HOISE NOTES. The following extract is from a letter written by E. L. Norcross, proprietor of Fearnought Farm, Manchester, Me., to the American Horse Breeder of Feb. 24th last. Mr. Norcross is a man who has had 40 years' experience in breeding horses, and is well posted in everything relating to the equine race. The letter is worthy of the attention of the horse breeders of this Island. Mr. Norcross says:

"Being snowed in to-day, so that I cannot exercise the colts, I concluded I would write a word about the most desirable horse a breeder could produce. Some twelve or fifteen years ago, I told the breeders of Maine where they would find, and what were the best of, the most important factor in the state of a lot of fashionably-pedigreed stallions, which were under-sized, unsound pig, but standard, and backed up by all the talented newspaper correspondents of the state, has brought on the result that we see to-day, horns full of unsalable colts that will never pay the expense of feeding. It will have been money in the pockets of many farmers who had a large flock of hogs, if the first part of the winter, when eggs were high, they had killed a colt or two and fed them out to the hogs, for fresh meat is a great thing to make hogs fat, and the profit from the eggs and the saving in keep would have been a great advantage to the farmer and the country as well.

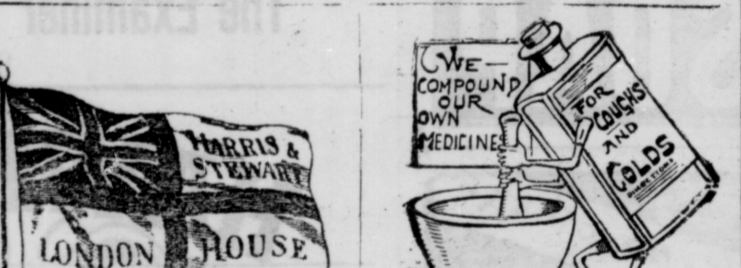

LARCENY.—Bernard Murphy, a lad of about 16 years, was arrested in the market this forenoon, charged with the larceny of a bottle of liquor from Honald Steele. Murphy will appear before His Honor to-morrow morning.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court this morning, two drunks, Duncan McGregor and Joseph Carver, were each fined \$1 or 5 days. Of three boys for disorderly conduct, one was 4-month and the other two were each fined \$1 and 1 cent.

CLOSING OF ESTIMATES.—All entries for the Maritime Province vote stakes, provided by A. W. Power, Halifax, must be made on or before Thursday, March 15. This is the fifth year of these stakes, and the great success which has attended them in the past, should assure a larger number of nominations this year than ever before, more especially as the conditions are more advantageous than ever before, as only the name and address of the nominee has to be sent with the first payment, and will not cancel until the third payment, July 14.

Y. M. C. A.—The lecture to be given on "Life" by Dr. Richard Johnson, in the lecture room this evening, will, without doubt, draw a large attendance. Those who heard the Doctor's address on this subject last year during the series given at the Sunday afternoon meetings, will remember it as one of the best ever given in this city. By special request much of this year's address will be given, supplemented with explanations of various charts and diagrams, which the doctor has made for illustrating his remarks. The lecture will commence at 8.30. Members and their friends are entitled to free admission.

MR. SWETT TO LEAVE MONTREAL.—Geo. W. Swett, manager of the Windsor Hotel at Montreal, has resigned to accept a similar position in the Hotel Brunswick, New York, at a higher salary. The directors have not yet accepted Mr. Swett's resignation. It was chiefly through Mr. Swett's able management that the Windsor now has the enviable reputation that it holds today. Mr. Swett was fifty years ago at Eastport, where he was connected with the old Quincey Hotel in Boston. He served his country during the war, and afterwards managed the Victoria Hotel and the Dufferin in St. John. Going to Montreal in 1889, he has been connected with the Windsor ever since, with the exception of 1889, during which time he organized the hotel and dining car system of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

LECTURE TO MEDICORS.—Dr. S. R. Jenkins delivered his first lecture to the medical students of this city, in opening up the subject of histology, the doctor took for a starting point, protoplasm, which he showed was the essential process by which the different kind of structural elements are perpetuated, after which he took the cell for consideration. The cell, he showed, was the most important of all the structural elements, for from the cell almost all of the tissues of the body are formed. After demonstrating the formation of cells from protoplasm and the various modifications of form and character at the different periods of development, he explained the several different ways in which their development is completed, and the different functions which they performed. The doctor also explained the microscope and its use. Dr. Jones lectures on psychology Monday night. We are sorry the name of Dr. H. D. Johnson was omitted from the list of doctors who are lecturing.

MECHANICAL GENIUS. Pretty Model of a Locomotive—Walter A. Stanley the Model He A'ao Has Built

The Daily Evening Item of Lynn, Mass., reports that Walter A. Stanley, who resides with his father, Charles W. Stanley, at 421 Essex Street, has manufactured a perfect working model of a locomotive. The youth has been engaged in the construction of this locomotive for the past two years, using his leisure moments while employed as a clerk in the post office at Newburyport. About a year ago when his father removed to Lynn, he bought the engine with him, and since that time has completed the tender. The engine is named the W. A. Stanley and is a picturesque miniature of polished brass. It is capable of being worked by steam, the heat to generate which can be supplied by burning alcohol, the engine in fact is a copy of five pounds working pressure. There are in both engine and tender 3367 pieces, the four driving wheels being of cast steel, and four inches in diameter. The dimensions of both cab and locomotive are as follows: Length of engine, 26 1/2 inches; height, 10 1/2 inches; width, 8 inches; gauge of track, 4 1/16 inches; cylinders, 1 1/2 by 1 1/4 inches; diameter of truck wheels, 1 1/4 inches; weight of engine, 20 pounds; weight of tender, 10 pounds. Young Stanley never had any training as a machinist, but is a genius in his way. His knowledge of a locomotive was picked up while watching locomotives on the railroad, so he states. He has a small machine shop fitted up at his father's residence, where he has a few miniature working tools. He has made a number of small electrical machines, one being an electric motor, perfect in every part and less than an inch in height, the total weight of which is 1 1/2 ounces. The ingenious young man here referred to is a grandson of Mr. John K. Stanley, formerly of Charlottetown.
