47,000 Islanders Tested For TB By Heaf Method Dr. Found Reports

Since August 1956 47,000 Islanders have been tested for tuberculosis by the Heaf Method, Dr. E.M. Found, provincial director of TB control and medical superintendent of the provincial sanatorium said yesterday.

In his annual report as medical advisor to the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League Dr. Found stated that of the total number examined 20,000 cases had been processed during 1958 alone. Tests were carried out at Summerside, Souris, five centres in Queens County and practically every section of Prince County.

In all a total of 169 Island school districts were covered, he said. Positive reaction was 36 per cent.

Other reports were given by the director of the out-patient clinics, Dr. W.R. Stewart and the League treasurer, Everett MacFarlane.

With the executive of Mr. Coulson, all were re-elected to the same office held during the previous year.

Dr. Found also reported that the local mobile unit had taken 9,505 chest films during the year. Net result of the entire program since 1956 was the discovery of 19 new cases, 16 of which were successfully treated in the sanatorium and returned to their homes.

95 SPARED
"Since it is generally conceded that each unknown case is liable to spread the disease to five others over a comparatively short period, we can state that 95 citizens of Prince Edward Island have been spared from contracting tuberculosis since August, 1956 through the medium of the tuberculin survey," Dr. Found said.

Dr. Found noted that there were four deaths from tuberculosis in the Province during 1958. Including referrals by family physicians and survey discoveries, there were 104 individuals admitted for hospital treatment of one form or another of TB during the year.

He pointed out that contrary to the trend of 10 years ago, the disease today appeared to victimize more middle-aged and older men instead of youths, particularly young women.

"For example, as of now we have under treatment at the Provincial Sanatorium 12 children ranging in age from 12 years to 19 months, three adults between the ages of 21 and 30, while the average age of the remainder of our patients is 35, five of these over 60," he said.

"You may be surprised to learn that excluding Summerside and Charlottetown since August 1956 some 982 voluntary workers contributed about 4,910 working hours to the Tuberculin and X-ray Survey.

"Presuming that each voluntary worker passed on to ten of their friends and neighbors up-to-date knowledge regarding tuberculosis, we can boast that 9,820 of our citizens have received valuable Public Health Education since the community-wide Tuberculin and X-ray Survey was instituted three years ago.

"COMBINED EFFORTS"
"The activities of your league for 1958 as outlined represent the combined efforts of your Executive, the Health Department, Miss Hannah Turner, P.H.N., Tuberculin and X-ray Survey Nurse, Mrs. St. Clair Trainor, R.N. and Mrs. John Cameron, R.N., Assistant Organizers and Assistant Clinic Nurses, Dr. W.R. Stewart, Medical Director of the Out-Patient Stationary Clinics and his nurse, Miss Erma Tait, R.N., Joseph MacKinnon, and Mr. Wallace Thompson, X-ray Technicians. The goodwill and co-operation of the District Public Health Nurses has been invaluable.

"MARVELOUS BAND"
"The success of our survey can be largely attributed to the marvelous band of voluntary workers who have sacrificed time and energy in the interest of the health of their communities by canvassing the homes and assisting at the clinics, Dr. Found continued.

"Whenever there was a Women's Institute or a Catholic Women's League community co-operation was assured. The attendance at our Organization meetings was exceptional and as the voluntary workers became in the Survey, it was obvious that more favourable attitudes towards community efforts of the Health Department and the Tuberculosis League were engendered.

"In short, people learn by doing."

Music Festivals May Meet In City

A strong possibility that the 1961 annual meeting and conference of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals would be held in Charlottetown was voiced last night at an executive meeting of the P.E.I. Association by president Gordon Bennett.

Mr. Bennett made the statement during his report on the tenth annual conference of the national body held in Toronto this year.

Proposed dates for next year's Music Festival here were announced by the association secretary, Mrs. Wendell Wood. The dancing and coral reading section is scheduled to be held March 31st to April 2nd and the Music Festival proper from April 26th to 30th inclusive.

The festival sessions are scheduled to be held concurrently at Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague. The adjudicators named are: Frank Wharam of the Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto; Earl Terry, London, Ont.; David Ouchterlony, Toronto and Noel Cox of England.

The syllabus convenor, Dorothy Cullen, reported that the work on the syllabus was well underway and would be ready for printing in the near future.

The meeting held in the Library of Prince of Wales College, was largely attended, with all three counties being well represented.

Parkdale's Water Supply Said 100 Per Cent Pure

The department of health has confirmed that the Parkdale water supply is 100 per cent pure. Tests have been carried out following the incidence of a polio case in the Charlottetown suburban community.

The health department's sanitary engineering division took samples of the water supply from various outlets throughout the village and came up with a 100 reading.

George Newman who is in charge of the village's water and sewerage commission, says the report is very gratifying to all the citizens.

The water and sewerage system has only been in operation since last fall and before that the danger of an epidemic outbreak was always prevalent, he said. Two wells and a 200,000 gallon reservoir supply the needs of the community.

A new by-law being drafted is believed to make it mandatory for all residents to have their home water and sewerage systems connected with the village's system.

The existing Potato Marketing Board was actually voted out of existence by plebiscite in 1957. However, because an authorized agency such as this was necessary to negotiate an agreement with the railway on the "agreed charge" on potato shipments by rail the then board was continued in operation.

It could not collect any fees and remained in force only through operating costs being paid by the provincial government.

During the period of its pro tem operation the board was called on to handle the support price payments made to producers last year by the federal government.



TO GERMANY

Hospital Admissions Normal On First Day

No increase in the rate of hospital admissions was noted yesterday by the three larger hospitals of the province, at Summerside and Charlottetown. The out-patient departments, including X-ray treatments report similar conditions.

At the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where 188 beds are available, it is reported that only 65 per cent of these are occupied and that no unusual advance bookings are registered.

At the Charlottetown Hospital admissions were normal, but it was felt that the next day or two might well change the picture greatly.

In Summerside, after midnight there were 96 adults and children in the 119 bed institution. Since midnight seven admissions, mostly expectant mothers were taken in.

In all three hospitals a low occupancy was experienced during the months of August and September. This may have been due to the pending hospital insurance plan but hospital authorities believe it was caused by the fact that a large percentage of doctors take holidays at that time.

P.E.I. Blue Cross Members Covered By New Contracts

With the advent of the provincial hospital insurance plan in Prince Edward Island, Maritime Blue Cross - Blue Shield subscribers have been re-enrolling under one of several optional contracts which the operators of the plan made available to members and which became effective Oct. 1.

The Blue Cross Hospital Plan now offers supplementary benefits to subscribers which covers semi-private hospital accommodation and many other extras not covered by the provincial hospital plan.

Subscribers who also have Blue Shield Medical Service have their doctor bills covered as well as their supplementary hospital benefits.

Their basic hospital service is provided by the provincial plan. For family membership in Blue Cross and Blue Shield the introduction of the provincial hospital plan has meant a reduction in Blue Cross rates in most cases it was stated.

Rev. Canon J. T. Ibbott Named Anglican Archdeacon Of P.E.I.

The appointment of Rev. Canon J.T. Ibbott, rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Charlottetown as Venarable Archdeacon of P.E. Island was announced yesterday by Right Rev. R.H. Waterman, Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia and Right Rev. W. W. Davis, D.D., coadjutor bishop, in a joint communique.

Installation of Rev. Canon Ibbott as Archdeacon will take place towards the end of October at a place in the province not yet determined. The appointment will not entail a change of residence.

Rev. Canon Ibbott is a native of Rosendale, England, but came to Canada as a boy and received his early education in Ontario schools. He worked for a time for the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the T. Eaton Co. and was one of the first cadets to enter the Royal Flying Corps on its formation in 1917. Following the war he entered Wycliffe College, Toronto, from which he graduated in 1923.

Canon Ibbott at that time went to Halifax as assistant to the late Archbishop Armitage at St. Paul's Church there, and for a short time remained as acting rector. He later held pastorates in St. Stephen and Woodstock, N.B., before returning to Halifax in 1939. He was called to St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown Aug. 1, 1944 and inducted Nov. 2 of that year.

He was appointed Canon of St. Peter's Cathedral here on Nov. 28, 1952.

Ven. Archdeacon Ibbott has one son, Rev. J.D.S. Ibbott, who is rector of the Parish of Combermere in the Diocese of Ottawa.

Companies Give Explanation Of Supplementary Benefits

A local representative of a large insurance company having many groups in force on the Island, has stated that as far as his company is concerned, arrangements have already been made to integrate its insurance with the provincial hospital plan through supplementary benefits.

In other words, where the company was previously reimbursing for \$10 daily hospital board they are now going to be responsible for a smaller sum to help take care of the differential between ward and semi-private room services.

Under the supplementary benefits his company will still reimburse for doctors' fees, x-rays and other expenses not covered under the provincial plan.

"Insurance company plans," the spokesman stated, "are usually tailor-made to suit each group's requirements and vary in many ways. The type of plan depends on what the employer and employee are willing to contribute."

"Most insurance plans" he said, "include T.B. and mental treatment and under the new regulations, the insurance companies could only pay for hospital board up to the amount specified in the individual plan."
