THE race between "Dean Swift" and "Look Out"—which was to have taken place at Kensington yesterday—was further postponed until tomorrow.

THE Bessie McLeod from Charlottetown, P. E. I., for Queenstown, before reported taken into Kiltush, Ireland, was reported "a constructive total loss," and was sold to be broken up. It was believed that she would scarcely realize enough to pay the expenses of breaking her up.

Colonel J. G. Fair, of Nevada, who has been visiting the King and Queen of the Sandwich Islands, relates a pleasant little story of a water excursion which he took with them. When they approached the Island which was their destination, the breakers were found to be so boisterous that no small boat could land. Not at all discouraged, the King jumped overboard, the Queen after him, and both swam with exceeding grace and coolness to the shore.

ONE DAY last week a Pictou County farmer drove up to the West River Station, with about a dozen sheep, with their legs tied, for shipment to Halifax. Just at that moment the Pictou train came in, half a dozen passengers jumped on to the platform and with one accord shouted, "Look out for Naylor!" "Who's Naylor?" asked the farmer. "Who's Naylor?" was the reply, "you'll see when you get to Halifax. If you send those sheep to Halifax, with their legs tied, it will cost you more than they are worth." The honest farmer was open to conviction. "Come to think of it, he had heard of Naylor before. In one minute the cords were cut, every sheep was free, and the farmer will never again tie the legs of his sheep and thus cruelly ill-treat them. This little incident, says the Halifax Herald, shows the vast amount of good already accomplished by the S. P. C. A., and that "Naylor's" name is everywhere a terror to those who ill-treat dumb animals. It would be well if Naylor's jurisdiction was extended to this city. There is here a large field for his labor.

**The Storm of Yesterday.**

SUPPOSED DISASTER TO FISHERMEN OFF THE COAST.

Yesterday evening the American fishing pink Lucy, Capt. Helliz, of York, Maine, was carried into this port, before the wind, with jib and foresail torn to pieces. She broke from her moorings off Pictou Island, and for safety ran directly with the squall. When off White Cape the captain and crew perceived a dory which was blown from the trawls off Murray Harbor. He immediately picked them off and conveyed them to this port. Their names are Samuel and Benj. Crittenden, of Gloucester. They are two of the crew of the fishing schr. Greyhound, also belonging to the State of Maine. Capt. Hellitz says that there were but a man and boy on board the Greyhound when the storm came on, and if she struck adrift she will surely be wrecked. He also states that there must have been fifty schooners and dories caught in the storm—a small number of which are certainly lost.

THE Earl of Eoudoun, whose mother, a sister of Lady Flora Hastings, ordered in her will that her right hand should be buried under a white pillar on her estate, in full view of the trains which take the Queen yearly to Balmoral, the pillar being inscribed with the fierce device, "I bide my time," is to marry Miss Alice Howard, a cousin of the Duke of Norfolk, whose duchess is Lord Loudoun's sister, and a sister-in-law of the Marquis of Bute.

THE vessel already reported as having been picked up abandoned, by the schr. Reform, arrived at Halifax on Sunday night, in charge of a crew of eight men from the Reform. She is the brig *Rovena*, of P. E. Island, two years old, registered 199 tons, and is classed 8 years in English Lloyds, so that is a most valuable prize, being in perfect order and newly coppered. As far as can be ascertained, she has not strained a rope yarn. She is now at Pickford & Black's wharf.—*Hal. Herald.*

LATEST FROM THE CAPITAL.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18.

Hon. J. H. Pope returned on Saturday from Quebec.

Lieut-General Sir Edward Selby Smythe is expected to return to Ottawa on the 27th.

Hon. James McDonald left for the East on Saturday night. It is said he has abandoned the idea of visiting Manitoba this year.

The Government intend sending four more agricultural instructors among the Blackfoot Indians in about ten days. There are at present two in that district, who report favorably.

There is a rumor abroad to-day that Mr. C. J. Brydges is to be the new Manager of the Bank of Montreal, and that he will be succeeded in his Hudson Bay post by W. J. Forsyth of this city, who came very near obtaining the appointment when it was vacated by Mr. D. A. Smith, M. P.

It is now stated that the Princess Louise had not and never had any intention of returning to England this fall. H. R. H. is expected to pay a visit to Rideau Hall in a few days to inspect the improvements and alterations now in progress there, with a view to the accommodation of several English guests during the winter, and the inauguration of what is expected to be a particularly festive season.

Intelligence was received in the city this morning of the sad death by drowning of Mr. H. J. Duffy, the Public Works Department, at Old Orchard Beach, Maine, yesterday. His relatives reside in the Maritime Provinces. To make the accident additionally sad, it is stated that he was engaged to be married to a young lady in this city, the ceremony having been arranged to take place next month.

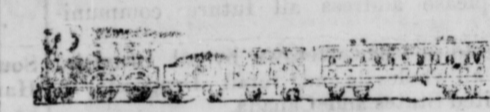
MONTREAL, Aug. 18.

**CIVIC ELECTION, BY THE MAYOR, —FOR— Licensing Board.**

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the Fortieth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled: "An Act to amend an Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown," I do hereby give public notice that an Election of Three Persons to constitute a Licensing Board for the City of Charlottetown, will be held on

**TUESDAY,**  
the Second day of September, 1879,

at the several places following, that is to say:

In WARD No. 1.—At the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In WARD No. 2.—At the Warehouse of Richard Heartz, Esq., fronting on Sydney Street.

In WARD No. 3.—At the Market House.

In WARD No. 4.—At the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, East.

In WARD No. 5.—At the House of widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Euston Streets.

And at the said elections the poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open till Five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

The Board shall be elected by those entitled to vote for the Mayor of the city in each Ward.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the old barrack ground. Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy Street and north of Grafton Street. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

QUALIFICATIONS. An Act to amend an Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown, passed 18th April, 1877:

Section 1. All the male inhabitants of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the said city for at least one year then next preceding the day of such Election, and being British subjects, and such of whom shall actually, and within the Ward for which he shall vote, then be, and for three months previously shall have been, actually and in his own right, the bona fide owner of the freehold of one whole Town Lot, Common Lot, Water Lot, or the bona fide owner of a piece of ground of the yearly value of Thirty dollars, or the bona fide owner of the freehold of a Dwelling House, part of a Dwelling House, Store, Warehouse, Office or Shop, of the yearly value of Thirty Dollars; or who shall be in the tenancy or occupancy of a Town Lot, Common Lot, Water Lot, or piece of Ground, Dwelling House, part of a Dwelling House, Shop or Warehouse, of the annual rent of Thirty Dollars, payable quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly; and no other person shall be entitled to vote at said Elections for such Mayor and Councillors; provided that every partner, whose share of the rent amounts to Thirty Dollars annually, shall be entitled to vote; and provided further, that every such male person of age, aforesaid, and being a non-resident of such city, shall be doing business in, and being in actual occupation of, business or other premises in the said City, and who shall be qualified to vote at such Elections under any of the several qualifications hereinbefore specified, shall be entitled to vote for such Mayor and Councillors, in the Ward in which the property on which he claims to vote shall be situate.
