CAPTAIN DAVIDSON, of the Royal Military College, Kingston, will inspect the Charlottetown Engineers, on Thursday next, the 22nd inst. The inspection will be held at Belvidere, on the Lower St. Peter's Road, and will consist of infantry movements in close and extended order and in the manual and firing exercises. The engineering work will consist of the construction of an encampment for the Company, supposed to be on the line of march in the midst of a hostile people, but not in the neighborhood of an armed force. The Company will be divided into squads, each under the command of a N. C. officer. Some of the squads will construct the huts of the officers, N. C. officers and men; one squad will prepare the spring for the water supply; another squad will prepare the field kitchen, and another squad the sanitary arrangements. The defenses will be prepared under the supervision of an officer.

The Monetary Times remarks that the Canadian Cotton Mills, in spite of the combination do not, as a rule, appear to be paying excessive dividends. The Montreal Cotton Company has paid three dividends of two per cent. since February, six per cent. in seven months; the Hochelaga is paying 2 1/2 per cent., and the Canada Cotton Company 3/4 per cent. quarterly. These results have been obtained under a combination which was recently renewed. There had been an undue development of this industry, with the usual result, an excessive output. Destructive competition was averted, and combination took its place. The public is suspicious of such combinations, and it is well to know precisely what ground there is for the popular objection. If no part of the earnings is being carried to capital, in any form, the profits can scarcely be regarded as excessive.

More Harvesting Machines.

The Walter A. Wood M. & R. M. Co., of Hoosac Falls, New York, have sent three new self-binding harvesting machines to the Island for the purpose of experimenting and seeing what improvements can be made before commencing manufacturing for another year.

The first machine we shall notice is the straw binder, which twists its own bands, ties the sheaf and turns it out as the machine goes on. It is quite a novelty to see this machine at work, as it is said to do its work so well that it does not miss more than one in two hundred bundles. The inventor, Mr. George Howe, is here with the machine.

The second is a new light steel and wood frame twine binder. It is very light and simple in construction, and uses an endless chain with hooks instead of canvas to elevate the grain to the knottor; it only uses a small canvas on the platform. Mr. Waters, who invented the machine, is here seeing if there is room for improvement in the knottors.

The third binder is also light, and has but one canvas to bring the grain up to the knottor. The inventor, Mr. Holman, is here with the machine.

Mr. Russell Parsons, Vice-President of the Company, is here superintending the operations of the different machines. He is accompanied by a full staff of machinists. The machines can be seen at work in different fields round about the Winsloe Road during the next week. Messrs. A. Home & Co. are the general agents for the above firm.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Annoying the Governor-General.

SHERBROOK, Sept. 14. The Eastern Townships Exhibition was formally opened to-day by the Governor-General. The stables containing 30 horses, valued at about \$30,000, were burned last night. During the speech of the Governor-General a man giving the name of Michael Lynch, of Boston, interrupted the speaker. His Excellency was speaking on the advisability of encouraging the proper kind of emigration from England and Ireland, upon which Lynch called out, "What about pauper immigration?" No notice was taken of this interruption, but almost immediately afterwards he added, "You are a tyrant, sir, the greatest tyrant of Ireland. What about Luggacurran?" The interrupter was at this juncture pushed off the platform and taken into custody, charged with disturbing the peace.

The Scott Act Convention.

TORONTO, Sept. 14. The Scott Act convention closed to-day. Arrangements for a campaign against all repeal movements were made. It was decided to open a supplementary campaign fund, and all the temperance people will be asked to subscribe. A lecture bureau of five members was also formed. A long time was spent discussing the formation of a third party, and it was finally resolved "that this convention is of opinion that the present juncture is peculiarly favorable for the organization of a new party, with prohibition as chief plank in its platform."

Warlike Talk.

PARIS, Sept. 14. At a military banquet at Toulouse, last evening, Gen. Breart declared that France now knew her strength, and that she was ready and awaited revenge. M. Coles, member of the Chamber of Deputies, said the recent mobilizing experiments showed the army in a position to give France the revenge for which she impatiently waited.

The Anarchists to Hang.

OTTAWA, Ill., Sept. 14. The Supreme Court this morning delivered an opinion in the Anarchist cases, affirming the judgement of the court below. The execution is to take place on November 11th.

Another Victim.

DUBLIN, Sept. 14. Casey, one of the wounded during the recent melee at Mitchellstown, is dead. On Sunday he swore to a deposition identifying the constable who shot him.

Horses Seized.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 14. The Customs officials at Regina have seized two hundred horses on a ranch near Regina for non-payment of duties.

Waterville, Me., claims to have raised the first horse that ever trotted a mile inside of three minutes in America. The event is alleged to have taken place in Boston in 1818, when a horse named Svarrow trotted a full mile in 2.57.

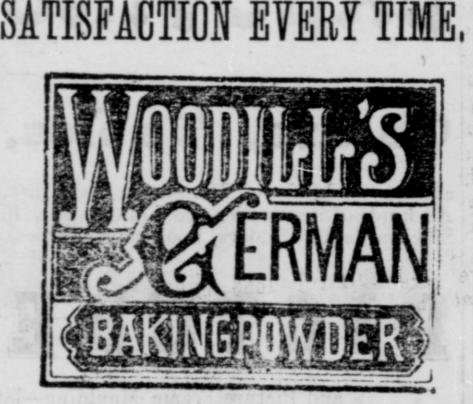

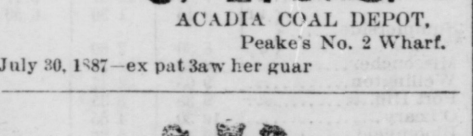
