominican Republic outlasted Canada's men's volleyball team in a five-game match, 14-15, 15-13, 15-9 and 15-3.

Canada was handicapped by the loss of its captain, Lembit Aedma, who was sidelined indefinitely with a sprained ankle.

Winners Saturday for the U. S. besides Miss Daniels and Bragg, were:
Josh Culbreath, 51.2 in the 400-metre hurdles for a games record.
Ray Norton, 10.3 in the 100 metres.
And Irvin Robertson in the broad jump with a leap of 26 feet two inches.

TAKE WEIGHTLIFTING
Another first for the U. S. came in the flyweight division of weightlifting where Isaac Berger broke four games records when he lifted a total of 782 1/2 pounds. His efforts were 237 pounds in the press, 242 1/2 in the snatch, and 303 in the jerk, all records.

By the end of Saturday's events the U. S. had 10 gold medals, six silver medals for second place together with a tie for a seventh, and four third-place bronze medals. Argentina and Chile each had a gold medal. The West Indies Federation showed two seconds and three thirds in competition. Canada had a second and a third.

Off the field, there still was some dissension. A storm was calmed, however, when Argentina—which had threatened to withdraw from the games—agreed to remain when sufficient shells appeared for all the teams to practise. The rowing dates were set back to Sept. 4-6, near the tailend of the games, to give the Argentinians sufficient time to practise.

The Lions scored two runs in the opening stanza, one in the third and one in the seventh. The defensive feature of the game was a double play by the Lions in the eighth inning, shortstop Buck Whitlock snaring a grounder at second and firing it to first-sacker Kip Ready for two outs.

Ivan 'Fats' Connors called the balls and strikes in both games. The fourth game of this series will be played tonight at the Old Diamond with action slated to get underway at 5:45 sharp.
