SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT Laurier Slanders the Dead, And is Skinned by McCarthy. More Divisions Taken

OTTAWA, Sept 25 In the House yesterday the debate on the report of the Tarte-McGreevy committee was resumed.

Sir Adolphe Caron made an eloquent speech. He was followed by Laurier, who slandered Sir John Macdonald, whom he accused of having instilled into his party the doctrine of ruling by corruption.

Laurier quoted an extract from Sir John's speech at a banquet years ago which he shamefully garbled and for which he was sharply brought to task by Dalton McCarthy who followed him.

McCarthy skinned Laurier unmercifully, while Laurier, white with rage, jumped to his feet, pounded his desk and generally indulged in an exhibition such as was never before witnessed in the house.

McCarthy told him that to his eternal disgrace he had garbled Sir John's words and slandered the dead, about whom, only a few months ago, he had spoken in high terms of praise.

McCarthy then quoted Sir John's words in full, amid uproarious applause and the confusion of Laurier. McCarthy charged him with being bought and sold by Mercier and with having gained his support in Quebec with the assistance of the Pacaud-Mercier steal.

McCarthy said Laurier had made a good bargain with Mercier, and the recent disclosures had shown there was cash down in the transaction. There was something more than moral support promised by the Quebec Government in the last election, which had given Laurier the proud boast that he had a larger following from Quebec than had the Government.

That majority was obtained, as the recent disclosures had shown, by means which were corrupt and scandalous in the extreme. In conclusion, McCarthy moved an amendment censuring Sir Hector on the ground of administrative responsibility, and demanding the prosecution of the Connollys for perjury.

This amendment was defeated by one hundred and eighty-four to two, only McCarthy and O'Brien voting for it. Davies' amendment to adopt the minority report was defeated by one hundred and four to eighty-three, majority twenty one against. The motion to adopt the majority report was carried by 101 to 86, a majority of fifteen, McCarthy O'Brien and Davin voting against it.

Tarte did not vote. There was great excitement and the galleries were crowded. The House adjourned at 2:30. It will probably prorogue next Wednesday. Yeo, Perry and McLean, leave for home to-day.

Sir John Thompson's daughter is dying. For a long while she has been a confirmed invalid. Sir John did not speak on the debate.

Exhibition Notes.

Forty years ago next November, the Provincial Exhibition was held on the 9th of that month in the lower room of the Temperance Hall. An afternoon of a single day was its full duration.

We notice that the "Hyde's" were even then taking the cheese prizes, or rather the only one offered, and that "Dark's" orchard was then, as now, to the fore, and that the "Bryenton's" walked off with the stocking prize, even at that early date.

The article we referred to closed as follows: "We trust are long to see the Central Society erect an agricultural hall in Charlottetown for the purpose of holding exhibitions here; and we doubt not, the community generally, if called on, would contribute liberally towards such a useful edifice."

The writer was one of our few true prophets. Our people were called on, and at a cost of over \$50,000 have exhibition buildings second to none in the Maritime Provinces.

Address and Presentation.

Last evening a committee from the shifting ordinance team waited upon Mrs. Rufus Macdonald, at her residence, Kent Street, and presented her with the wax anchor given by the batteries of artillery in camp at Quebec on the occasion of the funeral of her late husband, Corporal Rufus Macdonald.

The committee was composed of Lieut. Sterns, Sergts. Offer and Wheat, and Corpl. Murley. The gift was accompanied by an address from the team, which was read by Lieut. Sterns. Following is the ADDRESS:

To Mrs. Rufus Macdonald: DEAR MADAM,—We, the undersigned, members of the P. E. Island Shifting Ordinance Team, of 1891, on behalf of "B. and C., Coburg, Digby and Yarmouth Batteries, beg to present to you the accompanying wreath, as a token of esteem and regard held by them for your late husband, Corporal Rufus Macdonald, who on the ninth of September, instant, at the Isle of Orleans, Quebec, in the discharge of his duties as a soldier, sustained injuries which resulted in death.

Though our fallen comrade was personally unknown to the donors, yet they recognized in him a soldier worthy of the name. While it is a sad hour for you, we assured it has also cast a cloud of sorrow over us, his comrades in arms, as we are called upon to mourn the loss of one of our number. We saw him fall, and in his last hours though suffering the agonies of death he bore up as only a soldier could. His words of cheer to his comrades as they stood around him with sad faces and heavy hearts will not soon be forgotten.

A hero has gone. We, his companions, feel sorely the loss and we most sincerely condole with you on the sad event, and if sympathy of friends can be any consolation under the trying circumstances, be assured that all who knew him share in your sorrow for his loss, and our prayer is "that the Widow's God will bind up the broken heart."

Mrs. Macdonald, who was deeply affected during the proceedings, thanked the team for the very great kindness and sympathy shown by them.

Police Court.

This morning Robert Crawford appeared, charged with the larceny of \$100 from the residence of John McLean, Great George Street, on Sunday night last. Officers Campbell and Warren testified that they believed the bunch of keys found in the drawer of the bureau in McLean's house after the robbery, was the same they saw on the prisoner's person about two weeks previously.

Marshal Cameron swore that one of the keys on the ring opened the front door of Crawford's residence. Crawford said the keys were not his, and denied that the officers had ever seen them with him. He claimed that he was at service in the Baptist church on Sunday evening at the time the robbery was committed.

E. D. Sterns and George Simmons both testified to seeing Crawford in church on Sunday, but could not swear positively whether it was at the morning or evening service. Artemas Vatcher swore that he met Crawford on Queen Square on Sunday evening, between 6.25 and 6.35 o'clock, and walked with him to the Ferry Wharf where they parted when the church bells began to ring.

Crawford was remanded until Monday for further evidence. Geraldine Murphy, charged with drunkenness, was released upon promising to leave the city at once and not return for three months.

FIRE AT SOURIS.—We learn, in respect to the fire at Souris reported yesterday, that most of the furniture and tailoring outfit were saved. This is the second time Mr. Cheverie has been burned out within a year.
