

# Gilchrist is Hero In Buffalo's Win

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)**—Early last month Cookie Gilchrist was worth \$100. Saturday he was the key to a record-winning share of \$2,668.60 for each member of the American Football League champion Buffalo Bills.

Now for the first time, the full story of Gilchrist's return from a \$100 man can be told.

Paris of it have been pieced together before. The Associated Press has learned the real story of the key individuals involved—quarterback Jack Kemp and assistant general manager Chuck Burr.

Gilchrist, former Canadian Football League player, was placed on waivers early in November after clashing with coach Lou Saban.

**WON 9 STRAIGHT**

The Bills had reeled off nine victories without a defeat with Gilchrist in the lineup but, with owner Ralph Wilson's consent, it was agreed that Gilchrist would be placed on waivers.

Gilchrist, however, got in touch with Kemp and pleaded for another chance.

"Kemp heard Cookie out," said the source, "and he believed that he was really sorry but Jackie didn't know how to handle the situation."

Kemp turned to Burr. Burr listened to Kemp, who said that Gilchrist "wanted to go to Saban but realized he couldn't."

Burr suggested Kemp contact certain key players on the team and see how they felt about the situation.

So, Kemp got in touch with captain Billy Shaw and line-backer Harry Jacobs, among others. He then reached Burr and told him the general sentiment was at least to give Gilchrist a hearing.

**MADE RULES**

Burr said he would talk to Saban if Gilchrist would follow these ground rules:

1. Gilchrist was to go to the ball club and apologize for the incident.
2. Gilchrist would have to guarantee "that he would play his heart out and produce to the best of his ability."

Gilchrist agreed, went to the team and apologized. Burr then reached Saban, who agreed to talk with Gilchrist.

The source said, "Gilchrist told Saban he would do anything to get back on the team because he wanted to play for the Bills."

After a two-hour meeting, Saban relented.

# Frank Ryan, Gary Collins Star In Browns Victory

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—Frank Ryan, a much maligned quarterback, threw three touchdown passes to Gary Collins and 40-year-old Lou Groza booted two field goals Sunday as underdog Cleveland won the National Football League title with a shocking 27-0 victory over the Baltimore Colts.

Collins set a championship game record with his three TD catches and was voted the most valuable player in the game.

After Collins' third catch, a segment of the chilled crowd of 79,544 in the lakefront stadium rushed onto the field and slapped the flanker on the back.

In the final seconds of the game, the crowd burst through the police guard and tore down the goal posts.

Jim Brown, a bulldozer all afternoon, split Baltimore's vaunted defence for 114 yards on 27 carries but he didn't score a touchdown.

Cleveland's explosive offense scored 17 points in the third period, breaking the game wide open after a scoreless first half.

**GOT REVENGE**

The game was billed as a duel between Brown and Johnny Unitas, the Colts' great passer. But Ryan, the mathematical genius, who outpassed Unitas and com-
