Exercises Under Battle Conditions At Gagetown

HALIFAX (CP)—The most extensive military training exercise in Canada's peacetime history—actually three exercises in one—opens at Camp Gagetown, N. B.

June 13, Maj. Gen. J. M. Rockingham, commanding officer of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division, said here Sunday.

Exercise Spitfire will bring many Canadian artillerymen as close to actual battle conditions as they've yet been through use of live ammunition.

Later Operation YoYo will see infantrymen in full battle array sweep the 33 mile length of Gagetown and back again. This is expected to take about three days, the troops moving only at night.

Both will be climaxed by Exercise Eastern Star, a mock battle pitting Canadian fighting men against each other under conditions simulating combat as closely as possible.

Good Response At First Day Of "Life Saver" Clinics Here

332 "Life Savers" had registered on an objective of 400 at the end of the first day of Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics. Though this was 68 behind the quota for the day, it was considered to be a gratifying response. 172 of these "Life Savers" attended the special Clinic held at St. Dunstan's College yesterday morning, and topped the College's objective by 22.

Last evening between 5 and 9 there was an attendance of 189 at the special "Union Night" Clinic held at the Clover Club. "Canada Packers Hour" between 5 and 6 brought forth a good response. About 25 per cent of those registered last evening were new donors—that is they attended the Clinic for the first time as the result of their membership in the "Life Saver" Club promoted through the different Labor Unions.

Mr. James Coles, of Local 255, United Packing House Workers of America, who is a representative of the Charlottetown and District Labor Council on the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee, was on hand to check the attendance of Union members, as well as to make his donation. Mr. Coles calculated that 121 of those present were members of the "Life Saver" Club.

Arrangements for the Clinic at St. Dunstan's were again capably carried out under the able leadership of Mr. George Mullaly, president of the Students' Council, who was assisted by Mr. Michael Swift, president-elect. On Sunday evening, prior to the Clinic, the students were addressed by Lt. Col. L.F. Macdonald, who urged their continued co-operation with this life-saving project. Members of the student body, including several co-eds, carried out the different tasks in connection with the Clinic in a very efficient manner.

Burkes 'Lads and Lassies' Band held a parade last night in support of the Blood Donor Clinic, and afterwards added a note of festivity to the scene at the Clover Club, by giving a short concert. Willing and capable to assist the Mobile Blood Donor Team from Halifax at last night's clinics were provided by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Charlottetown Branch, Canadian Legion, the Nurses' Association, St. Elizabeth's Aid, Red Cross Staff and Corps, Red Cross High School members from Notre Dame Academy and Queen Square School.

Today there will be morning, afternoon and evening sessions at the Blood Donor Clinic at the Clover Club. The morning and afternoon hours will provide an opportunity for donors to get through with a minimum of waiting, as the evening sessions have a tendency to be more crowded. The objective for today's clinics is 425, and it is also hoped to make up for some of yesterday's loss of 68 as well.

The Parade of 1957 automobiles being arranged for this afternoon by the Charlottetown Automobile Dealers, and the fact that the REECE Band is turning out this evening, will provide added interest in the Blood Donor Clinics today.

MUSIC FOR BLIND
TORONTO (CP)—The national music consultant of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind reported Thursday that 10,000 pages of music were transcribed into braille during the last year for the use and enjoyment of sightless Canadians. Mrs. E. C. S. Simpson told the 15th annual meeting of the CNIB music committee that more than 8,500 pages were done at the Montreal transcription bureau and the rest by CNIB workers at Halifax.

Canadian Army Appointment

OTTAWA (CP)—Army headquarters announced Monday Lt. Col. H. H. A. Parker of Toronto, now assistant adjutant at Central Command, Oakville, Ont., has been appointed assistant adjutant and quartermaster - general with the Canadian Army liaison establishment, London, England.

He will replace next September Lt. Col. J. K. S. Manuel of Halifax whose new appointment is to be announced later.

Will Resume Search For Airliner In May

VANCOUVER (CP)—Search for a Trans-Canada Air Lines North Star, which vanished over the mountains of southwest British Columbia last December with 62 persons aboard, will be resumed in May.

A TCA spokesman said Wednesday detailed plans have not been worked out, but the search will be a "pretty extensive effort" involving TCA, RCAF, civilian planes and RCMP.

A full-scale air and ground hunt last December failed to yield any trace of the plane.

Accused Elects Trial By Jury

Charged with breaking, entering, and theft, a resident from the vicinity of the C.A.A. Grounds elected trial by jury, in the Supreme Court, at City Police Court yesterday morning. The case arose from a break and entry at Dowd Motors, Ltd. on April 27, in which a quantity of automobile paint and similar materials were taken. The accused was remanded until May 3rd, the date of the preliminary hearing, and was released on two hundred dollars cash bail at the request of his counsel, Mr. L. P. O'Donnell.

Also appearing before Magistrate K.M. Martin, a person charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to seven days in Queen's County Jail.
