## Elderly Man Is Injured As Blaze Destroys Home

O'LEARY—Fire destroyed the home of Robert McLellan of Springfield West about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. Nothing was saved from the blaze, which originated around the stove, except several kitchen chairs.

Mr. McLellan, an elderly person who lived alone, suffered burns about the face and is a patient in O'Leary Community Hospital.

The O'Leary fire brigade was called but arrived too late to be of any assistance.

The loss was reported partly covered by insurance.

## Body Of Lawrence Resident Found In S'ide Hotel Room

SUMMERSIDE—The body of Clarence MacKenzie, about 60, was found last evening under distressing circumstances in his room at the Queen Hotel in Summerside where he had been staying since checking in late Monday night after arriving by train. His address was listed as Lawrence, Mass.

Police said there is no suspicion of foul play and his death was an apparent suicide.

He had stayed in his room most of the week but always answered when asked by employees if he needed anything. However last evening about nine o'clock he failed to answer a query from outside his room door as to his health and his body was found a short time later lying under the sink with a necktie tied to the water faucet and looped around his neck.

His door was bolted and entry was affected by use of a ladder and other implements through the transom to unlock the door.

MacKenzie, whose records revealed that he was born in Boston, had served in the Canadian Army in the First World War and was a pensioner. He had been coming to Summerside each year for extended periods having spent nearly all last summer here. He was a member of the local legion. He is understood to have relatives in Summerside with whom he visited on former stays.

His wife and son reside in Lawrence, Mass. He also has a married daughter in Honolulu.

An inquest was ordered by Coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan and a jury empanelled consisting of Milton Melish, foreman, Raymond Pleau, Antoine Gallant, Sr. Antoine Gallant, Jr., Alban Gallant, Charles Murray and Roy Turner.

After viewing the body the jury was dismissed to convene at the call of the coroner.

## Daylight Time Affects Island

Bus and plane schedules and radio and television times on Prince Edward Island changed over the weekend as most of the nation switched to daylight saving time.

Only communication system to remain on standard time is the Canadian National Railways.

Principal switches in the bus schedules have the Tignish to Charlottetown run leaving at 7 a.m. instead of 7:30 and the bus to Georgetown will leave at 5 p.m. instead of 4:15.

CFBY-TV changes over entirely to daylight time, and network radio shows follow suit. However local radio programs stay on standard time.

## St. Catherines Man Is On List Of Most Wanted Criminals

At large since 1953 William Adams of St. Catherines, Ontario, is one of Canada's most wanted criminals.

St. Catherines' police and the RCMP have been hunting Adams, alias Wasily Samborski, alias Joe Lacheau, in connection with the death of his father, whose body was found buried in the basement of a small shoe repair store in St. Catherines in June of 1949. Adams is wanted on a charge of murder.

Of dark complexion, Adams is 37 years old, five feet 9 1/2 inches in height and weighs 180 pounds. He has brown eyes and dark brown hair, parted on the left side and wears sideburns. He has hairy arms, thick, prominent lips and sometimes wears a mustache.

He has worked as a crane operator, a machinist and a jewelry and patent medicine salesman. All information, except his age is based on information received in 1949. The picture also was believed taken in 1949.

Any person having information which might assist police in locating Adams should immediately notify the Chief Constable, Police Department, St. Catherines, Ont., the RCMP Commissioner, Ottawa or the nearest police department.

## Fluoridation Hearing Slated For Nova Scotia Town In June

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—A public hearing will be held here June 24 to hear views on the proposed fluoridation of the town water supply.

Mayor J.H. Power said the hearing would give everyone an opportunity of studying all angles of fluoridation and of making their views known.

Dr. G.M. Lewis, president of the Canadian Dental Association, said in a telegram to news media here that there was no truth in "a rumor initiated in the town of New Glasgow" that the association planned to reverse its stand on fluoridation.

"The association has for some years passed resolutions endorsing this measure and will continue to do so..." the telegram said.

Proponents of fluoridation say addition of the substance to drinking supplies helps keep teeth healthy. Opponents say it is poisonous and reduces the resistance of the masses of propaganda.
