Local and Other Items.

THE HAY CROP—Hay cutting is well under way in some sections of the New England States. The crop is an average one.

A SNAKE IN AN OX'S STOMACH.—At Ben Hartlen's slaughter house, Campbell road, last Monday, an ox that arrived by steamer from Bridgewater was killed. The wizen, or food canal, was cut, when a green snake protruded its head through the orifice. It was killed and found to be 14 inches long. It had been probably drunk in taking water, but those who are experienced said they never heard of such a thing before. The ox, it would be fancied must have felt very uncomfortable with such a lodger; but did not show it as he was in first class condition.—Halifax Ex.

BRITAIN'S FINEST GUN.—An artillery officer, writing in one of the magazines, says: "Our finest gun is the weapon now supplied to the navy from Woolwich, which is known as the 12 inch wire-wound gun, and weighs 46 tons. Each shell will cost the country from £60 to £70. The 67 ton gun has a muzzle velocity of 2,016 ft. seconds, and throw a shell of about 1,200 lb. weight, including the 'bursting' with a charge of 630 lbs. of slow-burning powder. The expense of firing all these big guns is very high, ranging from the 17.72 ton of 110 tons, which is calculated to cost £1,000 for every round fired in action, to the smaller natures, which run to £10 a shot or so.

CONCERNING WAR CORRESPONDENTS.—The Utica Globe says: Some of the army correspondents in Cuba in their comments on military movements ignore not only the art of war but the history of other wars. The events of this campaign are spoken of as being unparalleled. The landing of 15,000 troops on the Santiago coast is landed as a marvellous, unprecedented feat. When the Crimea was invaded 26,000 British infantry, 1,000 cavalry, with their horses and guns, besides 28,000 French infantry, 700 Turks, and 68 guns were landed on an open beach without any loss of life, and that in the face of the enemy, for although the landing was not opposed, a large Russian army was in the vicinity, and the battle of Alma was fought two days later. War correspondents ought to be men with some knowledge of military affairs, so that the intelligence of readers may not be insulted.

It is by no means certain, however, that these who remain have not proved themselves wiser in their generation than the seceders, for, while ghosts are unmistakably "off" in these days, the interest in other forms of mystical quackery seems to be as strong and widespread as ever.—London World.

Throneroom of Spain.

The throneroom of Spain is a magnificent apartment of crimson and gold, with colossal mirrors and a chandelier of rock crystal that is considered the finest example of the kind in the world. Under the gorgeous canopy are two large chairs handsomely carved and gilded and upholstered in crimson brocade. These are the thrones of Spain, where the boy king and queen regent sit on occasions of ceremony. Sometimes the daughters stand beside their mother, when it is proper for all the royal family to receive the court.—International Magazine.

Magnetizing a Soap Bubble.

Oxygen is a million times less "attractable" or "susceptible" than iron, and therefore experiments to show its attractability have to be extremely delicate. It was with one of them that Professor Fleming concluded his lecture. He took a soap bubble—soap and water, by the way, being diamagnetic—and filling it with air placed it in the field of a very strong electro magnet. The bubble did not quiver. Then he filled another bubble with oxygen, and again turned on the current. Instantaneously the bubble inclined itself toward the magnet. It bobbed back again when the current was turned off, but at a second attempt, when again the current was turned on, the attraction so unsettled it that it burst.—London Graphic.

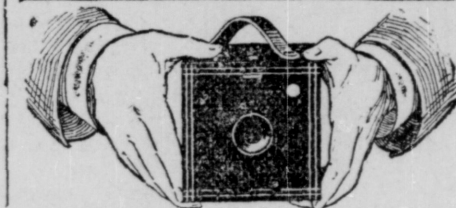
