**Strange But True**

More persons speak Gaelic in Cape Breton than in Scotland, and at St. Ann's is the only Gaelic college in America. In September, 1948, William Haast, of Florida started a program of self-immunization to deadly cobra bites. He injected distilled raw cobra venom into his blood, starting with a tiny dose and gradually increasing it. In August, 1949, a cobra bit Haast without appreciable effect. In other words, he's immune to cobra bites! Buffalo meat stored for thousands of years in Alaska's deep freeze (nature's ice box) was fed to dogs with no ill effects.

The common hen's eggs so popular on our breakfast tables now are proving a vital role in medical sciences efforts to eradicate rabies and other virus-caused diseases. Over twelve million eggs were used in lab tests last year. From them were produced modified live virus vaccines for immunizing dogs against rabies and distemper, and poultry against several killing diseases. Scientists believe that dogs vaccinated with a single injection of this new vaccine have lifetime immunity against rabies.

Back in 1911 a researcher discovered that he could breed and weaken a "hot" virus strain by numerous passages through embryonated eggs. This opened an entirely new field of research in viruses.

Like all new discoveries it has cost a lot of time and money, yet the benefits derived from the research will pay big dividends in the long run. A dentist drill is used to make tiny holes in the shells of the eggs, taking care not to injure the delicate membrane. The live virus is then dropped through the holes which are immediately sealed with collodion. Next the eggs are incubated and the virus is allowed to multiply.

Just before hatching, the shells are mined and the tissues removed. This is the source from which the vaccines are made.

The years passed, over thirty of them in fact, when it became known that Michael had indeed been murdered in a lonely shanty in Nevada, but the murderer or murderers were never brought to justice.
