New Buildings Are Announced

OTTAWA — Public Works Minister George Meffraith revealed here yesterday that a total of five new post offices will be built in Prince Edward Island during the current fiscal year.

In replying to a question on the Commons' order paper, Mr. Meffraith said that 173 will be built throughout Canada during the largest number, 65, being built in the province of Quebec.

In P.E.I. the post offices will be located at Breadalbane, Elmsdale, Kinkora, Little York, and St. Peter's Bay. The majority of the post offices in the smaller centres are built from standard plans of the department and cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000.

City Resident Assessed \$50

In city police court yesterday morning Francis William Quinn was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days on a charge of driving without due care and attention. Magistrate Gerald Foster, QC presided. The accused also had his licence suspended for three months.

A fine of \$15 and costs or 10 days was levied on Vernon Palls, City, on a charge of littering the streets.

Town Project Is Underway

Work was commenced on the hauling of fill to build up Kent Square, located in the centre of Georgetown and the grading and general beautification of which is the town's centennial project.

A number of carryalls; bulldozers and a grader will be engaged for the next four days in hauling clay fill from a location on the east side of town. It is anticipated that four days of hauling will place a very large quantity of fill on the site, although more may be necessary at a later date.

Financing of this project is being done by the town and the centennial committee and the whole cost is planned on being raised through entertainments, donations and the centennial grants, which will be forthcoming from the dominion and provincial governments.

The town's share, on the per capita basis has now been raised, by the centennial committee, through various entertainments and has been turned over to the town council for use on the project.

The commencement of this work will give an added incentive to all citizens, and former residents and it is expected that as the summer progresses that the donations from former Georgetownians will add to the fund. Donations from this source to date have been quite satisfactory. A sign was recently constructed by Silliman Marr and is now erected on the centennial project site. It shows the public how the Kent Square site will look on completion.

A large thermometer, also built and erected by Mr. Marr, now stands at the intersection of Water Street and Kent Street and it shows the amount of money raised in connection with the centennial project.

The Centennial Committee's next fund raising project will be their lobster supper in the Georgetown rink on July 22.

Highlighting the meeting was the Club's review of their club slides recently judged by a photo club in Sydney, N.S. and accompanied by the taped comments on each entry.

Winners of the competition, as judged by the Sydney club were: first — Roland Taylor with a portrait entitled "Leah-Jane"; second — Gordon White's "Fall scene on Churchill Avenue"; and third — Mr. White's "Queen of Bermuda" an early sunrise scene in the Caribbean.

Three honorable mentions were accorded Mr. White, one to Mr. Taylor and one to Stewart Ives.

Discussed briefly by club members was the project scheduled as a Centennial effort: a photographic essay of the past century in this province which will open at the Confederation Centre Art Gallery in May, 1967. This is a sequel to the popular photographic display of old homes throughout the province produced by the Club for the province's 1964 centennial celebrations.

Centre Director Outlines Findings

Jack McAndrew, public director of the Confederation Centre, outlined the findings of a public survey compiled this winter on the Centre by the business administration class of Prince of Wales College when he addressed the regular weekly meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel Monday.

Mr. MacAndrew explained that the survey was conducted by personal interview from names selected at random from the Charlottetown telephone directory. He said that 250 persons had been contacted and interviewed. The questionnaire itself was divided into three main sections one part for those who had attended the Centre, another for those who had not, and a third section for both groups.

He continued that it was felt that the survey in general was very reliable, but a high percentage of those interviewed were either quite young or quite old, which it was generally felt would be the two groups least concerned with the Centre.

Moving into tabulated information gleaned from the survey, it was pointed out in the survey that the theatre was a part of the complex most frequently visited and of those people who had toured the complex, 93.55 per cent had attended the theatre. The most popular type of entertainment was the dramatic with

95.2 per cent attending because of plays. Movies placed second with 72 per cent attending these. Other figures were 46.5 per cent for singers, etc.; 19.5 per cent for opera; 12.1 per cent for symphony; and five per cent for other entertainment.

It was generally evident that the persons attending the theatre were of a younger than average age. Figures were also available for the frequency of attendance and it was found that over 44 per cent attended between four and five times each year; 6.4 per cent attended over 20 times.

Complaints on the physical plant ranged from a barren foyer to poor air-conditioning and in general ticket prices were considered about right, with several complaints that there were no student prices.

Most of the suggestions for the theatre dealt with the need for more of everything in the area of programming.

On the Art Gallery section it was noted that over 50 per cent of the people interviewed had visited the gallery during the past year. On the library, of the 186 people who visited the Centre there were 81 who frequented the library.

Mr. MacAndrew also outlined the background of the centre and plans for the summer festival.

Yesterday's meeting was chaired by Elmer MacRae.

Rehabilitation Council; a former executive member of the John Howard Society, and a Warden of St. Peter's Cathedral in Charlottetown.
