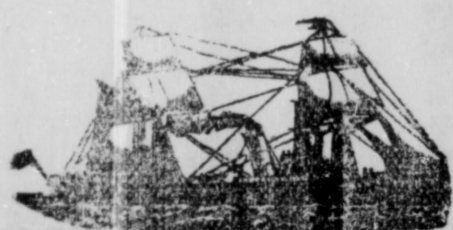

AN ESCAPE.

Corporal Lloyd, one of the prisoners captured at the ambush of Sanna's post, succeeded in effecting a most daring escape from the Boers. After the surrender of the British force the prisoners, he states, were marched away to the north. Lloyd, in the early stages of the march, made evident signs of suffering from complete exhaustion, and later he professed to collapse altogether. His captors permitted him to lie on the side of the road until the ambulance, following in the rear, came up. The ambulance, however, was almost entirely unguarded and the prisoner immediately took advantage of this fact to attempt to escape. Crawling into a small fissure in the side of the road, he lay unperceived until the Boer commando had passed out of sight and he did not venture out until several hours afterwards. He then made his way in the direction of Bloemfontein, travelling only by night, and in the daytime hiding in the most likely cover. After being for four days and nights without food he managed to reach the Free State capital, after a most arduous journey.

Corporal Lloyd gives a most graphic description of the surprise of the convoy at Sanna's post. After a severe and protracted resistance, during which his comrades were shot down on all sides, Lloyd, along with those who survived, dismounted and surrendered to save further bloodshed. Lloyd recognized among the Boer commando several armed Free Staters whom he had seen selling produce at the British camp at Thaba Ncha, and they laughingly admitted their identity. Many of the burghers rendered themselves particularly obnoxious to their captives, stealing everything they could lay their hands on, even taking away the very putties which the captives wore. The prisoners were called most opprobrious epithets, and taunted about their downfall for hours.

The Boer ponies, Lloyd states, were wretchedly weak, their owners gladly relinquishing them for the magnificent chargers of the captured officers. The latter requested to be allowed to ride but were met with a peremptory refusal, and told that as they were all Tommies they must walk.

HILYARD STEYN'S REPORT.

A Bloemfontein correspondent writes:

I have had the good fortune to travel three hours with Mr. Hilyard (Halhart?) Steyn, brother of the ex-President of the Free State, who is proceeding to Cape Town on parole. I found Mr. Steyn extremely courteous and he was by no means averse to entering into conversation, and to giving free expression to his views on the situation. I may state that in appearance Mr. Steyn is as nearly as possible typical of the successful burgher farmer, and appears to be possessed of much strength of character, is generally broad-minded in his views, and frank in the expression of them.

He told them that up to the actual moment of the despatch of the Boer ultimatum to Britain he considered war improbable. He was convinced that the greatest good-fellowship had always existed between the Orange Free State and the British, and had never heard a single complaint of the alleged arbitrary, British treatment. On the contrary there was genuine good feeling existing between the two races. Mr. Steyn stoutly denied that racial hatred or bad blood would exist after the war as far as his countrymen of the Free State are concerned. He would not listen to any imputation upon the character of his brother, the ex-President, and with much heat defended him in his policy with regard to the war.

FACTS ABOUT ST. HELENA.

St. Helena is distant 1,140 miles from Africa, and 1,800 miles from America.

The only inhabited place in St. Helena is Jamestown, which has a population of about 2,500.

ten miles across with an area of 47 square miles.

The coast of the island forms a perpendicular wall or cliff, averaging from 600 feet to 2,000 feet all round.

On Feb. 7, 1880, at the end of the Zulu war, Dinizulu and Undabuko, two Zulu chieftains, were transported to St. Helena.

St. Helena was discovered by the Portuguese on St. Helena's day, May 21, 1502. The Dutch held it until 1600, when they were expelled by the English.

Ladder Hill on which Government House is situated, is so called because of the almost perpendicular ladder-like wooden stairs by which its acclivity of 600 feet has to be scaled.

St. Helena is a great place for caves and hills. Geologically speaking, the island is largely, if not wholly, volcanic, and a lot of extinct craters appear. Some of the pinnacles have queer names, such as Lot's Wife, the Man and the Horse, the Asses' Ears, and Holdfast Tom.

Nearly four miles inland from Jamestown, the capital, is an isolated farmhouse, on an elevated plateau about 2,000 feet above the sea. This is Longwood, where Napoleon lived from 1815 until he died there in 1821. The house is a long, low, whitewashed, trim building.

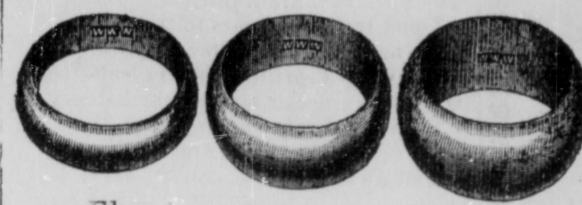
