**TWO GIRLS DROWNED.**—Mabel and Lizzie Weston, 18 and 16 years, and Lizzie Dodge, 14, were drowned at Bremen, Me., on Sunday, while bathing.

Mrs. Baldwin while the family were at the table excused herself, went to an upper room of the house and with a revolver shot herself through the head, dying instantly. No cause could be assigned for Mrs. Baldwin's terrible act, except that she was insane. She was for some time an inmate of a private sanitarium.
