

TRAVELLER'S GUIDE.

For the convenience of those who may have occasion to travel, we publish below a reliable Traveller's Guide, which gives in brief the different means of leaving the city together with the hours of departure of the various trains and steamers:—

SCANDALOUS!

We never credited the present Government with any desire to manage the affairs of the country otherwise than in the interests of themselves and their friends.

But our Government was not satisfied. They have covered the country with an overwhelming number of incompetent, hungry officials.

Well, we can tell them. There is one step more which might be taken. True it is one which a corrupt and venal Government only would take.

Mr. James Wisner owns a property which was assessed at \$6000. This may or may not have been a fair valuation.

Now, if Mr. Wisner had been a supporter of the Opposition, he would have had to put his hand in his pocket and pay his Assessment—whether he liked it or not.

We assure our readers that we have verified the facts. We went to the Treasurer's Office. The Assistant Treasurer—Mr. Arthur Newbery—while he declined to shew us the alteration, admitted it had

been made, but justified it under the 57th Section of the Statute. This section we give, as well as the one next following:—

LXVII. If property belonging to one person shall be assessed against another person, or if the name of any person liable to be assessed shall have been omitted in the Assessment list, or if any error shall occur in the preparation, appraisement, addition, or apportionment of any part of the said list, the Assessors may correct such error and supply such omissions at any time.

LXVIII. The decisions of the Assessors, or a majority of them, when revising, setting, and correcting the lists shall be binding, final and conclusive, and no appeal shall be therefrom to any court, nor shall any rate or assessment, or any decision in relation, or any proceeding touching any such rate or Assessment, be removed certiorari to any court on any ground.

Now, it will be evident to anyone not an interested person or a blockhead, that it never was the intention of the Legislature to allow an appeal to the assessors against their own judgment, and permit them to make reductions in their valuations, alleging that there had been a mistake.

We are not by any means prepared to say that Mr. Henry Beer's services are at the disposal of any over-taxed rate-payer. Not by any means. But we have excellent reason for believing that his services may be procured as counsel in this novel mode of appeal, if the tax-payer is an adherent of the faction in power and is still prepared to give them his countenance and support.

Hanlan to be Matched Against the World.

MONTREAL, Oct. 16.

Flour quiet; but prices steady for fall wheat, flour "spring extra." Wheat firm, but business light, owing to scarcity of freight room.

The boat race yesterday was won by Hanlan by 400 yards. The first report was incorrect. Hanlan will now be matched against any man in the world.

The Commercial editor of the Herald was arrested to-day for criminal libel, and is now in jail until bailed out.

The failures in the Dominion, to date, are four hundred less than last year.

French Elections.

DICTATOR McMAHON ANSWERED BY THE PEOPLE

130 Majority Against McMahon.

THE TALK IN PARIS.

PARIS, Oct. 15.

The elections are tranquil; so far 87 republican and 24 official candidates are known to be elected. The following have been successful: Jules Grevey, moderate republican, ex-president of the Chamber of Deputies, vice M. Thiers; Albert Grevy, moderate republican, re-elected; Bonnet Duvernier, now in prison for libelling McMahon [in place of Pascal Duprat, moderate republican]; Paul De Cassagnac, government candidate, re-elected; Louis Blanc, radical republican, re-elected.

LATER

One hundred and sixty results are now known; 107 Republicans and 47 Conservatives are elected. Of the Republicans, 102 belong to the "363" who voted for the order of the day censuring a dissolution. The following are elected: M. Rouher, Bonapartist, Government candidate, re-elected; Richard Waddington, moderate Republican, defeating the Government candidate; M. DeDelamarre, re-elected; Baron Haussman, Bonapartist, Government candidate, defeating Prince Napoleon, late member; Gambetta has been elected—3,812 against his opponent's 1,611.

LATER.

PARIS, Oct. 15.

There have been 161 Republicans and 71 Conservatives elected. Four cases of second ballots will be necessary. The Republicans lost 24 seats formerly occupied by them, and the Conservatives lost 10.

Jules Grevy is elected in the arrondissement Opdale, department of Jura. He defeated the Government candidate, M. Pecot de Aligne; as well as M. Pares defeating M. De Fourton, Bonapartist, the present Minister of Interior, Government candidate.

STILL LATER.

PARIS, Oct. 15.

Three hundred results are now known, 197 Republican, of which 180 belong to the "363" of the late Chamber, 99 are Conservatives of whom 64 are re-elected and four require second ballot. The Republicans lose 27 seats, but gain 13. For an actual majority of Chamber 267 votes are required. Three hundred and seventy-five Arrondissements return 248 Republicans and 117 MacMahonists. Second ballots are required in eight cases. The Republicans lose 30 seats, but gain 15 who have been re-elected.

In the final circular to prefects on Saturday, M. DeFourton, Minister of the Interior, after announcing Gambetta's second sentence and declaring that 300 constituencies are secure for the Government candidates, said: "The Bourse, meanwhile rises, thus offering its confidence in the Government's success." A syndicate of brokers also telegraphed to the provinces on Saturday: "Marshal's success is regarded as certain; Rentes 105 fr., 95c." It is true that figure was touched during Saturday, probably through the efforts of that syndicate, and for the purpose of influencing elections, but when the Bourse closed Rentes were 105 fr. 25c., and business was done on the boulevards later at 105 fr. 120. Now that the elections are over peacefully, and the Republican success is undoubted, there is nothing worthy of remark in the contrast with official declaration of Saturday that business was done in Rentes on the boulevards in the morning at 105 fr. 90 cents.

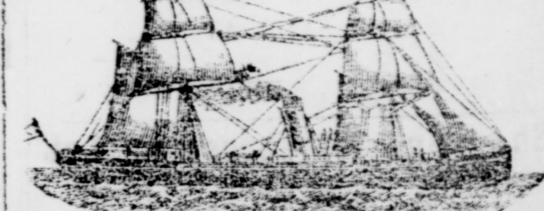
