St. Laurent Not Interested in Gov.-General's Job

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent said Tuesday he is "not interested" in the suggestion by Leon Baicer (PC-Trois-Rivieres) that he be named Canada's next governor-general. Mr. Baicer made the suggestion in the Commons Monday night. He said that if Mr. St. Laurent succeeded Rt. Rev. Vincent Massey it would establish the precedent of alternate English and French-speaking governors-general. The Prime Minister told a reporter: "As long as I feel competent to do the job, this is the office I'm in and this is the office I'll stay in, until the people turn me out."
