LONDON, Nov. 7. His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales has accepted the chairmanship of the Longfellow Memorial Committee. [A re port of the first meeting of the Committee will be found on our first page.]

Russian Movements on German Frontier.

BERLIN, Nov. 7. The recent movements of Russian forces on the German frontier is attracting the attention of General Von Moltke and Prince Bismarck. They are at a loss to know the cause of Russian activity on the border, and believe it to be uncalculated for aggres sive.

El Medis' Fight at Ohnad.

CAIRO, Nov. 7. El Medis, False Prophet, on the 6th inst, attacked Ohnad. He was repulsed seven times with great loss. His eighth attack was successful. He now continues his march towards Khartoum.

Arrival of the Duke.

LONDON, Nov. 7. His Royal Highness, the Duke of Can naught, arrived home from Egypt yester day. He was enthusiastically received.

Cholera in Mecca.

LONDON, Nov. 7. Latest advices from Mecca report that the Cholera is rapidly spreading in that place. The death rate is increasing largely.

Anthony Throllope's Fatal Illness.

LONDON, Nov. 7. It is believed that the sudden illness of Anthony Throllope, the Great English Novelist, will prove fatal. The first symptoms of his malady were discovered on Friday last. While at dinner he was seized with a fit which overpowered his mental faculties. He has since remained uncon scious. Medical skill fails to give him relief.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. The Tribune's London cable letter says: The increasing majority against Gibson's two thirds amendment indicates a shorter session than was expected. Ministers now believing it possible that the House will rise at the end of the month. These calcula tions are based, not so much on unexpected largeness of majority as on the disclosure of the substantial unanimity of the Liberal party in Parliament and its entire unanimity throughout the country in favor of clu ture as the sole means of restoring legisla tive efficiency. The much talked of Radical deflection has been reduced to ridiculous proportions in the House, while, in the country, not a single Liberal journal has failed to sustain the Ministry. The pres sure on members from constituencies was of a most unusual kind. One Radical be sides Cusden, who is no longer reckoned a Liberal, voted for Gibson's amendment. The seceders were nearly all fossil Whigs, of whom most will support the Ministers next week on Northcote's motion to nega tive the first rule.

The Tories, though persisting in obstruc tion, have lost hope of either securing an important concession or of protracting the session. Their whips find increasing diffi culty in keeping their men in town. Nearly the full strength of the party voted on Thursday, and will vote once more on the final division on the first rule, but not afterward.

The chief significance of Mr. Waddy's election, in Edinburgh, was the defeat of the Irish faction, which attacked Waddy violently, and falsely accused him of break ing pledges given to the Irish.

The World's London special says: The debates in the House, this week, con tributed still further to depress the Con servatives by showing them that they have absolutely no leader upon whose tact and courage dependence is to be placed.

The report of Alport and Swanbrick on the Atlantic and Great Western Railway, has, for the time, completely demoralized the American market here. The document has fallen on the trustees like a bombshell; the effect of the charges must be the over throw of the trustees or an appeal to the courts. Upon the disclosures being made, the first bonds of the company fell 13 per cent., but they are now rallying a little in consequence of the prospect of a totally new management.

BOSTON, Nov. 5. A. M. Sullivan, M. P., lectured in this city to-night. In sketching the work of the Land League since 1879, he declares that in their widest hopes and most ambitious demands they never asked for as much as was given in Gladstone's last act. Already something like 30 per cent. of the whole rental of Ireland had been taken from the shoulders of the people, which was the greatest and most tremendous revolution ever accomplished by legislative effort in Europe. "But," he continued, "we are not satisfied with that; we want arrears wiped off, iniquitous leases annulled and, above all, we want landlords compelled to sell out to occupying tenants."

CAIRO, Nov. 5. The Egyptian ministry have decided to employ English counsel to act for the Government in the trial of rebel leaders. The enrollment of black troops for service against the false prophet is progressing satisfactorily.

A fresh discovery was made to-day of documents important to Arabi Pacha's defence. It is stated that they implicate the Sultan in a connivance with the rebel lion.

LONDON, Nov. 5. Anthony Trollope, the novelist, while at dinner on Friday, was seized with some kind of a fit which largely overpowered his mental faculties.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. The first of three match running races between L. E. Myers, amateur champion of America, and W. G. Galloway, English

champion of England, occurred yesterday. Myers won easily in 1 min. 15 3/5 sec., distance half a mile.

BELGRADE, Nov. 4. The Cabinet has agreed to resign in office, King Milan having refused to accept their resignations.

LOWELL, MASS., Nov. 5. Patrick McInery defeated Daniel Driscoll yesterday, p. m., in a two mile shell race for \$500, on the Merrimac river. Time, 14m. 24 sec.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 5. A violent earthquake has occurred in the vicinity of Aintah, northern Syria. Sev eral villages were destroyed.

PARIS, Nov. 5. Elections were held to-day in the Depart ment of Morbihan to fill two vacancies in the Senate. Both candidates returned are Conservatives.

PRESBURG, Nov. 4. The persons arrested for participation in the anti-Jewish riot here in September have been sentenced to three months' im prisonment.

ROME, Nov. 4. The death of Marquis Antinori, leader of the equatorial geographical expedition, is announced. No details of his death have been received.

LEIPZIG, Nov. 4. The Imperial tribunal here has upheld the appeal of the public prosecution against the late acquittal of Prof. Mommsen, on the charge of slandering Bismarck. The case has been referred to the Berlin court of the first instance.

LONDON, Nov. 4. The Daily News, referring to the sur render of the Cuban refugees to Spain, says, "Even the vulgarist original is not handed over to a foreign government under an extradition treaty on the simple asser tion of that government that he is a criminal. If, unfortunately, a severer reason than has been made, is needed, we have no doubt that it will be employed."

The unconditional release of the im prisoned ritualist, Rev. Mr. Green, vicar of Miles Platting, has been ordered.

EUREKA, Nev., Nov. 4. A quarrel regarding politics led to a fatal shooting affray here yesterday, on Main street, between James E. Anderson, formerly of New Orleans, editor of the Eureka Evening Leader, a Republican news paper, and George F. Zeek, the Republican candidate for superintendent of public in struction. Anderson was fatally shot but Zeek was uninjured.
