OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Mr. Schreiber leaves on a trip to the Crow's Nest on Saturday. Hon. R. W. Scott, says that he has not been offered the Lieutenant Governorship of Ontario.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—The Messrs Peterson deny the statement that their contract is "as dead as a door nail," and say that the Fast Canadian Steamship Line project is not dead but is on the contrary progressing rapidly.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

EDINBURGH, Sept. 6.—A snowstorm has swept over Scotland. The Grampian hills are completely covered with snow.

MONTREAL, Sept. 6.—News reaches here of a desperate attempt to escape by seven convicts of St. Vincent de Paul prison by making a hole in the roof of the hospital. It was discovered before they got clear. Three other patients were gagged and bound to prevent an alarm.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 6.—Eighty new elevators and thirteen warehouses are now under construction for the storage of grain in Manitoba and the Northwest. With the new elevators at Fort William this means an increase of 4,000,000 bushels in the Northwest storage capacity.

BERLIN, Sept. 6.—The Lokal Anzigers Copenhagen correspondent says that Prince Charles of Denmark, who a year ago married Princess Maud, the youngest daughter of the Prince of Wales' three daughters, yielding to his wife's wishes, has at last decided to enter the British navy and take up his residence in England.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—The Post's Paris correspondent commenting upon the article in the Eclair by M. Gerville, a member of the chamber of deputies from the Island of Guadeloupe. French West Indies, ad-

vocating a Franco-Russo-American alliance against the common enemy, England, says the writer of the above shows plainly what help America would give the dual alliance, but is not equally clear as to the benefit that America would derive.

TANGIER, Morocco, Sept. 6.—The pirates belonging to the Rezoza Babylet who about the middle of last month boarded and sacked the Italian bark Fiducia off the Rif coast, taking prisoners her captain, boatswain and one seaman and who about two weeks later seized and plundered the Portuguese bark Rosia Faro and carried the captain of the vessel and four of her crew, have agreed to release the prisoners in exchange for the Riflians who were captured by the Spanish.

LONDON, September 6.—The Standard publishes a despatch from Baku saying that a new Russian syndicate, composed of 12 large petroleum firms, will be expected to be formed in 1893 on a ten years basis. The syndicate will control an immense capital and will be represented in the great markets. It will have tank boats and reservoirs in order to compete with American oil and with the new Russian Grosney fields wells, which are largely exploited by foreign firms and seriously threaten the Baku trade.

CHARTER OAK PARK, Hartford, Conn., Sept. 6.—Exhibition paced mile by Jimmy Michael against the world's record, time of quarter: First quarter, 27 2-5; second quarter, 56 2-5; third quarter, 1 24 flat; mile 1 49 4-5. Michael failed to equal the record, which is 1 37 3-5. Five mile professional race was won by Jimmy Michael. Time, 11 35 4-5 sec. Time by miles: First mile, 3 15 4-5; second 4 24 4-5; third, 6 47 2-5; fourth, 8 53 3-5; fifth, 11 00 3-5. A. W. Porter, Newton, Mass., second; G. H. Knight, Houston, Mass., third.

OTTAWA, September 6.—The Department of the Interior has received from Mr. Ogilvie, the Dominion Surveyor now in the Yukon country, a bunch of wheat bearing the following inscription on a card:

"Grown at Fort Cudahy, from accidental planting in the autumn of 1895. All from one root, and cut fourteen inches above ground, on September 7, 1896. Aug. 27, min. temp., 31°; Aug. 31, min. temp., 27°; Sept. 1, min. temp., 27.1°." This is probably the first wheat ever grown in the Yukon, and though not of the highest grade it demonstrates what may be done.
