CHANGE OF COMMANDERS.—The Pioneer says: Capt. Ferguson resigned his position on the M. A. Star last week. This gentleman owns two schooners and he leaves the Star to take charge of one of them. POOR TIMES IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—In Newfoundland the bank fishing last season is reported to have been a partial failure. Some vessels, with a crew of nine men, out all summer, only caught two or three hundred quintals. Shore fishing was also attended with very poor success. This makes times bad for the laboring classes, many of whom are beginning to feel that their circumstances would be improved if they should join the Canadian confederation.

THE RIFLE.—On Saturday afternoon, the members of the Engineer Corps entitled to fire off for the company's medal and badge, met at Kensington Range. The competitors were Serg. Major Grey, Serg. Davidson and Sappers Anderson, Baird and Longworth. The shooting was with Snider rifles at Queen's ranges. The medal was won by Serg. Davidson, who made 79 points, and the badge by Sapper Longworth, who made 75.

THE END NOT YET.—A Halifax despatch says that Mr. A. B. Sheraton, of the Queen Hotel, that city, is suing the carnival ball committee for the amount of the bill. The committee contracted for five hundred guests. The ball was so exclusive that only 200 attended. There was a big loss on the provisions. Mr. Sheraton carried out his part and now sues for his bill. The committee are from \$500 to \$600 in arrears, but have never yet reported to the executive.

MUSTARD BATHS IN FEVERS.—A correspondent in the Chatham World says: Do the Doctors here know the virtues of mustard in the treatment of fevers? The writer has had yellow fever, and what is known in the West Indies as colonial fever, having been at the point of death several times, and in every case was saved by mustard baths. The mustard was mixed with warm water, a very strong solution, and applied freely to the soles of the feet and calves of the legs. The British consul in Pernambuco attended to this himself in my case, and in two hours I had two of these baths, which I believe, settled the fever and saved my life.

SOMETHING FOR BARBEC.—A Bangor paper says: Houlton has one of the greatest curiosities now existing in the world, but probably the people do not appreciate it. There is a woman residing in that town who is the mother of fourteen children. She has never worn an article of jewelry; nor a collar around her neck; nor a ribbon, with the exception of one time when first married, she wore one fashioned into a bow. Nor has she worn a hoop skirt, a bustle or a piece of lace in her life. If the majority of women were like this one, there would be a decided dullness in the fancy goods business.

The Candy Poisoning Case.

St. John, Oct. 20.

Saturday afternoon William J. McDonald was brought before Police Magistrate Ritchie and formally charged with the murder of Mrs. MacRae. During the reading of the information against him he did not appear the least excited and took the matter quite coolly. He was remanded to jail until Monday morning when his preliminary examination will begin. The verdict by the coroner's jury was quite a surprise to him and when informed of it Saturday morning he got indignant at such a charge against him. The verdict, by all who have closely followed the evidence, was generally received with approval, and is undoubtedly quite in accordance with public sentiment.

A Blaze at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.

The most disastrous fire that has occurred in Ottawa for some years broke out to-night in the rear of the row of wooden buildings opposite the Union Railway Station. The block was occupied as two hotels, several grocery stores and small shops. About a dozen buildings were destroyed or gutted, including the old St. Jean Baptiste Church, which has been recently used as a public hall. Fifteen families have been left homeless. The loss is about \$200,000 and the insurance small.

A Big Robbery.

City of Mexico, Oct. 20.

Two Republican newspapers to-day contained an account of the robbery of \$2,500,000 in interior debt bonds from the fifth section of the national treasury. It is stated that 1000 of the bonds of the nominal value of \$2,500 each of cash value of over \$1,000,000 were stolen and are reported to have been placed in London. Several persons have been arrested in connection with the robbery.

Attempted Assassination.

Berlin, Oct. 20.

While Prince William of Wurtemberg was driving to church at Ludwigsburg today, he was fired at by a man named Kläiber, who, upon being arrested, exclaimed: "It is high time Wurtemberg had a Catholic king." The Prince was not hurt. The would-be assassin, it is supposed, is deranged.

At a Standstill.

London, Oct. 20.

The recovery of the bodies of the victims of the explosion at the Bentilee colliery, Staffordshire, on last Wednesday, has come to a standstill. The miners refuse to descend into the mines on account of the stench arising from the dead bodies of men and horses in the coal pit.

The Duties Abolished.

Washington, Oct. 20.

The Department of State is officially informed that a law has been enacted by Chile to take effect on Dec. 30, 1889, abolishing duties on machines and tools for the use of agriculture, and farming trades and general industries.

A Great Concession.

Zanzibar, Oct. 20.

The Sultan has given the British Consul here a written promise that all children born in his dominions, after the 1st of January next, shall be free. This is considered to be the greatest concession a Mussulman has ever made to Europe.

Death of a King.

Lisbon, Oct. 20.

The King of Portugal died on Saturday. The death occurred at 11 a. m. The Duke of Braganza, eldest son of the King, who succeeded to the throne, will assume the title of Carlos I.
