

New Heating System To Be Tried in Plant

By JACK BRUCKMANN VANCOUVER (CP)—The new Pacific Press building here will be partly heated by the sweat of employees' brows.

The body heat from the newspaper publishing company's 1,600 employees will contribute to heating the new home of the Sun and Province—Vancouver's daily newspapers.

A relatively new system—called the "bootstrap" heat pump—will utilize temperatures given off by human bodies, heat generated by printing presses and other equipment and even the warmth from the lighting system to provide over-all heat for the new building.

The bootstrap method is an old concept of heating with a new and unique application.

Canada Triples Commitment To UN Peace Keeping Force

By DAVE McINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—Canada, in effect though not formally, has more than tripled its commitment in military forces to the United Nations for peacekeeping duty, informants said here.

The 3,000-man special service force, which includes three infantry battalions, is intended basically though not exclusively for UN service, they said.

The force's terms of reference were deliberately left vague so that it could be assigned various roles as needs arose. But there is no doubt, authorities said.

The special service force does not operate as a single entity in Canada but, if events demanded, could be moved overseas as one large formation.

Its units comprise the 1st Battalion, Canadian Guards, at Picton, Ont., now the UN standby battalion; the 1st Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles, at Victoria; the 2nd Battalion, Black Watch, at Camp Gagetown, N.B.; and the 4th Artillery Regiment, 1st Field Engineer Squadron, 1st Signals Squadron and 2nd Brigade Headquarters, all at Camp Petawawa, Ont.

For the first time, an artillery unit—150-man battery from the 4th Regiment—is on UN duty. It is in Cyprus with the 2nd Battalion, Canadian Guards.

The defence department wants to triple the airlift capacity of the armed forces so that, eventually, it will be possible to move the special force and its equipment to any place in the world within a week.

By the end of this year, RCAF Transport Command will have enough long range planes to move 1,000 soldiers and equipment up to 4,000 miles in seven days.

BIDDING QUIZ

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- ♠AKQJ65 ♥Q72 ♦J5 ♣83
- ♠Q9762 ♥K ♦A85 ♣A72
- ♠KQ9653 ♥KJ ♦7 ♣Q863
- ♠AKJ8742 ♥93 ♦62 ♣A4

1. Pass. North has two opportunities to raise spades and both times refused to do so. There is consequently no good reason to assume that it will be easier to make ten tricks in spades than nine tricks in no-trump.

We have six solid tricks to contribute in no-trump and it is not too much to expect partner to provide three more. Furthermore the queen of hearts and jack of diamonds may each help to provide a stopper in the red suits.

2. Four Clubs. North has certainly been unenthusiastic to date, judging from his minimum rebids, but there is still a possibility of making a slam. It is true that North would probably make three no-trump if we elected to pass, but we would be remiss in our obligations if we did.

Steel Ingot Output Up

OTTAWA (CP)—Steel ingot production in October amounted to 864,063 tons, an increase of 11 per cent over October output last year, the bureau of statistics has reported.

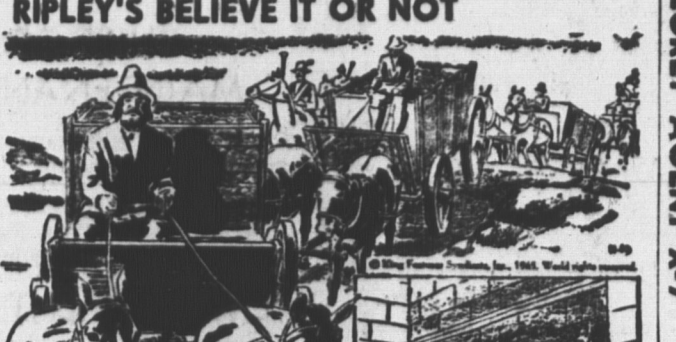
Production in the first 10 months of the year amounted to 8,237,165 tons, an increase of 10 1/2 per cent over the same period last year.

he bureau also reported that pig iron production rose 10 per cent in October to 612,508 tons from October production last year. Production was off in March and April but made advances in all the other months.

Cumulative production for the year amounted to 5,882,774 tons of pig iron this year, up 7 1/2 per cent from the same period last year.

It is understood Canada would agree to such an extension if the other member countries go along.
