MONDAY
A scow owned by the Diamond Construction Company of Fredericton, N.B., and carrying a valuable cargo, submerged off Point Prime in the Northumberland Strait at 10:30 A.M. on Saturday and practically all the cargo valued at approximately \$18,000 was lost.

Rev. T.H.B. Somers, minister of the Kirk of St. James in Charlottetown, was guest preacher at the Presbyterian Church in Alberton at the concluding service of a series in celebration of the congregation's 120th anniversary. During the past week there were services in the church each evening except Sunday.

The Prince Edward Island Regiment (17th Recce), Lt.-Col. A. W. Rogers, officer commanding, left yesterday morning by motor bus for Camp Sussex, N.B., where the unit will undergo a week's concentrated training.

Members of the unit from the eastern part of the Province, Georgetown, Souris, St. Peters, Morell, and Mt. Stewart gathered in Charlottetown Saturday for medicals, documentation and pay. They joined "A" and Headquarters squadrons from Charlottetown for the trip to Sussex.

"C" Squadron from Summerside, 20 all ranks, under command of Major F. J. McNeill, joined the main body of the unit at Borden for the trip to camp. Some 19 officers and 32 other ranks left from Charlottetown. Second-in-command of the Regiment is Major J. A. MacDonald, Cardigan. The Adjutant is Capt. Reg. Mahar.

TUESDAY
Plans are now being finalized for the general Acadia Reunion which is to be held at Egmont Bay on Wednesday, August 1, and at which a very large attendance is expected.

The proceedings will open with Pontifical High Mass by His Excellency Bishop Boyle. A special sermon for the occasion will be preached by the Rt. Rev. Norbert Robichaud, Archbishop of Montreal.

George R. Thomson, formerly of Darnley and presently residing in Summerside was found dead in his truck on Saturday evening. Dr. Austin Delaney, Coroner, decided that an inquest was not necessary as he had passed away from a heart ailment and had been known to be in poor health for some time.

A veteran of two wars, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomson of Darnley and is survived by one half-brother and five half-sisters.

Servicing and repairing of aircraft attached to the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, by the Maritime Central Airways at Charlottetown will mean the permanent employment of 75 persons, and an income to this Province of hundreds of thousands of dollars.

As reported in the Guardian last month, negotiations have been in progress between the Department of Defence Production and the local airport for some time, but the contract has not yet been signed. It is expected however that the fulfillment of the contract early this fall.

The first young women from this province to join the Royal Canadian Air Force in peacetime were sworn in yesterday at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside by Flying Officer J. A. Robertson recruiting officer. Miss Ruth Frances Johnson of Central Bedque and Miss Margaret Ruth MacFarlane of Lower Bedque were also the first women to be posted to the Summerside Station in peacetime.

Sgt. V. Georgia O'Brien of Moncton, N. B. who has been assigned to the recruiting staff to interview and advise air women as the female members of the Air Force are to be known. This time there are no women's divisions—all are members of the regular Air Force and may be called on to serve anywhere.

It was learned yesterday from Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, that the tract has been let to Ashfield Bros. Ltd. of Fredericton, N. B. for a storm sewer system at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside. The amount of the contract is \$27,563.89.

As far as can be learned this work is to be done at Slendon Park, where the married quarters are located, preparatory to the paving of the streets. The tenders have also been called for the street paving, as well as for sidewalks and driveways, and an announcement of this contract is expected in the near future.

A short time ago announcement was made that a contract had been let for the landscaping of the area and when the work is all done the park will take on a serene and finished appearance. There are 205 air force families living here in houses that have been all built within the past two years.—S.

A Prince Edward Island girl was among a group of 50 from Canada who shook hands and chatted with Queen Elizabeth Friday at Buckingham Palace. She is Kathleen Coffin of Rolle Bay. She is a member of the Canadian girl's tour visiting Britain as guest of W. Garfield Weston, Canadian-born industrialist.

Something new for this Province went into operation yesterday morning when the new traffic lights at the corner of Euston Street and Elm Avenue were officially turned on. It is the first time there have been traffic lights

in operation in Prince Edward Island.
Mayor B. Earle MacDonald was on hand at 8:30 a.m. to see the lights turned on, and accompanying him were Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur, and Councillor Dave Stewart, Lester O'Donnell, George Keefe and Wendell Beaton. Staff Sergeant L. A. McInnis, senior traffic officer, was on hand most of the day to watch reactions of motorists and pedestrians.

Mr. Arnold Wood, O'Leary, was appointed President by the Board of Directors of the Island Co-operative Association Limited at their second annual meeting held in Charlottetown yesterday. The new President will replace Mr. Frank Dunn who presided over the well attended meetings in the Canadian Legion during the afternoon, and during the supper and meeting at The Village Rendezvous, Southport, in the evening.

New directors elected were Mr. Frank Connolly, Morell; Mr. Lloyd Martin of Cherry Valley, and Mr. Ulric Polier, Mount Carmel were re-elected. Others directors on the Board include, Vice-President, Mr. Malcolm Reeves, Southport, Secretary, Mr. Joseph Gaudin, North Rustico, Messrs. Rod MacNeven, Summerside, Carl MacAdam, Morell, and Lorne Monkey, Kensington.

Judge L. G. Lewis, County Court Judge, for Prince County has been advised that he has been appointed Judge of the Juvenile Court for Prince County. Ever since his appointment on the bench Judge Lewis has been juvenile court judge for the town of Summerside and has taken a great interest in the welfare of less fortunate children.

Some time ago a juvenile court for the county was set up and Judge Lewis was asked if he would accept the appointment as judge and he agreed to do so. The position of juvenile judge carries no salary with it. Up to now juveniles from Summerside could commit offences outside the town limits and there was no court except the criminal courts where they could be tried.

Now Judge Lewis will have jurisdiction anywhere in Prince County and juveniles may be brought before him for any offence in this area. The object of the juvenile court is not so much the punishment of the offender as the correction of the child where possible.

Unfortunately children in this province who are sentenced to homes of correction must be sent out of the province to serve their terms as there are no homes of detention for juveniles on Prince Edward Island. Judge Lewis has been in touch with the problem of juvenile delinquency ever since his appointment as Crown Prosecutor, fourteen years ago.—S.

THURSDAY
Reserve Naval personnel attached to H.M.C.S. "Queen Charlotte" will have the opportunity of a training cruise on board a Bangor minesweeper next month.

It has been announced that H. M. C. S. "Brockville", attached to H. M. C. S. "Scotian" in Halifax, will arrive in Charlottetown on August 7th and will be at the disposal of the local barracks for ten days.

The cruise will count as Naval training and if more men apply than it is possible to take at one time the "Brockville" will take two five-day cruises instead of one ten-day trip. Ports of call can not be planned until such time as all applications are received.

Mr. Edison Newman, Hunter River, died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital shortly after midnight this morning as the result of an accident which occurred on his farm about 4 p.m. last evening. He was 49 years of age.

Mr. Newman had been erecting a scaffold for hoisting hay when a rope slipped and one of the beams, which was being hoisted to the top of the scaffold, came crashing down. With him at the time were his daughter, and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Errol Stewart, Hampshire, and another daughter. They managed to jump to safety but Mr. Newman received a blow on his head as he endeavored to leap out of the way of the falling beam.

He was rushed to the hospital by ambulance but an emergency operation failed to stop internal bleeding.
Mr. Newman is survived by his wife, the former Ethel Boyle Cornwall, and four daughters. The daughters are, Freda, Mrs. Errol Stewart, Hampshire, and Vera, Winnifred and Heather at home. Two brothers, George in St. Avar's, Harry in Union Road and a sister, Pearl, Mrs. Lester McGee, Kingston, also survive.

A judgment of guilty was handed down by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor in the County Court yesterday in the case of Justice George J. Tweedy, charged with driving a car in the common danger. As a result he was fined \$500 or in the event of non-payment sentenced to serve three months in Queen's County Jail. The case arose out of the death of Gerald Solomon in a highway accident last April.
