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## Local and Other Items.

POTATOES are selling in Houlton Me., at one  
dollar a barrel higher than they ever before  
sold for, in that market, at this season of  
the year.

ROUGHLERS attempted to force an entrance  
into Sir Leonard Tilley's house at Ottawa on  
Thursday night, but Miss Tilley frightened  
them away.

The old Gunarder *Persia*, in its day the  
finest vessel afloat, took six tons of coal to  
carry a ton of freight across the Atlantic. The  
*Arizona*, a new steamer about twice the size  
of the *Persia*, uses a fifth of a ton of fuel per  
ton of freight. These changes have greatly  
reduced freights.

NEW YORK is suffering much more severely  
than we are in Montreal from the excise  
heat, so unusual at this late season of the year.  
The hotels at Long Branch and Coney Island  
are to be kept open until the 1st of October.  
The rush to these places on Sunday last was  
as great as on midsummer Sundays; the six  
Iron Steamboat Company's vessels alone  
carrying 18,000 visitors, and the railroads  
landing about 10,000 on the sands. The ther-  
mometer at New York touched 82 in the shade  
on that day. —*Gas*

The Maritim Bank at St. John has been  
reconstituted at a favorable time. The *Tele-  
graph* says: "The Bank is to be considered as  
a totally new institution. While the sur-  
viving stock of a previous Banking regime  
will be represented at its present value, new  
principles of action will guide the virtually new  
Bank, and new classes of customers will be  
accommodated. It is not likely that any St.  
John Bank, in future, will convert what should  
be its active currency into fixed capital or  
debt, or put too many of its eggs into the same  
basket. The Bank will credit by the experi-  
ences of the past, and cultivate the good  
feeling of the public which its reopening calls  
forth."

A GENTLEMAN of Ottawa, who a few weeks  
ago wrote to two coal mining companies oper-  
ating in Cape Breton, enquiring on what  
terms they would engage to supply 3,600 tons  
of good steam coal delivered in Montreal, has  
received the following answer:

1. "We are pushed to fill our contracts  
made early in the year and cannot engage for  
an additional ton this year. Next year al-  
though partially anticipated, with the large  
means of output we are entering upon will be  
glad to hear from you early."

2. The National Policy has caused a de-  
mand for coal beyond our power to supply  
this season.

THE DEATH OF MISS TWEEDY.—On the 1st  
instant an event occurred which cast a gen-  
eral gloom over the younger inhabitants, in  
the death of Miss Annie Tweedy, daughter  
of the late Mr. Matthew Tweedy, at the early  
age of sixteen years. Miss Tweedy's father  
was one of the most useful men in the town  
during his life-time. His good life caused his  
family to be doubly respected in Thirk since  
his death, in memory of the many good acts  
of the father, for he was one of the best  
friends the poor had in the town, not only  
privately, but in his public capacity. He was  
many years one of the Guardians of the  
Poor for the town, and the chief promoter of  
that very useful institution during the last  
two severe winters—the soup kitchen—where  
he was in daily attendance during his life-  
time. In his death the Church lost one of  
its main stays, for he was for many years  
senior church-warden, and one of the staunch-  
est supporters of the Conservative cause in  
the town. Miss Tweedy, although so young,  
had endeared herself with her kindness of  
heart and amiable disposition to all who knew  
her, and when it was known that she had  
breathed her last, after a painful and linger-  
ing illness, at the residence of her aunt (Mrs.  
George Smith), in the Market-square, many a  
young heart was sad. She was interred on  
Sunday morning at the cemetery, being car-  
ried to the grave by her acquaintances, and  
the service being performed by the Parish  
Church, which her father loved so well.  
There was a large gathering at the funeral,  
and as the service closed over the grave on  
one so young, the coffin was literally covered  
with floral devices to her memory. The coffin  
was of light and dark oak, surmounted with  
a massive silver-plated shield, recording the  
deceased's name and date of her death. It  
was made by Mr. George Wilt, of Thirk.—

## Supreme Court, Summerside.

SUMMERSIDE, Oct. 5.

The Supreme Court opened here yester-  
day, Judge Hensley presiding. His Honor  
addressed the Grand Jury at some length.  
He referred specially to the Canada Tem-  
perance Act, stating it was *prima facie* in  
force in this town, and all law-abiding  
citizens should observe it. He congratu-  
lated them on the absence of crime in the  
County, as there was only one criminal  
case to occupy their attention.

The civil docket was light, and the great-  
er number of the cases have been settled.

The first civil case tried yesterday was  
John Walker vs. Stephen Baker. This  
was an action for money lent. The de-  
fendant pleaded that he satisfied the debt  
by indorsing a note to the plaintiff.

This case occupied most of the day,  
and the jury after being up for about half  
an hour, gave a verdict for the plaintiff for  
\$254, being the amount lent and interest.
