## Candidates Are Urged For City Civic Election

Concern over the shortage of candidates in the forthcoming civic election in Charlottetown was expressed yesterday by the Charlottetown Board of Trade in a letter to The Evening Patriot.

Stating that there will apparently be no contest in the election except for the water commission slate, the board says the situation "should provoke serious thought" by city taxpayers.

The letter continues: "The annual budget of the City of Charlottetown is now over the \$2,000,000 mark. A two-million dollar business in any line of commercial endeavor requires the constant attention of people skilled in the practice of sound administration and familiar with all the phases of the industry to which they must apply their talents.

"In bygone years we have witnessed sharply contested elections for our City Council in every ward. These contests usually produced a Council comprised of people well qualified to handle the affairs of City Hall. This need has not been lessened in this day, when the complexity of municipal finances and government demands the constant vigilance of the very best representatives of the people."

Expressing the opinion that all citizens "must surely be concerned with the amount of taxes asked of them and the purposes for which their money is to be spent," the letter urges other citizens to place their names before the electorate in order to assure a strongly contested election.

The local paper was competing with daily newspapers of less than 25,000 circulation all across the country. There were 96 papers in all considered for the John A. MacLaren Awards, with the Patriot winning honorable mention for its sports page.

W.J. Hancock, general manager and publisher, received advance notice of the honor done to The Patriot in a letter from G.G. Sinclair, president of the MacLaren advertising agency which sponsored the MacLaren Awards competition instituted three years ago.

The letter said: "It gives me great pleasure to inform you that in this year's John A. MacLaren Daily Newspaper Awards competition The Evening Patriot was given honorable mention for its sports page.

### Hamilton, Kingston Papers Selected As Top Winners

TORONTO (CP)—The Hamilton Spectator and Kingston Whig-Standard are the 1964 winners of the John A. MacLaren newspaper awards for typography and appearance.

Entries from 96 Canadian dailies were considered, editions of last Nov. 5 being the basis for judgment.

President G. G. Sinclair of MacLaren Advertising Company Limited, the sponsor, said the judges placed Hamilton Spectator first among newspapers with more than 25,000 circulation and the Kingston Whig-Standard first among papers with less than 25,000 circulation.

Awards for individual pages were made in the 1964 competition for the first time, as follows:

Over 25,000—Front page, Windsor Star; editorial page, Montreal Star; sports page, Hamilton Spectator; women's page, Toronto Globe and Mail. (Windsor Star won the award for over-all excellence for 1962 and 1963, first years of the competition.)

Under 25,000—Front, editorial and sports pages, Brantford Expositor; women's page, Quebec L'Evenement. (Brantford Expositor was over-all winner for 1962 and 1963.)

Among the larger papers, Toronto Telegram, Toronto Star, Toronto Globe and Mail, Sherbrooke La Tribune and Montreal Le Devoir received honorable mention from the judges either
