WINTER TRADE.

The following abstract of statistics of exports by the Stanley, in the course of six weeks from 25th December 1897 to 8th February, 1898, are worthy of remark:

Table with 3 columns: Item, Quantity, Value. Includes Smelts and eels, Fresh meats and bacon, Dressed hogs, etc.

In addition to about 75 tons miscellaneous freight, value not known.

These statistics were obtained by the President of the Board of Trade, Mr. Horace Hazard. They show that a considerable export trade is going on, even though there is but one steamer running from one port, and even though her trips are very irregular.
