Strong Uptrend In N. Y. Stocks Last Week

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 - (AP) - With renewed vigor, the stock market last week again started punching its way toward 1951 peak price levels.

The rise was hampered by railroads. Buyers were reluctant to step forward while railroad officials were expressing disappointment over the smallness of the recent freight-rate increase.

The Associated Press, average of 60 stocks advanced 70 cents on the week and stood at \$96.90 at Friday's close. That is 90 cents away from the 1951 peak. The industrial component of the average advanced a strong \$1.70 and utilities were up 50 cents.

The rise of American Telephone by 4 3/8 to 192 1/4 excited unusual interest. It made a 1951 high every day, and was the 11th most active issue.

During the week buyers focused attention on first one group and then another. Oils got a lot of attention, and five of the 20 most active issues were oil companies or had heavy oil interests.

The New York Stock Exchange reported first half earnings of 25 oil and gas companies increased their profits 41.7 percent over a year ago, and crude oil production currently is at an all time high, 9.8 per cent above a year ago.

The market headed up into an area from which it has turned back on three occasions this year.

Grain

WINNIPEG, Aug. 19 - (CP) - Grain prices moved narrowly and generally lower in dull trade on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange Saturday.

Offerings and hedging sales were on a fair scale while commercial demand was light. A few shippings orders appeared in oats and barley. American interests were purchasers of rye. However, the selling out-weighted the demand in most cases.

No information was available on export loadings of Canadian wheat. Class two wheat and 1 W.A. prices were unchanged from Friday.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, Aug. 19 - (AP) - Steel producers can expect "distribution turmoil" well into 1952, the metalworking weekly, Steel, says today.

"Extensive rescreening of fourth-quarter steel orders appears inescapable," the magazine declares. "Allotment cutbacks will be necessary if defence requirements are to be scheduled."

Steel also predicts the national production authority will be unable to bring all manufacturers of consumer durable goods under the controlled materials plan by Oct. 1.

N. P. A.'s announcement last week of the deadline was "a little premature," Steel says "the opening of C.M.P. will not be completely closed before No. 1. It then."

On the production front, Steel reports, the mills held their pace at 102 per cent of theoretical capacity last week.

While consumer inventories still are modest, a trickle of foreign cancellations are appearing. These came from certain consumer durable goods makers who had been steadily taking in steel in the face of declining orders for their finished products.

Small Freshman Classes Expected

FREDERICTON, Aug. 19 - (CP) - New Brunswick Universities this fall will have some of the smallest freshman classes in years.

Dr. F. E. MacDiarmid, Director and Chief Superintendent of Education for the Province, said Saturday that the situation would be a result of extending high school courses in New Brunswick by one year to a total of four.

The number of freshmen in the fall of 1952 is expected to be normal.

A portion of each church's roof was torn away and the electric light failed. The shelters lit storm lanterns and sang hymns whenever the howl of the gale died down for a few minutes.

Rain poured down through the gaping roofs, drenching the congregations and flooding each church.

Outside, the winds lifted large sheets of zinc from a metal factory yard, sending them hurtling about the streets crashing into cars and buildings.

Port Royal-Three children were killed when 100-mile-an-hour gusts smashed in part of the Roman Catholic orphanage, Alpha Cottage.

The skipper and crew of the vessel Jamaica Producer clung to the decks in the teeth of the storm, fighting to handle her passengers in the harbor. They active bay safely, narrowly missing a stone wharf. The ship was refloated under her own power Saturday.

Bodies in Ruins When Port Royal rescue parties dug into the ruins of English army Capt. Geoffrey Craven's home, they found the body of Mrs. Craven in the debris. She was holding her dead daughter in one arm, and the body of a Jamaican child companion in the other.

The capital battered down early Friday afternoon. Buses stopped running, movie and night clubs closed, and all the residents kept to their homes.

Many families near the seaford moved to the upper parts of the town and hid in stocks of water and canned goods.

The Gleaner, Kingston newspaper, was unable to publish Saturday for lack of electric power.

The island's Governor, Sir Hugh Foot broadcast an appeal for calm and met Saturday with top members of the government and military establishment to work out emergency projects to put the capital back in order.

Ships taken to anchorages in the lee of the harbor were most.

ed hundreds of feet into the air. But because there had been time to lash down all aircraft in their bays, only one plane was destroyed.

Spanish Town - The island's second largest city, 13 miles from Kingston-was cut off until late Saturday. First messages received reported at least six deaths many buildings destroyed and scores damaged.

In Kingston and the adjoining area of St. Andrew, as the storm approached hundreds of people flocked to the solidly-built churches-St. Michael's (Anglican) and the Methodist Ebenezer. They listened to sermons until the hurricane struck, then huddled in their pews praying.
