# Suspended Sentences Given On Theft Count

The magistrate gave them the suspended sentences due to their age and what he termed, "the condition of the accused, who are both young and incapable, while two others were fined five dollars and costs or two days for being through stop signs.

Fines of \$10 and costs or five days were imposed on one accused for failing to stop at a red light and another for driving without a licence.

# Value Of Construction Increases \$3,000,000

Figures on construction throughout the province released by Claude Smith, director of town planning, reveal that permits totalling \$3,011,350 were issued from April to Dec. 31, 1962. This amount exceeds by \$3,000,000 the value of permits issued during the whole of 1961.

Mr. Smith added, however, that present figures will probably be revised when final figures in March, the year's end for issuing of permits. Usually permits are issued during January, February, and March.

The above figures include construction in suburban Summerside and Charlottetown, in all incorporated villages, and on both sides of the Trans-Canada Highway. Permits for construction in Charlottetown, Summerside and the towns are excluded.

Since the beginning of last April permits have been issued for the construction of 104 dwellings and 15 other buildings, including 5 schools.

# Canada Refuses To Admit Communist From The U.S.

**MONTREAL (CP)—**The Immigration department said today that Gus Hall, former national chairman of the U.S. Communist party, was refused admission to Canada.

Louis Vachon, the department spokesman, said that Hall "couldn't lawfully be admitted because he is a known Communist and is coming here to do Communist work."

Hall was turned back at Montreal International airport yesterday by immigration officials.

He had been invited here to address a student conference at McGill University and was the society's president, Sydney Wilson, who had been unable to enter the country.

Vachon said that if Hall had been coming here as a businessman representing his firm, "it might have been a different matter."

He said that he had been admitted because of his activity, that is, he was going to speak publicly as a Communist.

**PLEW HOME**  
Hall flew back to New York two days after his arrival.

During that interval he was allowed to see members of the McGill University student society and he was scheduled to address and he issued a statement saying:

# Tshombe Gives Up Fight, Granted General Amnesty

**LEOPOLDVILLE (AP)—**Katanga President Moïse Tshombe gave up his secessionist fight such conflict since he led his damage and express regrets.

Tuesday, He quickly won assurance of a general amnesty that he had asked as his only condition for Congo unity under UN Secretary General U Thant's reconciliation plan.

"We are ready to proclaim immediately before the world that Katanga's secession is ended, to allow United Nations troops freedom of movement and to return to Elisabethville. That's what," Tshombe announced at Kolwezi, his emergency capital.

He pledged loyal co-operation with the United Nations.

Thant, often a sceptical of Tshombe's declarations in the past, welcomed this one. At UN headquarters in New York he expressed hope that it will be put into effect promptly and fully "and thus bring an end to the conflict and destruction which have been needlessly experienced in Katanga."

**ENDS 19 DAY WAR?**  
Tshombe's capitulation came controls in various fields of government spending.
