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In conclusion, I would like to refer to the very fine support which I received from the Board of Directors and all concerned with the exhibition during the past year. 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Validity Of Cahan Bill Opposed At Ottawa Hearing Before Supreme Court.

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Hon. J. H. MacQuarrie, Attorney-General for Nova Scotia, said that from 1749 to 1863 the right of appeal to the Privy Council from Nova Scotia was governed by the commissions and instructions issued to the governors of the province. Since 1863 it was governed by an imperial order in council.

"If the power to abrogate that order in council came across the water at all it came to the province and not to the Dominion," said Mr. MacQuarrie.

B. C.'s Contention
For British Columbia, Eric Pepler contended that the right of appeal to the Privy Council was enjoyed prior to the entry of that province into Confederation and prior to the creation of the present province through the union of the former colonies of Vancouver's Island and the mainland area of British Columbia. It was one of the rights guaranteed to the province at Confederation.

"Once we had the right guaranteed at Confederation," he said, "nothing the Dominion can do now can take it away. I go further and say that since the passing of the Statute of Westminster (1931) the province can now take the right of appeal to the Privy Council."
