FREAK ACCIDENT—A freak accident occurred on Tuesday evening resulting in irreparable damage to a truck and considerable damage to two cars. An automobile which was travelling West on Brighton Road, crashed into the rear of the truck which was parked on the North side of the street and the force of the impact hurled the truck into the rear of another car which had been parked in front of it. Both of the parked vehicles were the property of Mr. R. R. Bell who claims the frame of the truck was so badly bent it can not be repaired. The automobile which had been parked received damage to the rear bumper, trunk and body. The driver of the moving vehicle was treated for cuts around the mouth, and his car was smashed in the front, the windshield broken and the front seat torn from the floor.

Mr. Robert Shaw Of Brackley Dies

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday of Robert Shaw, retired proprietor of Shaw's Hotel, Brackley, in his 86th year.

The late Mr. Shaw was widely known, especially by tourists to this Province to whom he catered so efficiently for half a century. His long association with the summer hotel business continued until 1937 when he retired. The present proprietor of Shaw's Hotel is his son Gordon.

During his hotel career, he had built up a wide clientele and guests returned year after year. This indeed was a tribute to a man who endeavored at all times to make everything just right for his numerous guests. It was through his zeal that Shaw's Hotel became synonymous with the finest in summer resorts.

The late Mr. Shaw was a devout Presbyterian. He was one of the most prominent Liberals in the province.

He married the former Penelope MacMillan who survives him. Two sons and two daughters also survive. They are Helen, Mrs. Harold McCallum, Winnipeg; Louise, at home; Ernest, Toronto; and Gordon at home. Four grandchildren and one great grandchild also survive.

Members Visit College And Vocational School

Members of the Provincial Island Legislature, headed by Premier J. Walter Jones and Opposition Leader R. M. Bell, paid an official visit to Prince of Wales College and the Provincial Vocational School here today. They also saw the work being carried out by the P.E.I. Libraries and the Film Board which also have offices in the College.

Following a two-hour tour of the buildings, the members of the Legislature were served lunch in the Vocational School which was prepared by the Domestic Science branch. Each of the following spoke briefly thanking the Domestic Science girls for the lunch: Premier Jones, Opposition Leader Bell, Hon. F. A. Large, Forest Phillips, Speaker of the Legislature, and Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan.

One of the highlights of the tour was a film shown to the legislators by the Film Unit. It was a conservation film entitled, "Trees Are a Crop." One of the amusing incidents of the tour was the unsuccessful attempt by several of the members to wrestle a bottle of "pop" from a bottle vending machine at the Vocational School. Premier Jones lost a nickel trying for a bottle of pop. Agriculture Minister C. C. Baker had no better luck. John R. MacLean shoved a total of 14 cents into the stubborn machine but the elusive bottle did not come out. Finally, D. L. Mathieson stepped up for a try. He put his money in the slot and out popped a bottle—the only one of the afternoon.

Profitable Visit

Although the members may not have got a pop at the Vocational School, they did get a good insight into the work being carried on there and at Prince of Wales College.

Escorted to the College by Education Minister F. A. Large, the legislators were met by Dr. L. W. Shaw, deputy minister of Education and Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal, and at the Vocational School by Mr. Ralph MacLean. At P.W.C. they visited the Health Unit, the Natural Science and Agriculture Room, the Biology Laboratory, the Physics and Chemistry Laboratories and the Students' Library which contains a total of 5,200 books.

At the Vocational School they visited the sections where sheet metal, carpentry, bricklaying, blacksmithing and plumbing classes were in session. All of the members took a keen interest in the work being carried out.

They also went to the P.E.I. Libraries where the director, Bramwell Chandler, showed them the library which contains some 90,000 books and an annex which contains old Legislature Journals and records which have been assembled and are now being catalogued. They were told by Mr. Bramwell that there are 24 branch libraries throughout the province and that 5,000 books had been added to the existing supply during the past year. Bills Considered In Committee

This Province has possibly the best record in Canada for the registration of births, stated Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare during the second reading in the Legislature last night of a bill to amend the Vital Statistics Act.

We have 100% birth registration, he continued. He pointed out that this was not the case in registration of deaths and the large number of unverified deaths during the past few years made the amending of the Act necessary.

According to the bill the number of districts will be cut down from 490 to 20 with the district registrar being required to issue the burial permits. Every Monday the registrar will turn in certificates of registration of deaths. The responsibility of securing burial permits has been placed on the undertaker.

A bill entitled the "Civil Defense Act" was given a second reading. The bill provides that the Civil Defense Branch, under direction of the Minister of Health and Welfare, shall administer all matters relating to Civil Defense within the Province.

The bill will provide for the setting up of a Civil Defense Division and the carrying out of regulations regarding fire fighting, control of casualties and evacuees, traffic and transportation control, shelters, telegraph, telephone, radio and other communications, black-outs and training of personnel.

A second reading was given to a bill to incorporate the Society of Industrial and Cost Accountants of Prince Edward Island and a bill to amend the Town Act. Third readings were given to bills to amend the following acts: Co-operative Associations Act, Highway Traffic Act, Probate Act, Public School Act. Third readings were also given to the Reciprocal Enforcement of Maintenance Orders Act and an Act to Authorize the

know nothing about it. "I wonder if I came into town and started to practice law, how far would I get?" he asked.

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, told the group that farmers should carry along on an even trend and not jump into one thing when it was high and jump out when it fell low. He promised the Federation the full co-operation of the Department of Agriculture.

Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan stated that he did not like to see so many farms advertised for sale. He said that young people would be far better off to stay on the farms than to work in industry in other provinces.

Mr. R. R. Bell promised the full support of the Opposition members to the Federation. He thought that the fertilizer problem should be explored and stated that the main handicap of the farmer here is the lack of capital and credit. Messrs. W. F. A. Stewart, First Queen's, F. C. Ramsay, First Prince, Allison Proffitt, Freetown, Louis O'Connor, President of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture, Lincoln Dewar, Secretary of the Provincial Federation and Mrs. Allison MacMillan, Cornwall also spoke.

Forestry Act Given Reading

A person can be restricted from cutting more than two acres of forest land in any one year, according to a new bill entitled the Forestry Act which was given a second reading in the legislature last night.

Primary purpose of the bill is to curtail wood depletion by men from outside the Province or residents of the Province who would cut nearly all wood off their farms, it was explained by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, who promoted the bill. Under the direction of a forester a man can cut 100 acres, he added.

The bill also provides legislation for the licensing of all persons cutting or intending to cut or clear more than two acres of forest land. A forester or any officer of the Forestry Division under the direction of the Minister may enter upon any lands when necessary for the proper performance of his duties, the bill states.

Section 6 of the bill reads, "Upon the recommendation of the Minister, the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may make regulations to carry out effectively the intent and purpose of the act including regulations prohibiting the cutting of more than two acres of forest land in any calendar year and providing for the licensing, direction and control of licensed persons so cutting and clearing."

Violators may be fined an amount not exceeding \$100 and in default of payment spend a period not exceeding 30 days in jail.

United Church Minister Dies
LONDON, Ont., March 21 (CP)—A leading United Church minister, Rev. John W. Mackinnon, minister of First St. Andrew's United Church here, died today.

He had been in hospital since Jan. 21, when he suffered a heart seizure while conducting a baptismal service at his church. He served 33 years as pastor of First St. Andrew's and had been a member of the committee working for union between the United and Anglican Churches. He also was on the first executive of the Canadian Council of Churches. Born at Lake Ainsly, N. S., Dr. Mackinnon was the youngest of eight brothers.

His first charge was St. John's Church, Halifax, where he remained for eight years.
