TUESDAY, NOV. 3.

Michaelmas Term opened at 11 o'clock this forenoon. Present—the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

James Delorey and others vs. Daniel F. McDonald—Action of trespass and trover. Tried at Georgetown in February last, when judgment was given for plaintiff for \$104. Rule for new trial argued Hilary Term last, and today the Court gave judgment discharging the rule with costs. J. A. Matheson for plaintiff; D. A. Mackinnon for defendant.

Abraham Lavandier and others vs. Malcolm McDonald—Action of trespass and trover. Tried at Georgetown in February last, when judgment was given for plaintiff. Rule for new trial was argued Hilary Term last, and the Court today gave judgment discharging the rule with costs.

Mr. Richard E. Johnston, a student in the office of Mr. James J. Johnson, was, on motion, admitted an Attorney of the Supreme Court.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD. The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1380, an increase of 31 over September.

In consequence of Principal McSwain's resignation, which is to take effect on the 31st of December, and the appointment of Mr. Cullen to the principalship of Queen Square School on that date, the Secretary was directed to advertise for a Vice Principal for Queen Square School.

It was ordered that the vice v. or enquire into a case of suspension of a pupil by a teacher, also to see inaccuracies in some of the teachers' reports.

The committee on property was appointed to look into a complaint by a citizen that the desks were not suitable for the grade.

The Secretary was directed to enquire into the method followed of ventilating rooms, complaints having been heard of unequal temperature being maintained during the school session.

A new plan for the promotion of pupils was submitted and adopted for the current year.

Mr. D. C. McLeod was appointed on the visiting committee for the month of November.

A committee consisting of the chairman and Mr. Handrahan was appointed to enquire into complaints regarding defective light in some departments in Queen Square School.

The meeting adjourned.

PROVINCIAL HOISES.

Some of the Best Performances on Provincial Tracks Last Year.

The following, which we extract from the Halifax Record's review of last season's work on Maritime Province tracks, will be of interest to horsemen and others in this province:—

The fastest horse owned in the provinces by the records is Edgardo, 2133, owned by W. F. Todd, St. Stephen. Abbot Wilkes, 2111, by Red Wilkes, is now at Bridgetown, but it is understood is still owned in New England. Edgardo's son Tomah, 2110, owned in Boston, who has the fastest record ever made by a horse bred in the provinces, was formerly owned by John Lawlor, St. Stephen, and is still owned by Special Blend, 2181, by Black Pil. owned by E. Leikoi Willis, St. John, has a better record than any horse bred and owned in the maritime provinces. He 221 is the fastest record made on a maritime province track, and he is the fastest trotting stallion ever bred in the provinces.

Chimes E, 2154, by Chimes, owned by R. Shaughnessy, St. John, has the fastest record of any pacer owned in the provinces. Benny, 2183, by Farranight, Jr., has the best record of any pacer owned in P. E. Island; he is owned by W. C. Bourke, Charlottetown.

Israel, 2191, by Rampart, owned by A. C. Bell, New Glasgow, has the best record of any horse owned in Nova Scotia.

Parland, 2261, by Parkside, same owner, has the best record of any province bred mare, owned in the provinces, and Misota, 2231, by Sir Nutwood, owned by J. H. Lamy, Amherst, has the best record for mares over provincial tracks.

Eska, 224, by Lumps, same owner, is the fastest pacing mare in the provinces.

Ned's exhibition mile at St. John in 2:17 is the fastest public mile ever made over a provincial track.

Arclight, by Rampart, owned by Dr. Taylor, Hampton, N. B., has the three fastest heats ever made over a provincial track—2:21, 2:23, 2:23, at Charlottetown, September 16, 1896.

Earle (Stanley), 2201, has the fastest record of any gelding owned in the province. Stranger, by Sir John Deane, 2251, owned by R. McGeever, Halifax, has the best record of any gelding owned and bred in the provinces. Mourne, 232, owned by Reddin Bros, Charlottetown, has the best record of any trotting gelding owned on the island. Lewy, 239, by Westlaw, owned by James A. McNeill, Summerside, P. E. I., has the best record of any pacing gelding on the island.

Amherst has both the stallion and gelding records for the provinces, and Charlottetown has the best record ever made by a mare.

Brighton Boy, 128, by All Right, owned by R. Steele, Charlottetown, has the half mile yearling record for the provinces.

Parkland, 225, by Parkside, owned by W. B. Bowness, Summerside, has the mile yearling record, and his 2:36 is the two year old record for provincial tracks.

Promoter, 2311, by Preceptor, now in Boston, has the three best record. Brazil, 221, by Brown Wilkes, has the four year old record.

Clayton, 2221, by Allie Clay, owned by D. S. Mann, Petitoctiac, has the best pacing record of any province bred owned in the provinces; also holds the pacing record for the maritime provinces, and his three heats at St. John, 2241, 224, 2221, are the three fastest heats ever paced in the provinces.

Day, 218, by Allie Clay, owned by S. O. Biggoy, Aulrobor, Mass., is the fastest trotter ever bred in P. E. Island.

Jubilee, 2171, by Melbourne King, owned by Dr. J. H. Carmichael, Springfield, Mass., is the fastest mare ever bred in the provinces.

Dandy Estmont, by Allie Clay, owned at Hudson, Mass., and Jules Robin, by Abdallah Messenger, owned in Maine, each with records of 2:20, have the best record of pacing geldings ever bred in the provinces. Goss, 2101, by Uncle Sim, now in Cambridge, Mass., is the fastest gelding ever bred in Nova Scotia.

Salando, 222, by Hernando, owned in Boston, is the fastest stallion ever bred in P. E. Island.

Katrina, 2251, has the fastest four year old record for mares in the province. Mayflower, 228, has the fastest four year old mare record bred in Nova Scotia.

Parkland, 2281, has the fastest four year old record, bred and owned in P. E. Island.

Belle, 213, by Melbourne King, now owned in the west, is the fastest pacer bred in the provinces. Sir Henry Wilkes, 2191, by Harry Wilkes, owned in Toronto, is the fastest stallion ever bred in the provinces.

Maggie T., 2181, by Sir Charles, owned in Boston, is the fastest trotting mare ever bred in New Brunswick.

Track records (continuing)—Amherst, Special Blend, 2:21; St. John, Special Blend, 2:21; Charlottetown, Arclight, 2:22; St. Stephen, Brazilian, 2:24; Summerside, Parkland, 2:24; Moncton, Stranger, 2:26; Kentville, Special Blend, 2:25; Halifax, 2:25; Yarmouth, Israel, 2:24; Fredericton, Arclight, 2:24; New Glasgow, Misota, 2:25.

FACTS FOR THE POLICE. Sir.—Could you believe that during last week I counted on Pownal Street no less than thirty-six men, between the hours of 5 and 8 o'clock, p. m., so drunk that they could scarcely keep on the sidewalk. Besides these, I saw four boys during the same period in the same condition, and to all appearance they could not be over 16 or 18 years of age. Forty persons seen drunk on one street during one week! It may be thought strange why there should be so many seen drunk on Pownal Street. The reason is quite obvious: the police never make themselves known there after it gets a little dark.

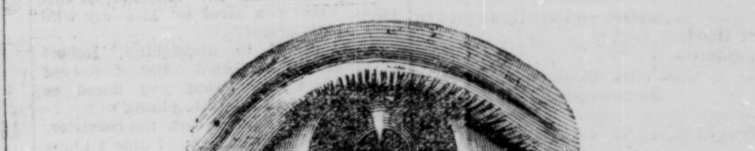
