

CC Head Declares Gov't Is Too Busy In Industry

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—The president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce said Tuesday that Canadians have been carried "too far and too fast along the road to big government."

Raymond Dupuis of Montreal, elected last month at the association's annual meeting, told a service club (Rotary) that "big government" poses two threats: Government competition with business and high taxation to meet its spending.

His text was released to the press before delivery.

Government had invaded Canadian business, he said, through 35 crown corporation employing 146,400 persons. The number of employees in Canadian crown corpor-

ations had doubled during the last 16 years.

If the trend continued the foundation of the country's free economy could be shaken. Many government enterprises, begun as crown corporations during the Second World War, had lingered "long after the emergency had passed."

INCREASES COSTS

"The invasion of government into business constitutes unfair competition with business, demands large sums of money, and increases the cost of government," he said. "An even greater threat is that once people believe they can turn to the government in every difficulty the springs of initiative and self-reliance run dry."

Government's only role in economic affairs, should be to stimulate development, ease the impact of economic fluctuations and profit anti-social excesses.

"The immediate effect of a big government is the increasing demand for revenues which finally place an insupportable burden on the country's business. If business falters or grinds to a stop because of the high costs which eliminate markets, then everyone suffers."

Canadians last year paid in taxes 31.2 cents on every dollar earned, against 22.4 cents in 1939 and 17.3 in 1929.

Hope for decreased taxes depended upon a rising national productivity and a resistance to increases in fixed-tax commitments.

Mr. Dupuis urged a keen interest in politics and the business of Parliament to "stem the tide of big government."

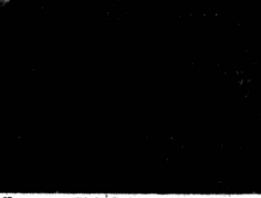
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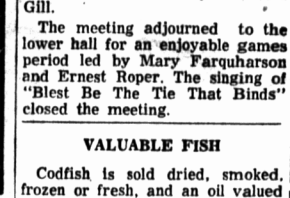
