Gardner, a pubkeeper, said pressure of business and age forced his retirement.

"The Tull fight was the biggest hiding I ever received in boxing," he said.

Alberton horses raced to victory in both the two and three year olds pacing events; the Charlottetown entry Robert Lee, headed the summary in the two year old trot, and Ginger Worthy owned by Mr. George MacDonald proved the best of the three year old trotters.

Every race on the card was loaded with talent, and no one horse lay over his field enough to be a top-heavy favorite.

Flicka McElwyn posted a mild upset by outfooting the favorite Bell Hop B in the two year old pace but her performance was convincing and she was in control all the way in the two heats raced.

Impressive too was James C. Burns' Just Rita in her triumph over a fine field of three year old pacers. Pressed by Royal Bank, of Truro, by Vernita Pearl, the Alberton mare stood off all challenges and won all three heats by close margins. Her last heat was the fastest 2:15 3/5. The other two were in 2:15 4/5.

The two year old trot was a battle between George MacDonald's Ginger Worthy of Mermaid and Mrs. James Poulton's New Forest. Ginger Worthy after dropping the first heat, trotted beautifully to lead his field in the next two.

To Question Sugar Ray About Plans

MONTREAL, Sept. 10—(CP)—The National Boxing Association will ask Ray Robinson what he intends to do about defending his world middleweight boxing championship.

Robinson's case came before the N.B.A. which concluded its annual meeting here today. It was listed on the agenda as "Robinson's non-defence of title".

Retiring president Dave Rochon of Montreal noted when the matter came up Tuesday that Sugar Ray had not put his world title on the line during the last year.

Discussion started with a suggestion from the floor of the meeting that Robinson be suspended. The next proposal was that the N.B.A. write a letter to Robinson advising him to defend the middleweight crown within 60 days.

Finally, the meeting decided to write the fighter and ask him what he intends to do about a title defence.

The Canadian Press reported in error that the N.B.A. had decided Robinson should defend the title within 60 days.

Dodgers Stretch Lead; Yanks And Indians Win

Brooklyn Dodgers stretched their National League lead over the hotly-pursuing New York Giants to 4½ games Wednesday night by sweeping a doubleheader from Chicago Cubs, 4-1 and 6-2, after the Giants had nipped Pittsburgh Pirates 3-2 in a 13-inning day game.

New York Yankees maintained their one-game lead in the close American League race, defeating St. Louis Browns 6-1 while Cleveland Indians nipped a ninth-inning rally to edge Philadelphia Athletics 3-2.

Righthanders Johnny Rutherford and Carl Erskine pitched the Dodgers to their two victories. A four-run uprising against Turk Lown and Dutch Leonard in the seventh inning won the opener for Brooklyn. Duke Snider and Andy Patko batted in all but one of the Dodger runs in the nightcap.

Erskine yielded seven hits, the same number the Dodgers collected off five Cub hurlers, but Carl was strong in the pinches, striking out seven batters. Rutherford pitched effectively until removed for a pinch-hitter in the seventh inning of the opener, spacing seven hits.

Dressen Says Dodgers Will Hold Lead

NEW YORK, Sept. 10—(AP)—Confident Chuck Dressen said in a magazine article published today "The Dodgers won't blow it again," but he hedged a bit when interviewed about the story.

"Things have happened to our pitching staff that we didn't visualize then," the Dodgers' manager said when asked about the article carrying his byline "As told to Stanley Frank" in the Sept. 13 issue of the Saturday Evening Post. "Of course, when our pitchers came up with lame backs that changed things a lot."

The Dodgers "are a better ball club," Dressen said in the article written July 16 when Brooklyn led New York by five games.

"There's better because the glaring weakness that cost them the pennant last year has been strengthened—the lack of reserve strength."

Dressen said the Brooks' record for the first half of 1952 was a four-game improvement on their 1951 record and added the big difference has been George Shuba in the outfield, Bob Morgan in the infield and pitchers Billy Loes, Ben Wade and Joe Black.

Reminded that the Dodgers' 10 1-2 game lead of Aug. 26 this year had shrunk to four games before today's contests, Dressen explained that the article was "based on us having more (pitching) strength."

He then listed the ailing pitchers and their injured members: Clem Labine (shoulder), Johnny Ruthenford (stiff shoulder), Carl Erskine (back and elbow), Ralph Branca (back) and Preacher Roe (back).

"The big thing is that our pitchers haven't been able to take their regular turns due to injuries," he continued. "And we can't bring up replacements because our (minor league) clubs are in the playoffs."

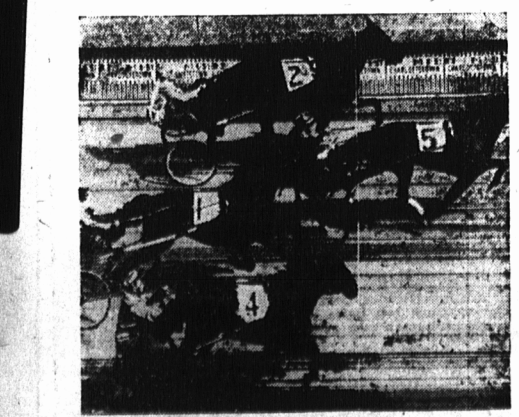
