Trial Opens At S' Side

SUMMERSIDE — A resident of Cape Traverse, pleaded not guilty to a charge of obstructing a Fisheries Officer in the course of his duties at Magistrate's Court here Monday morning. Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., presided. During the trial evidence was given by Fisheries Officer Norman E. MacLeod who testified that he and Fisheries Warden Waldo Beck located a crate of lobsters with eggs and a boat containing undersized lobsters on the evening of August 26th, at Cape Traverse wharf. Later in the evening he said a truck drove up and he recognized the accused and his son and an unidentified man as they proceeded to load the crate of lobsters on the vehicle. The witness stated he and Warden Beck identified themselves as fisheries officers and announced the truck under seizure. He said the accused blocked his path to the truck and had grabbed him around the throat yelling loudly. He said he observed Warden Beck attempting to prevent the accused's son from hauling the crate off the truck. He said the accused and his son began kicking and scooping the lobsters over the wharf into the water. When the accused and his son walked off the wharf the witness examined the remaining lobsters and found 46 with eggs attached and 43 which are less than the legal size. The case was adjourned.

(Continued from page 1) tations are still going on" with the Agricultural Stabilization Board at Ottawa. Under order-in-council passed by the Federal Cabinet in July, it was agreed to pay 45 cents per lb. bag on 75 per cent of the bag stock unsold as of July 15. The maximum amount to be paid under the program was to be \$105,000. Since that time inspections on the Island reveal that payments under the program on the above basis, according to applications received would amount to \$113,000 a difference of \$8,000. NO COMPROMISE: Unofficial reports are that Ottawa is insisting that \$105,000 is the amount to be paid and are asking local authorities, through their agency, the Potato Marketing Board, to arrange the proper allocation, in the light of those entitled to preference because of unsold stocks. Recently the Young Progressive Conservative Association, gathered for their annual meeting, went on record as publicly deploring the delay in making settlement to Island growers. The resolution which was not downvoted to any particular organization was, it was stated intended to draw attention to all parties concerned in the arranging of payment.

Fighter Planes Seem To Be Out Under New Policy

By DAVE MCINTOSH Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—Dr. A. H. Zimmerman, chairman of the Defence Research Board, has described current scientific and engineering advances as "exploding technology."

Nowhere is this "exploding technology" more apparent than in Prime Minister Diefenbaker's statement Tuesday on new government defence policy. In brief, the new policy can be summed up as replacement of jet interceptors by Bomarc ground-to-air guided missiles.

HARD TO TAKE? The government seemed to leave little doubt that it has merely delayed until next March final cancellation of the super-sonic Arrow interceptor program. And it cancelled outright two programs associated with the Arrow. The Astra flight and armament control system and the Sparrow air-to-air missile for the plane.

The government's decision may have been hard for Defence Minister Peakes to accept. As late as July 4, he told the Commons estimates committee: "There are important factors necessitating the continued use of manned interceptors in the air defence system for many years, indeed for as far as we can see into the future."

What caused Mr. Peakes to change his mind or the cabinet to overrule him? The government obviously was appalled at the cost of the Arrow program. Mr. Diefenbaker said 100 Arrows would cost \$1,250,000,000.

By next March 31, \$400,000,000 will have been spent on the Arrow. And since 1950, the defence department has spent \$50,000,000 trying to obtain an air-to-air missile. The Velvet Glove project was cancelled in 1955. Now its successor, the Sparrow, is a dead duck.

The taxpayer may well ask what useable equipment Canada has obtained from expenditure of this \$450,000,000. The brief answer is: none. **STUNNING BLOW** Mr. Diefenbaker's announcement must have come as a stunning blow to the Arrow's designers and builders.

And it is certain that it is a crushing blow to the RCAF which had staked its flying combat future on procurement of the Arrow. The RCAF will have control of the two Bomarc missile stations

to be built but it is actually the army which has far more experience in the anti-aircraft missile role.

When the CF-100 and Sabre jet interceptors go out of service, the RCAF will be largely land-bound except for transport and maritime reconnaissance duties. But the army, too, is hurt because it had fought hard to obtain control of ground-to-air missiles.

As one RCAF officer said Tuesday night: "Now is the time to integrate the armed forces."

CAMPBELLTON (CP)—A funeral for John H. Van Horne will be conducted this Wednesday afternoon at Maher's Funeral Home here by Rev. J. E. Munson, assisted by Rev. C. M. Hathaway. Interment will be in the rural cemetery, Campbellton.

Father of J. C. Van Horne, member of Parliament for Restigouche-Madawaska, Mr. Van Horne died Monday in Soldiers' Memorial Hospital at the age of 68.

Born in Nashwaaksis, York County, he came to Campbellton 60 years ago, attended high school here and later went to work with his father at a lumber camp. He was a scaler with the Restigouche division of Fraser Companies Limited for 35 years until his retirement three years ago. Mr. Van Horne was watchman at a government garage until August. He was a member of the United Church. Surviving are his wife, the former Alice Peron; one son, four daughters, Harriet of Moncton, Julia, Barbara and Myrtle, at home and three grandchildren.

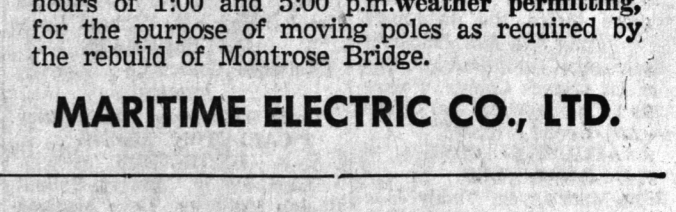
WINNIE ON CRUISE

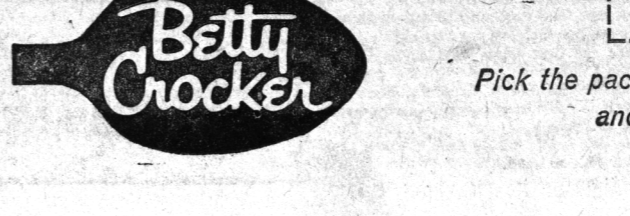
